TERRY COUNVY RECEIVES PRAISES

The following letter from a prominent lawyer and real estate man of Arkansas, only reiterates the opinion expressed by nine-tenths of the visitor and prospectors to Terry county. The writer is a son-in-law of one of leading merchants, J. T. May, has no property here, nor none listed for sale. The letter runs as follows:

Lamar, Ark., Sept. 20, 1911
Terry County Herald:—

When in Terry county, I was asked for my opinion of that Co., and I told the editor that I would give my opinion when I returned home.

First; I wish to state what I thought of the country before I saw it. I expected to find a country where all the crops were all burned up by the long drouth this year; also I thought that I would find you drinking alkali water, and expected to see no fruits of any kind. So on arriving in Terry county, I was sur-

prised like most Arkansawyers, on visiting the Plains country, and instead of finding what I expected, I found all crops of feed green and doing fine; the water as pure as that of any country I ever saw. In my opinion you have one of the best sections of country in the United States, with your level, fertile land, stretching for miles and miles, and situated as it is in one of the most healthy districts in the country, the homeseeker, when he comes to that country a few years hence would be astonished and surprised, and would fail to

recognize the country.

With the clever, accomodating disposition of your people, living in one of the richest farming sections of the country, all you need is for land buyers to go see; the country will do the rest. The time is close at hand when you will have a family on each quarter section instead of one on every four or eight sections. That will prove in a short time to be a great corn and cotton section. While all kinds of feed and fruit crops do fine, and anything that grows on a vine can't be beat; with one of the best

peach futures of them all, you are certainly healed. You can raise more melons from volunteer vines than most countries can with best cultivation.

I had the pleasure of visting such a crop several times while in Brownfield and your postmaster promised to see after the crop until I could come again. And will state in the close you have one of the finest countries in the world and hope in the future to see it again.

Has a Good Crop.

We had the pleasure of looking over V. E. Hargett's croplast Sunday forenoon and pronounce it very good.

Now Mr. Hargett had great disadvantages to go up against this year for the reason the land had received no more than half cultivation for the past three years and March was well advanced when he took charge this year, but he informs us that if he stays on this place another season, he will flat break the whole thing deep, thereby mixing the clay and sand, which he says puts a quietus on the blow-

ing business.

Mr. Hargett will make one fourth of a bale of cotton, or better; between fifteen and twenty bushels of corn and—well we don't see where he aims to put all his cane, kaffir and maize. He has got the feed and don't you never doubt it.

Speaking of corn, this same field looked like a total flash the last of July or the first of August, but is well matured, well filled corn. You can't cheat Terry of a crop.

Carry you cotton to the Gomez gin. It has been fully over hauled and they will give you a good turnout.

Brownfield High School.

To the Public:—In order that the school system may be thoroughly efficient, its buildings must be adapted in every way to the purpose for which they are used, and there must be an earnest and enthusiastic corps of teachers. To build such buildings and secure such a body of teachers, means the expenditure of a vast sum of money. In no better way can people spend their money than in properly educating their children, both for the sake of their children and for the country, whose destiny they will soon be controlling. Given these two factors and good schools are sure to follow. It is a pleasure to be able to state that both are becoming a reality in the Brownfield school system.

Few people realize the vital responsibilities in the education of a child resting upon the teacher. The really efficient teacher cannot be fully remunerated for the work he does, while the merest pittance is far too much for the inefficient teacher. Under the one, children receive inspiration, form good habits, grow morally and intellectually. Under the other, bad habits are cultivated and the time is worse than wasted. Indeed, it is positively wrong to permit an inefficient teacher to remain in charge of a school. Too much care cannot be exercised in the selection of our teachers.

To the Parents.

Much is being done in Texas at present to improve our educational system. Our Conference for Education in Texas and live teachers all over the State are working systematically and tirelessly in behalf of the needed school legislation. The question arises, what are you going to do? Parents, are you thoroughly awake to what is meant by the education of your boys and girls? You are now reaping what you have sown. Did you sow well? If so, the harvest is satisfactory. If your life is growing dearer to you every day that you live; if each day brings a broader field of usefulness, and if that field is well cultivated; then your life is by no means a failure. On the other hand, if you are downcast and dejected; if you do not find a real and genuine pleasure in the association of your friends and companions; then it is safe to conclude that your education and training were by no means conducted in the right way. Are you doing all you can for your children? If not, NOW is the time to get busy, and the ensuing year is the time to keep busy.

