Snodgrass has extra good barn mprovements for the Plains country, but he will never lose by that. He has three jacks one old one he has had a long time, and two young ones, two and three years old. He made a trip to Tennessee after the oldest and raised the other one Both are dark and of the mam mouth variety and will easily measure 151.2 hands when
grown; Are smooth and per ectly proportioned. He has three jennets of the same breed the two oldest being 15 hands high, and a young one we believe will go much above when grown Then there is Chabber, a fine lack percheon, whose fine hair vell cut lines and gentle dispo sition betray his thoroughbred acestery. On this ranch are many colts and two years old from just ordinary mares that are going to bring good money Mr. Snodgrass and sons have more than 100 mares, but disease known as pinkeye go amongst them this spring and
they lost altogether about forty they lost altogether about forty
colts and came very near loosing a fine jack. We sat upon a tank dam covered by a luxurant growth of burmuda grass and eviewed this fine bunch of mares as they came to water and when you think this is an ordinary West Texas bunch of broncho mares you are off your kazoot. With the exception of few Mexico mares, they are all smooth, well bred and large enough, and to show you that heir mules have the ok brand on them, they are already sold or $\$ 65$ around to be delivered at weaning time. Mr. Snodgrass does not buy scrub, mares, but when a good one is offered for sale, he is in the market. His daughter at Floydada, also has a nice interest in this ranch
In many ways this is the most teresting ranch in Terry county as the main object is better stock as well as more stock. They have a good farm in connection that is well farmed so that a nice assortment of home grown feed is always on hand, and we must not forget to mention that a splendid orchard and a barnyard full of domestic owls grace the ranch making ore homelike and toothsome.

Tothe Farmers of Texas
The recent rains have been of ncalculable value to the State, but great as this value is, it can be wonderfully increased if every farmer will get into his field just as soon as the top of the ground is dry enough to pulverize properly, and by using a sweep or a very short tooth harrow, that will cut not more than one inch or an inch and a half deep, and. make a soft cusinion or mulch on top of the soil, the major part of this moisture can be conserved for the use of the crop, instead of being pumped out by myriads of small pores or tubes that operate actively like so many steam jets, when the suface of the ground is hard. If this character of cultivation is repeated just as often as the condition of the top soil indicates the necessity for this work, splendid crops can be made with the moisture that is already in the soil, in all sections where there was anything like a good rain-fall. Do not lay your crops by, but continue this shallow cultivation that will put air into the soil, keep the weeks down and prevent the loss of moisture y this pumping process
