BIG MILL AND CRUSHER NOW BEING INSTALLED.

Probably the Largest and Best Machinery of the Kind on the South Plains.

There are few towns in the State the size of Brownfield that sport as large grist and feed mill as that now being installed here. The machinery, which consists of a large 35 bushel per hour mill, a husker and sheller combined, a big capacity crusher, and plenty of elevators, boilers etc. The mill, which requires the service of a large engine to generate its full capacity, is equipped with genuine French burrs, and will make meal of first class quality, as it has proved at Gomez for the last few years. The engine is brand new, having just arrived from the International Harvester Agency at Kansas City, and is of 15 h. p. capacity. The crusher and husker-sheller, in fact the whole business is very nearly new, and when installed which will require something like a week, a farmer can get his load of feed crushed and a sack of corn made into meal while waiting. Everything will be so conveniently arranged that it will be

possible to drive up and throw feed from the wagon right into the crusher and sheller.

The little outfit put in early in the fall, soon played out for several reasons, the main ones being lack of capital, inadequate machinery and an inexperienced miller and mechanist. All of these drawbacks has been fully eliminated as the owners of this outfit, the Brownfield Hardware Co. have capital, large and first class machinery, and there is no better mechanist in West Texas than H. H. Longbreak, or a better miller than Uncle Horace or Will Adams; so this enterprise is a sure go.

The name of the new mill is the Terry County Mill & Feed Co., and they not only cater for the trade of Terry County citizens, but ask the farmers of neighboring counties to come in and give them a trial. Their capacity is almost unlimited. More about this mill when in running condition

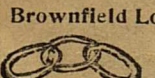

once before, the other kind hiked for the tall timber two years ago. Our good farmers know full well that the possibility to farm with minimum rainfall, is no more applicable in the civilized world than in Terry county. From all records obtained by actual experience and otherwise, it has been fully demonstrated that a crop will grow and thrive in Terry county, when properly cultivated, when they would burn up in most other countries. This is easily explained as our soils are loose and mellow is very attentive of moisture and with the aid of subsoil that holds water like a jug, and our long, cool nights, we have an ideal country to deal in experiments.

In fact our possibilities are so many; failures so few, and results so remunerative, our farmers have gotten so they take hold of any new cereals, vegetables or fruit, known to temperate climates with a feeling that they are bound to succeed, knowing their soil as they do. The splendid rains during the late fall and winter, combined with at least seven snows have brought on a general wave of pre-future prosperity. It is hard to talk to our farmers five minutes without a mention of the 1912 crops and our only hope of the future lies in the tillers of the soil as they hold the rein of prosperity to our united government.

When our Fair Association gets ready to assign to this and that farmer the responsibility of rearing this or that plant, they are going to find a willing and a cooperative spirit. Such will ultimately lead old Terry to the front.

Mr. A. J. Herrington, manager for R. G. Dun & Co. mercantile agency, with headquarters at Amarillo, was in our city last week seeing what the boys were worth. When the editor complained that our sanctum and contents were not worthy to grace the pages of R. G.'s book, he informed us that he found a world of such complaints from all kinds of proprietors, and that he believed our financial rating would have congenial company.

Rainy winters, they say, are good indicators of good crops the following year. If the above is reliable, and we have no reason for doubts, we had just as well be building additional storage capacity for the crop in Terry county next fall.

Percy Noodles says that while he is especially fond of female society and likes to keep that sect at close proximity, from what he can glean from Dame Gossip and D. A. M. Rumor, he has no hankering for Miss Minnie Gitis to lodge at his boarding house.

Many of our townsmen would resent the idea that they were any relation to the Arkansaw Traveler's man who didn't need his house "civered" in beautiful weather and couldn't do so in bad weather. No they have nothing

in common with him. Yet they favor this fabled Arkansaw philosopher like a twin brother. When the street are wet and the mud seems bottomless, they can not then be fixed, but said citizen can stand and cuss himself and the other fellow blue, and wish for the kicking machine advertised by the Schnapps tobacco outfit. But when the weather clears up its "oh! what lovely streets we have; we don't need any side-walks." Well we can wade as long as any of you.

Before long it will be time to call together a representative body of farmers by the fair association to ascertain as far as possible what plant, cereal or vegetable each are willing to specialize. When we say "representative" we include nearly the entire farming and stock-farming population of Terry county, because they are all good. As we said

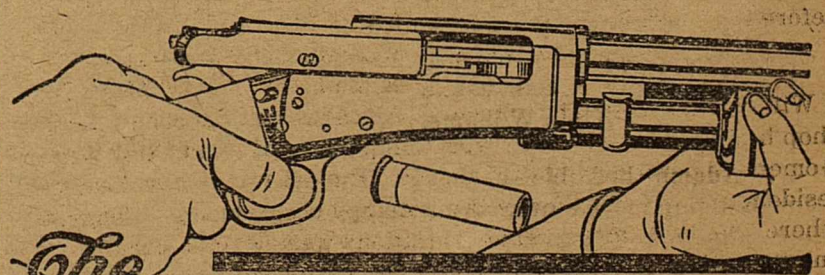

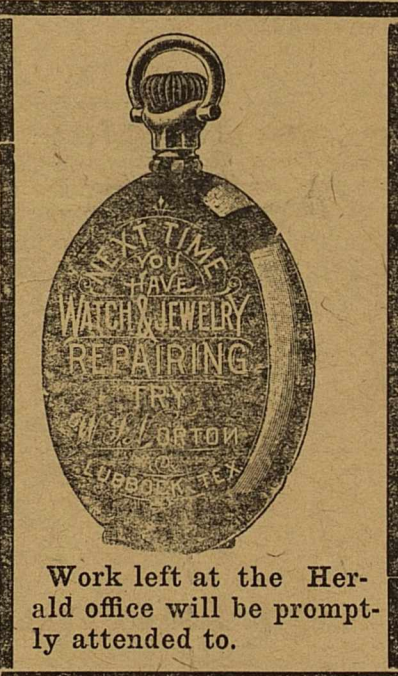