Brownfield has a good reputation as a school town, and what we must do is not only to sustain this enviable position, but to promote it. Does anyone know of anything that will make the school better? If so, you surely will not be so selfish as to keep it to yourself. The Board in its foresight and wisdom has employed a corps of teachers amply qualified to do the work assigned them. Do you believe they will do it? They will through your co-operation, and not otherwise. You may ask how I may co-operate? The best way is to put your boy in school and keep him there every day and hour, and stay by the teachers in their efforts. Give your boy to the teacher if you think he is deserving, if you do not think so, he would ruin the school if sent. Saying this, however, we hope that parents will not keep their children in school without ever visiting it and seeing its works; for this is absolutely necessary to the workings of a good school. If parents come and seem interested, the children will get interested. Let us start September 11, 1911, with a determination to make this the best school year Brownfield has ever had. We can and must.

At this time we wish to say that the Brownfield High School offers superior advantages in every way to those who are looking for a suitable place to enter their children. There are many things that combine to place this school in a class by itself, but probably the most potent is the corps of teachers secured. From the principal, who is fitted by years of study and work, down to the primary teacher, the utmost care has been displayed in the selection of instructors, and the matter of salary has not been so much the question as that of competency. Children entering any department of this school will have the most thorough training not only in the prescribed course of study but in those finer elements of good education that only the most proficient instructors can impart.

The moral status of the town is a feature of which we are especially proud, as there are absolutely none of the evil influences that abound in most larger places. There is not a saloon, pool hall or gambling device in the town, of any description. We have four church organizations, two nice church buildings; Sunday schools

INDIGESTION OF COWS.

Loss of Cud is a Symptom Merely and Not a Disease.

Loss of cud is not a disease, but merely the symptom of sickness. When a cow suffers from indigestion

or any other ailment which makes her feel quite sick she naturally will stop chewing her cud. When the trouble subsides rumination will be resumed. Many people give artificial cuds, thinking to establish rumination by such means. This of course is highly absurd, says the Rural New Yorker.

On general principles give a cow a full dose of physic when she will not chew her cud and follow the purge by full doses of stimulants in warm water, thin gruel or flaxseed tea. As a physic a pound of epsom salts, half an ounce of ground ginger root and a cupful of blackstrap molasses shaken up in three pints of warm water will prove effective. Four ounce doses of whisky along with half a dram of fluid extract of nux vomica will serve well as a stimulant. Another good stimulant for cows is a mixture of equal parts of aromatic spirits of ammonia, pure alcohol and spirits of nitrous ether (sweet niter). A dose of this is two ounces every three or four hours, well diluted with water, gruel or flaxseed tea. Rectal injections of soapy warm water are also useful when a cow is affected in the way here considered.

Black Teeth In Hogs.

Hogs often have black teeth, but the condition does not indicate any particular disease. As a rule, no ulceration is found around the bases of such teeth, but where that condition exists the teeth should be extracted. It usually happens that the teeth are not discovered until the pigs become sick from indigestion or some other complaint, and then an examination of the mouth is made. The teeth are blamed for the sickness when that cannot be otherwise diagnosed. In "bullnose" or "snuffles" the incisor teeth often cannot properly be used. This is incidental, a result of the disease and not its cause.

Alfalfa For Swine.

The stomach of swine is small, compared with those of other animals, and is not therefore adapted to consuming large quantities of coarse, bulky foods. But it is found that alfalfa hay is relished by swine, and one-half pound a day in addition to a pound of sugar beets and a ration of grain may be fed with profit. In arid regions, where alfalfa and sugar beets are extensively grown, this ration is popular.

It is a matter worthy of note that the average yield of the great staple corn was two bushels more per acre for the whole country in 1910 than in 1909, and this notwithstanding the fact that the seed used in many sections of the northern part of the corn belt last spring was unusually poor.

and young people's societies, whose influences are largely responsible for the moral cleanliness of the town. Our climate during the school year is generally mild and pleasant—just cold enough to install that vigor necessary to a pupil who is to make the best of the time while he is pursuing his studies. On the whole, we believe we have the best school on the South Plains, and we cordially invite any and all who have children to educate, to move into our midst and partake of the superior advantages we offer in this line.

Rules and Regulations.

