CASE COMPROMISED.

All Parties Pleased and Powel Passes Out Good CIgars

With the smoking by the entire court and the entire male population of Brownfield and a part of the surrounding country of good cigars, compliments of John S. Powell, the celebrated "Sheep case," the Eirst National Bahk of Portales vs. Roy Beal et al., was brought to a final close Saturday night at 9 o'clock, by the entry of an agreed judge ment, after a legal battle lasting three days and three night ses sions.
The judgement entered provided that the sheep be entirely released from ony liens, the de. fendants, Walker \& Powell, covering nothing by reason o any damages sustained by the
leavy or costs by reason of the care of the sheed while in the hands of the officers. Judge ment against Roy Beal for the amount of the debt due the bank and against him on his cross action for damages.

## Some Irregation.

Plainview, Texas, Nov. 14th. One of the most attractive pro jects in tbe State will be advanc ed in this section. The Callahan tract, which is situated nea here, comprising eighteen thous and acres, is to be the scene of operation. It is the plan of the company owning this land to have the work of drilling the wells for irrigation well unde way within sixty days. The com pany's engineers are now sur reying the tract, which will be cut into forty-acre farms. Their plan is to have roads running east and west one-half mile apart and north and south one mile apart.
It is the intention of the company to locate an experimental farm of 160 acres near the center of the tract. Forty acres of this will be in charge of an ex pert from the United States De partment of Agriculture, who will demonstrate the productive possibilities of a forty-acre farm when cultivation is carried on along scientific lines.
