

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION CREATING THE OFFICE OF PRISON COMMISSIONER AND MAKING THE TERM OF OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF PRISON / COMMISSIONER SIX YEARS

(H. J. R. No. 22.) HOUSE JOINT RESOLU-TION

XVI of the State Constitution by adding therelo Section 58, creating the office of Prison Commissioners, and making the term of office of the members of the Board of Prison Commissioner


Section 58, (Art/cle XVI·) The Board of Prison Commissioners charged by law with the control and management of the State prisons, shall be composed of three members appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office shall be six years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified; provided that the terms of office of the Board of Prison Commissioners appointed after the adoption of this amendment shall begin on January 20th of the year follow ing the adoption of this amendment, and shall aold office as follows; One shall serve two years, one fours, and one six years. terms to be decided by lot after they shall have qualited, and one Prison Commissioner shall be appointed every two years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of this State shall fill said vacancy by appointm ent for the unexpired term thereof.

SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots"For a six years' term for Prison Commissioners" and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have writien or printed on their ballots "Against a six years' term for Prison Commissioners"

SEC. 3. The sum of three thousand dollars (3,000), or so much thereof as may be necess. A Joint resolution proposing to amend Article ary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of the Governor's proclamation submitting this proposed amendment.



pable of living in dry atmosphere without undue transpiration of water. The cactus is an example of great drought accompanied by his little son, resistance. Plants with small leaf surface are less likely to suffer in a dry climate. Early maturity enables the plant to mature its seed before the pinch of drought overtakes it. Generally, early maturing varieties are best suited to a dry climate. Deep rooting habits are more favorable than a superficial root system. Alfalfa and other deep rooting plants avail themselves of moisture at great depths and ble results, all agreed that a may even find perennial success in subterranean water. Such plants are least affected by the drying out of the surface soil. Plants that remain-dormant during drought and do not die, but start into growth with new supplies of moisture, are of great advantage.


Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Coustitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known and designated as "30a," and to read as follows:

Section 30. The Legislature may provide by law that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees or managers of the educational, eleemosynary and penal institutions of the State, and such Doards as have been, or may hereafter be establish-d by law may hold their respective offices News habit and you wont quit members of such boards to be elected or appointed every two "2" years in such manner as the Legislature may determine; vacancies in such offices to be filled as may be provided by law," and the Legislature shall enact suitable laws to give effect to this section.

The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for the members of the Legis lature, at the next general election to be held in this State, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots 'For the amenement of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law." 





AND DISABLED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS AND THEIR WIVES.

(S. J. R. No.9) Senate Joint Resolution

Senate Joint Resolution to amend Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as tn authorize the grant of aid to indigent and disabled Confederate Soldiers and sallors and their widows, ond to soldiers who servee in the minitia and in organizations for the protection of the froatier and their indigent widows, and to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of ahome for the indigent and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors, and such women as aided the Confederacy, authorize a special ad va'orem pension tax, and making appropriations for same Belt enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

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ARTICLE 3 Section 51. The legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or corporation whatsoever; provided however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who come to Texas prior to January 1, 1900. and their widows in indigent circumstances, and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1, 1900; war between the States served for a period of at least six monnhs in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican mauraders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas, who


