Five Months Of Progress

From Jan. 1st to June 1st of
Hustling at Lubbock.

A little over five months ago we were in Lubbock for a few days, and during that short space of time the change for the better has almost been magical in some directions. In the place of aches the Merc block now sports three modern one story bricks with basement, and each are occupied by that many up-to-date firms with up-to-date goods. In the place of a rat row of modern shacks on the post office block, a great big, imposing two story brick has suddenly risen, the lower floor to be occupied by mercantile establishments and the post office. The second story will be fixed up for a first class hotel of 50 rooms. In place of shaky old ocean wave side walks, we found the real engineered 16 feet concrete walks, sewer connection, a good system of water works with fire plugs. We found the Avalanche one block South of the square in its own building which stands on its own lot. We understand that Radford Grocery Co. will commence building a large brick for their wholesale grocery and will put in a cold storage plant. This department will greatly aid us in procuring fresh fruits and vegetables.

We found all our old standby firms, such as the Grain & Coal Company, Western Windmill Co., R. A. Rankins & Sons, Red Cross Pharmacy, John P. Lewis & Co., Simeon O'Neal etc doing a rattling good business considering the time of year, dull business, etc, and are receiving a good trade from Terry County.

New Methodist Church.

S. S. Ramsey, one of Tahoka's contractors, is drawing plans this week for a Methodist church to be erected at Plains, the county seat of Yoakum county. The A. G. McAdams Lumber Co of Tahoka, has the contract to fill the bill for the lumber.

The people of Plains have two plans before them and have not as yet decided which one to use. One plan calls for a plain 36x48 foot building and the other plan calls for a 38x40 foot building 14x20 foot projection in front and an 8x20 foot one in the rear. —Lynn County News.

The building committee has adopted the first mentioned plan in the foregoing article. —Yoakum Co. News.

From Lamar Arkansas.

I believe I promised to write you on my arrival here, which was 4 p. m. 29th.

I have been looking for and am very anxious for a paper from home. We left Lindsey, Okla. 1-30 p. m. Tuesday 28th for this place. From there by Pauls Valley to Shawnee Okla., and just here I didn't see any country along the line to Shawnee after leaving the Washita Valley that I would give 12 cents for as a farming country, however that section is about the worst part of Okla. Pauls Valley is a fine fertile valley, the first crops of Alfalfa is all put up and a great deal being shipped. Corn and cotton is later than usual as the spring was so wet and cold, but the people there are getting very anxious for rain now; getting a little dry and as the old adage goes, "a burned child dreads the fire" and that valley is literally burned up, not a flat grain of corn raised in the valley last year. All the money going out of the country for feed and provision and people say if a crop failure this year the bankers, merchant's and farmers, will all be crippled together, and it's about the history of all Oklahoma. Banks are drained about to the limit and farmers as a rule have about exhausted their security.

This Ark., is a little better. A fine strawberry crop has been marketed. (shipped) and has brought pretty good revenue (cash) and now preparations are being made for shipping the enormous Elberta peach crop, which is the largest ever known. They figure 500 cars from this point and 1000 cars from Clarksville, the county seat of Johnson Co. This will begin about the middle of July, and say Mr. Editor there will be a chance for the writer to get a job provided he is here and don't get to lazy to work.

Cotton and corn is very backward here, only a very few pieces that look good to me, a great deal was planted over and some not up to a good stand yet. The fields look small to me and it seems the hills has gotten closer together.

We went fishing yesterday evening (about 4 miles) and stayed most all night. The result: we had a nice mess of cat fish for breakfast.

I have been busy shaking hands with relatives and friends and am eating three square meals per day and everybody treats us like somebody come. You know how it is when you go back home.

We will go to our old home

(Pope Co.) pretty soon. There we will meet the rest of our relatives and friends (what is not dead or moved away) We are enjoying our visit so far very much and if I keep fattening I will be able to tie up in a scrap or foot race with you when I get back. People here say that I have not gotten old at all and I don't believe I have.

Will write you again from some point of my home country.

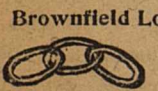

MILLIONAIRES MADE RAPIDLY IN TEXAS

ONE EVERY TWO DAYS RECORD OF FATHER TIME.

PER CAPITA WEALTH GAINS

Father time, single handed, has been making millionaires of the Texas property owners at the rate of one every two days (or its equivalent) and his mint is running along with increased momentum. Our population during the past decade has shown an increase of 27 per cent and our assessed wealth an increase of 152 per cent. No more forceful evidence of progress and prosperity can be produced than the above comparison and it speaks the dialect of every nation.

Rev. Williams of Gomez attended church here Sunday. He announced that he would preach at the J-Cross school house on the fourth Sunday in this month.

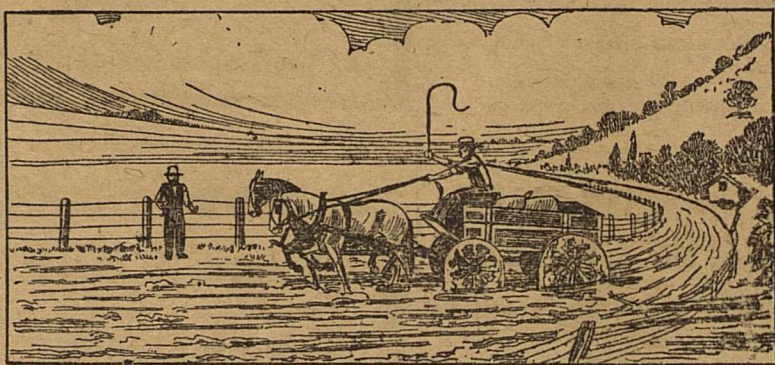

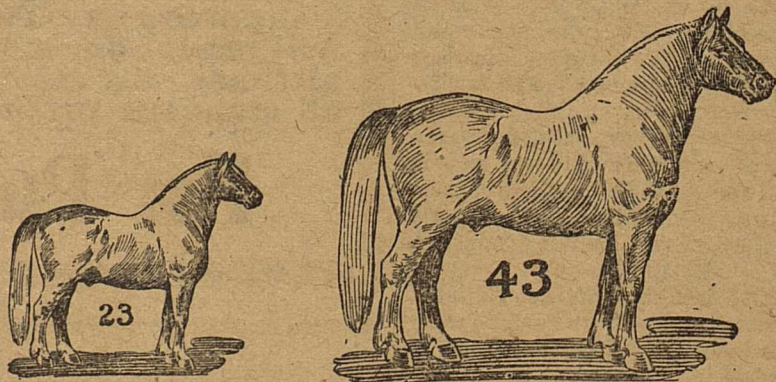


A BAD ROAD.