1. The school is divided into three departments, the Primary, Grammar and High School. The Primary consists of the first, second, third and fourth grades; the Grammar of the fifth, sixth and seventh grades; the High School of the eighth, ninth and tenth grades. All pupils completing these courses will be granted a diploma showing the same.
2. At the end of each consecutive month, the parents shall be furnished with a written report showing the standing of each pupil in his subjects. Said report to not give the pupil credit for more than he has really done. By these means we hope to eliminate all inefficient work.
3. The pupil's final standing in his subjects shall be made by an average between the grades in his daily work and those made on a final examination.
4. There shall be a mid-term examination held during the third week in December. All pupils failing on this examination will be required to pursue the preceding grade for the remainder of the school.
5. Each teacher shall be furnished with a yearly register book, in which shall be recorded in alphabetical order the names of the pupils enrolled in each grade separately. Said record shall show the grade attained by each pupil in all subjects studied during the year.
6. Promotion cards shall be granted to all those who attain the required standard, and no teacher shall make any requirements not herein contained without the consent of the principal.

Principal.

1. The Principal is the executive officer of the Board of Education and shall act under its advice and directions.
2. He shall devote himself to the study of our school system and the conditions of the school, and shall keep himself acquainted with the progress of instruction and organization in other places, in order to assist the Board in legislating wisely for the advancement of the school interests of the city.
3. He shall exercise a constant personal supervision over the school, and see that the rules and regulations are understood and that they are uniformly and faithfully observed and executed.
4. He shall have the power to call and to hold regular and special meetings of the teachers and shall arrange such program for the same as the interests of the school may require.
5. He shall have the power to expell or suspend, with the consent of the Board, any pupil for presistent violation of school regulations, or whenever the example of such pupil is injurious to the school. In such case he shall notify the parents or guardians.
6. He shall fix the time and prescribe the manner for holding all examinations.
7. He shall classify new pupils, but may delegate his authority in special cases. He shall investigate the causes of truancy and irregularity on the part of pupils and suggest such checks and remedies as he may deem feasible and proper.

Teachers.

1. Assistants shall co-operate in every way with the principal in the performance of their duties, as shall best promote the interest of the school. They shall see that their pupils comply with the school regulations, and that their rooms are kept in proper order.
2. They shall discipline as well as teach in their respective rooms.
3. Teachers shall be in their places twenty minutes before school each morning.
4. They shall be careful that no part of the building, furniture or apparatus be defaced or injured, reporting all cases of the same to the principal.
5. Any teacher obliged to be absent on account of sickness, shall cause immediate notice of such absence to be given the principal, who shall summon a substitute.
6. They are expected to keep in close communication with parents or guardians of their pupils, especially in cases where the department of scholarship is unsatisfactory.
7. Teachers will require excuses from parents or guardians of pupils, either in person or by written note, and in all cases of absence or tardiness, they are authorized to send immediately for such excuses when the weather and other circumstances are such as to be detrimental to health.
8. They are expected to exercise a vigilant care over the general conduct and morals of their pupils in the school room, on the play grounds, and as far as possible on their way going to and returning from school.
9. Teachers shall endeavor upon all proper occasions to impress upon the minds of their pupils, the principals of morality, sacred regard for the truth, love of God, love to man, politeness, neatness, industry and frugality. But, no teacher shall exercise any sectarian influence in the school.
10. Written examinations shall be held by the teacher in charge at the close of each month. An average of this examination and the daily class work shall compose the monthly report.

Rules Governing Pupils.

1. Admission:—After school has begun its work proper, no pupil will be admitted only at intervals of eight weeks; except such pupils can show that they are capable of doing the work which their respective classes are carrying. The patrons will see the need of this ruling, when he understands that an entire class is sometimes held back for several lessons by one pupil who is not prepared to do the work in which the class is engaged. This repeated each week would retard all interest that the advanced pupils might have at the time of said pupils intering.
2. Books—Students should be fully supplied with books, stationary, and materials required by course of study before entering upon this work.
3. Absence and Tardiness—Pupils who may be absent or tardy shall bring a written excuse from parents or guardians stating the cause of such absence or tardiness.
4. Truancy—This is a serious offence, and may receive severe punishment. It is to avoid this that we require written excuses from parents or guardians.
5. Department—Pupils must on all occasions be obedient and respectful to their own and all other teachers, whether in the build-
