PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE-CONSTITUTION CREATING THE OFFICE OF PRISON COMMISSIONER AND MAKING THE TERM OF OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF PRISON COMMISSIONER SIX YEARS

(H. J.R. No. 22.) HOUSE JOINT RESOLU-FION.

A Joint resolution proposing to amend Article XVI of the State Constitution by adding therelo Section 58, creating the office of Prison Com-missioners, and making the term of office of the members of the Board of Prison Commissioner six years, and making an appropriation. Be it resolved by the Legis lature of the



ment of the State prisons. shall be composed of three members appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office shall be six years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified; provided that the terms of office of the Board of Prison Commissioners appointed after the adoption of this amendment shall begin on January 20th of the year follow ing the adoption of this amendment, and shall aold office as follows; One shall serve two years, one fours, and one six years. terms to be decided by lot after they shall have qualited, and one Prison Commissioner shall be appointed every two years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of this State shall fill said vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term thereof.

SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is here by directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "For a six years' term for Prison Commissioners" and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have writien or printed on their ballots "Against a six years' term for Prison Commissioners"

SEC. 3. The sum of three thousand dollars (3.000), or so much thereof as may be necess ary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of the Governor's proclamation submitting this prooosed amendment.



of hogs has a great deal to do with the price they will bring.

Because sheep have warm coats, it does not follow that they can be exposed to wet and storms.

When the boar pigs are about 5 months old they should be separated from the rest of the herd.

A field of sweet corn sown broadcast in June will make fine feed in the fall, as the pigs are extremely fond of it.

When a hog reaches 200 pounds in weight it requires extra good care and an expert feeder to continue to lay on flesh at a profit.

A check rein is unnecessary cruelty. For the horse that occasions trouble by reaching down after grass or corn, try a muzzle, but leave his head free.

The pullet is the best layer.

Iron in some form makes a good tonic.

Why not try a small piece of alfalia next spring?

It's hard to make a man believe he owns a poor cow.

Alfalfa and clover are the best dry feeds there are for the cow.

Use the milk pails and cans for no other purpose than to hold milk.

Cover the rhubarb plants now with plenty of coarse but rich stable manure.
