# Postal Saving System.

#### Information for Depositors.

The Postal Saving System is established for the purpose of providing facilities for depositing savings at interest with the security of the United States Government for repayment.

2. The faith of the United States is solemnly pledged to the payment of deposits made in postal savings depository offices with accrued interest as provided by the postal-savings act.

3. Accounts may be opened and deposits made by any per son of the age of 10 years or over in his or her own name and by a married woman in her own name and free from any interference or control by her husband. No person can have more than one account at any one time.

4. No person may open a postal-savings account at any post office who is not a patron of that office.

5. All accounts must be opened in person by the depositor or his authorized representative. After opening an account a depositor may forward subseqneut deposits to the post office by mail. 6- Deposits will be accepted only from individuals, and no account will be opened in the name of any corporation, association, society, firm, or partnership, or in the names of two or more persons jointly.

TO PREVENT SOIL BLOWING

Planting of Windbreake Will Temper Force of Winds and Prevent Loss of Much Land.

The older a country becomes and the drier the season is, the greater is the danger of the wind blowing away the best part of the soil. The windier e country, and the less timber and hedge rows and windbreaks there are the greater the danger of blowing, says Wallace's Farmer. There is not much danger of it when a new prairie scd is broken up, because the vegeta-ble fiber holds the soil together in a surprising way. There is not much danger when the land is well supplied with vegetable matter through the application of manure or in any other way. The danger increases with the absence of windbreaks and with the decrease of vegetable matter in the soil through continual cultivation. The danger is always greater when the surface of the land is smooth, as after it has been rolled or grain has been harrowed in rather than disked. This will indicate the best method of prevention. We are told that there are large areas in Canada where the land has been farmed a number of years, where a warranty deed, no matter by whom given, will not hold the land. The same condition of things will exist in the newly settled west, particularly in the semi-arid section, if the land is given over continuously to the cultivation of crops. A good soil contains only about two per cent. of vegetable matter, and when this is reduced to one per cent., which will certainly be the case if a rational system of farming is not al-lowed, these soils will blow when there is a wind. Hence the remedy is: Keep your soil in some way as full of vegetable matter as it was when the raw prairie was first broken up. Plant windbreaks. We were greatly impressed thirty years ago with the difference in the force of the winds in the adjoining counties of Madison and



the winds and prevent soil blowing. Next, avoid leaving a smooth surface for the winds to blow over. In these sections no roller which leaves the land smooth should be used for any purpose, unless immediately followed by the harrow. In sections in any part of the country where blowing is to be anticipated, the broadcast seeder should never be used, but always the drill, thus leaving the surface rough, and in a measure preventing blowing. The main thing, how-ever, is to keep the soil plentifully supplied with vegetable matter, which can be done only by the adoption of a rotation.

State of Texas. SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be

amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 5. Cities having more than five Will Mathis was in town one thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance pass ed under said charter shall contain any provisions inconsistent with the Constituti n of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one half per cent of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annualy a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund of at least two per cent thereon; and provided further, that no city charter shall shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than

every two years. Sec. 2. The ( The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be held in this State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State. At such election, those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to section 5 Article II, of the constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people:" the e opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Agains a mendment to Section 5; Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people." The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much as is necessary is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas out of moneys not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of the publi tion of this amendment and the proclamtion of the election.




EVE'S FAVORITE BECOMES GOLD IN TEXAS PROGRESS.

### LARGEST ORCHARDS HERE

The fig was the early companion of man. Its leaves furnished the initial garments for our first ancestors, its fruit nourished early civilization and its foliage has shaded and sheltered man and beast since the beginning of time.

It has had more free advertising than any other fruit in the vegetable kingdom. It figured conspicuously in the episode that resulted in closing the Garden of Eden, the Savior used it in a parable and it is closely woven in ancient legends and in the history of nations. To mention the fig leaf makes mankind smile and to mention the fruit makes the whole world hungry.

It is the most sensational, romantic and popular of fruits. It threads its way through the literature of the world. It is a favorite with the sculptor and the painter; it is one of the most useful of medicines, and with the consumer it is the most popular fruit on the market The soil, climate and altitude of the coast country for one hundred miles inland is especially adapted to the hardy growth of the tree and the perfect maturity of the fruit and the skillful horticulturist has developed varities especially adapted to natural conditions. It responds generously to kind treatment, makes few demands upon its owner, its yield is reliable and abundant and the tree shows remarkable business instinct in making Texas its domicile. The fig is the pioneer of Texas fruits and the numerous races of the tree have explored most every section of the State, but it has more thickly populated the coast country than any other part of Texas. According to the Texas Almanac we have 3,710 acres now in commercial fig orchards on the coast country and the planting of an additional thousand acres is under contract. Galveston County leads in fig culture, having 1,225 acres. The largest fig orchards in the world are located in this county. The farm value of the annual output of one acre of bearing figs averages \$250 SEC. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much and the total value of the annual Texas output approximates \$1,000,000.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTI-TUTION AUTHORIZING CITIES OF MORE THAN 5000 INHABITANTS TO ADOPT THEIR CHARTERS BY House Joint Resolution proposing an amend- provisions of this resolution. cate o each certificate issued, w ic 1 the depositor will be required to sign and which the postmaster will retain in his records.

12. No account may be opened for less than \$1, nor will fractions of a dollar be accepted for deposit.

13. No person is permitted to deposit more than \$100 in any one calendar month nor to have a total balance to his credit at one time of more than \$500 exclusive of accumulated interest.

14. Saving certificates can not be transfered or negotiated and will be payable only to the person to whom issued.

15. On opening an account a depositor is supplied with an envelope in which he may keep his savings certificates. On this envelope is printed information for his guidance, and also a blank ledger record on which to keep an account of his deposits and withdawals.

16. In case a savings certificate is lost or destroyed the depositor should notify the postmaster. If deemed proper, a new certificate will be issued upon compliance by the depositor with the necessary requirements.

17. Postmasters are not permitted to receive savings certifi cates for safe-keeping.

18. Amounts less than \$1 may be saved for deposit by the purchase of 10-cent postal-savings cards and adhesive 10 cent postal savings stamps. Each postalsavings card contains blank spaces to which savings stamps may be affixed from time to time as purchased, and a postal-savings card with nine 10 cent savings stamps thus affixed will be accepted as a deposit of \$1 either in opened an account or in adding to an existing account.

19. Savings cards and stamps will be redee med only by the issue of savings certificates and are not valid for postage. They will not be received in exchange for postage stamps nor will postage stamps be accepted in ex change for postal-savings cards or stamps.

20. Interest will be allowed on all deposits at the rate of 2 per cent per annum, computed on each savings certificate separately, and payable annually. No interest will be paid on money which remains on deposit for a f action of a year only.

21. Deposits will bear interest



from the 1st day of the month next following that in which deposited.

22, Interest will continue to accrue on a savings certificate ing, certificates being valid until identity, will then make paypaid, without limitation as to time.

23. Compound interest is not allowed on an outstanding certiticate, but a depositor may withdraw interest payable and inrate.

24. A cepositor may at any time withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits to his credit continuously on deposit. with any interest payable by surrendering saving,s certificates, properly indorsed, for the amount desired.
