





Parasites on Hogs.

There are very few herds of hogs that do not suffer from parasites-exbest when bothered with lice or worms, but comparatively few think that these pests may seriously affect profits. They may not affect profits are not present in excessive numbers. The herd may go on for years without being seriously affected by them, but a come when they will infest the little pigs to such an extent that the loss will be plain. It pays to be always on the watch for these little "profit eaters" and do something to get rid of them when they are found. Preventive measures are always best to control

Ration For Dairy Cows. We believe that the following combination of feed will make as economical and as good a ration as could be suggested, says Hoard's Dairyman. Let each animal have daily thirty pounds silage, eight to ten pounds clover hay and corn stover ad libitum. A mixture consisting of 400 pounds corn chop, 200 pounds bran and 200 pounds gluten feed will supplement this roughage very well. Eight pounds should be sufficient for the production of one pound of butter fat or one pound for each three and one-half to four pounds of milk.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Providing for an Issue of Bonds by the State for the Purpose of Con-Struction of Highways.

House Joint Resolution No. 13. A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Section 49, Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the power to create debts by or on behalf of the State so as hereafter to authorize the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary directing the Gov-ernor of the State to issue bouds in a sum not to exceed \$75,000,000; providing for the levy of a tax to create the necessary interest and sinking fund therefor; and providing that the proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be used in the construction of durable, hard surfaced roads upon the public high-ways of the State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. Amend said Section so

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Permitting Prisoners to Share in the Net Proceeds From the Penitentiary System

House Joint Resolution No. 38. Proposing an amenument to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section thereto to be kn. wn as section 60; providing that the Legislature shall have power to enact laws au-thorizing a division of the net prothorizing a division of the net pro-ceeds arising from the operation of the prison system of this State be-tween the State and prisoners con-fined in the Penitentary or their dependents; providing for the sub-to a vote of the people, and making mission of a proposed amendment an appropriation to defray the ex-

enses of such election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature

of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Fricle 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 60

Section 60. The Legislature shall have power to authorize a division of the net profits arising from the operation of the prison system during any one fiscal year between the State of Texas and the prisoners confined in the Penitentiary during said fiscal year or any part thereof, or their dependents in the property of the profits of the prison system during the p or their dependents in such porpor-tion as the Legislature may deter-mine, not to exceed fifty (50) per cent to such prisoners or their de-

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qual diffied electors of the State for its adoption or rejection, at a special election hereby ordered for the 4th day of November, 1919. 
