

****** Dairy Wisdom.

The true value of the dairy cow is by necessity fixed by the amount of fat there is in her milk and what it costs to produce it.

The largest milkers are the greatest eaters. This rule is one that you can tie to and follow without danger of being deceived.

The first step in the process of better breeding is to secure and use a sire that inherits from proved ancestors the prepotent power to impress dairy qualities on his offspring.

Breeding heifers too young often results in a dwarf breed. Milk the cows clean every time if you would keep up a uniform flow of milk.

The percentage of fat in the milk of a cow is evidently fixed by two things-viz, breed and individuality.

With the year around dairying good stables are necessary, where the cows can be fed and milked in a comfortable place.

The Foreign Dollar.

The foreign dollar is the biggest dollar on the financial horizon. It is the most powerful factor in the world's progress and it moves the urday morning, no doubt you star of civilization at will. It folwould have seen two thirds of lows the line of least resistance and prosperity waits in attendance upon it. It is the most voluminous and congenial of our currency. foreign dollar is a cautious, leisurely investor, loves good company, is seldom found alone and is quickly woven into the industrial fibre of departs. Only gigantic enterprises appeal to it and wherever it goes, it

The essential element to our progress is the volume of money availf ten billion dollars. Our production will not exceed consumption more than fifty million dollars per annum, which is hardly sufficient to run our errands and to no perceptible extent can it take part in the development of the State's resources. This is a work that must be done by the foreign dollar. We do not increase our wealth when we borrow from each other but when we negotiate a loan on the outside of the State, we bring money into Texas, or when foreign capital moves to Texas, we have increased our wealth. It is the foreign dollar that must develop Texas.

The Need of Cheap Money.

An iliustration of the importance f cheap money to our prosperity may be obtained when we consider that of the total value of all farms which is \$1,822,713,000, only \$583,268,-160 is owned in fee simple by the farmers operating the farms and the balance of \$1,239,444,840, is mortgaged or operated by tenant farmers. Reduce the rate of interest one cent per annum on this enormous sum and we have a saving of \$12,000,000. Of course the tenant farmer does not owe for the farms, but it is his ambition to acquire the property and he is, as a rule, a wai ing customer for money to buy a some and cheap money will improve his opportuity for buying a farm and lighten his burden. The Texas farmer needs cheap money.
