
Several of our freighters got tied up at Lubbock this week on account of the snow, and it is not expected that they will return until next week.



It is estimated that 2,000,000 apples were on display, while it is conceded by the judges who had the laborious task of awarding the prizes that the quality of the fruit exhibited was the finest that has ever been shown. The grand sweepstakes prize was won by C. H. Sproat of Hood River for a carload of Spitzenburgs, which were given a rating of 997 points out of a possible 1,000; the second prize also went to a Hood river grower on a carload of Newtown pippins, while third prize was awarded a carload of Spitzenburgs from the Yakima valley. The prize winning exhibits were taken by special express to Chicago, where they were exhibited at the land show and were admired by thousands of visitors in the coliseum.

Dairy Doings.

While bran can be used with a decided advantage in making up the rations of the dairy cows, it should not be used to excess, as it will make the cream hard to churn, while the butter will be pale rather than a golden yel-

The purchaser of a bull should select an animal that is a good individual and whose dam and grandam on his sire's side have good butter fat records. His sire must, of course, show the characteristics of the good dairy

Many of the Maine farmers who gave up cows and went into potato growing a few years ago are coming back to cow keeping.

A testing outfit does not cost much, and it pays dividends. A cow that is merely boarding will eat as much as one producing a profit, and the only way to distinguish between the two is through the use of the Babcock test and the scales.

A farmer who has been traveling in Switzerland and Germany noticed that cows were used quite commonly for drawing loads or plowing on the little farms of those countries. He found that the cows could be worked to a moderate extent without much reducing their milk yield, and he suggests that the idea might be practical for small farmers in other countries.

The rule for feeding grain in the University of Wisconsin experiment station dairy herd is to give as many pounds of grain as the cow produces pounds of butter fat per week.

Our Cotton Money.

Our cotton crop last year sold for approximately \$220,000,000 and many of our citizens are under the impression that this money is available for building railroads, factories, opening mines, etc. It is true we exchange our cotton for gold but and on the road to recovery. while producing the cotton, we consume all our cereals and ship in \$75,000,000 worth of feed stuff from other States. The Texas Grain Dealer's Association conducted especially for this article, an exhaustive investigation into our cereal consumption. The production column is taken from he Federal Agricultural Department reports and the figures in the consumed column were furnished by the Grain Dealer's Association:

Experimental Farms.
