Judge Neill: I am now in a position to write and give you some information on the road question. Forty men and thirty teams left Roswell last week to build clay road across sands, forty miles east of Roswell, on this side of Cap rock. Commissioners think the road can be finished in 90 days. We are also busy working on auto road from Dodge Kans. to Plainview, thence to Roswell, and also one from some point on the Texas & Pacific R. R. to Roswell and thence to El Paso. Now you had better get your two counties, (Yoakum and Terry) together and see what you can do to get these two lines to make Brownfield the junction point.

I am not familiar with your road conditions in Terry and Yoakum counties, but it seems a good point for these proposed auto lines to meet. The one from Dallas and Fort Worth would leave T. & P. at say Sweetwater or Colorado City. Mr. Joe Rhea of Roswell, will go to Kansas City to meet an agent and come back over the route from Dodge City to Plainview; thence to Roswell and from Roswell to El. Paso. Mr. Rhea will go next week.

These Trans-Continental auto lines will mean much to any town, so I write that you people may know what we are doing at this end of the line.

Every precaution is being taken to prevent a spread, and the local druggist are doing a land office business with preventives, sprays, disinfectants etc.

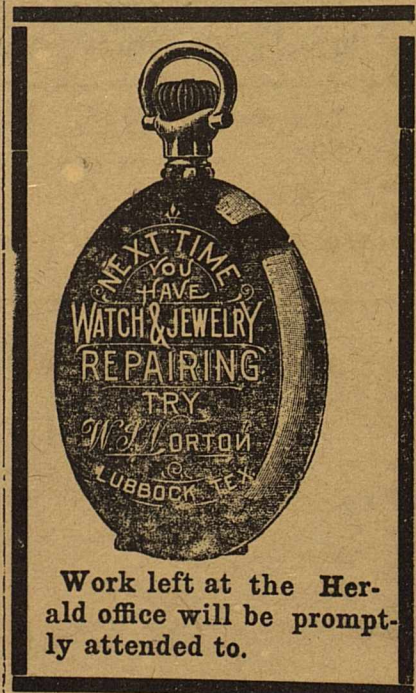

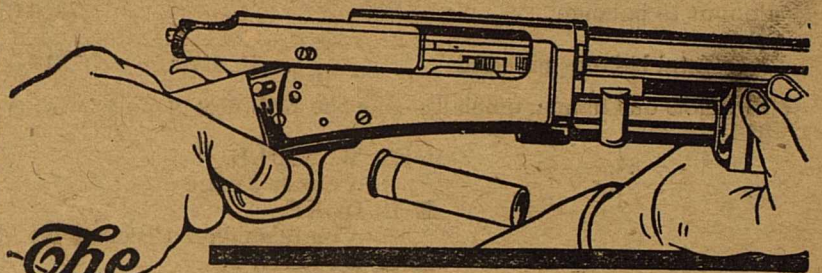
