Pieplant is easily produced in a commercial way, yields immensely, and is easily gathered and put into shape for the market. It can be shipped almost any distance. Then, too, the demand for it on the market makes it one of the two best vegetables for commercial use. Pieplant is usually set in rows four feet apart and two and one-haif feet in the rows. Like asparagus it should be carefully tended and heavily manured. It should be fertilized every winter.

Will Return Profit. The preparation for conserving

barnyard manure entails some expense and labor but all such expenditures will return a margin of profit commensurate with the outlay.





OUR INDUSTRIAL NEEDS

\$500,000,000 Wanted for Cotton Mills--Needed Factories Will Cost Billion Dollars

Texas is a great State. We do not fully realize the immensity of our resources. No one has ever yet announced a true conception of the greatness of Texas. The fact of the matter is, we try to measure Texas with a yardstick and the mind becomes confused in a maze of calculations without gaining the faintest conception of the State's great-

Our cotton crop (our money crop) is practically consumed in produc-tion and if the gross receipts of our cotton crop of the past decade were available for investments, it would not build and operate the factories necessary to manufacture the raw material now produced on the farm. An intelligent basis of calculation is necessary in order to approximately estimate our capital needed for factory investment. The latest Federal Census report on manufacturing gives the capital invested in cotton mills in the United States at \$605,-100,154 and the factories used \$282,-047,648 in raw material during the year. From this record, we develop the general rule that it requires two dollars of capital to manufacture one dollar's worth of cotton and to build the cotton mills necessary to manufacture the cotton we raise in Texas would require \$500,000,000. Then there is our timber, our livestock and other materials and Texas is only one-fifth deleveloped in agriculture, to say nothing of the rave material produced in other states and countries, which pass through our ports in search of the foreign factory, all of which should be manufactured in | Texas, will require at least a billion dollars to build the factories needed at the present time in this State and then there are our minerals sleeping undisturbed, to make no mention of our railroad mileage, public highways, industrial enterprises and new cities and improved farms which will be necessary to our growth. To develop Texas during the present century will require an immediate investment of ten billions and when we have realized that this is a most conservative statement, which every man who studies the situation closely is bound to conclude, then we are ready to stand at our Sunday by Rev. Brownwood, Texas. Oct. 8-Mr. Will H. Mayes, who will in gold. preside over the upper house of the 33rd legislature, is an ardant advocate of the co-operation of the press with state government in the development of our

Mr. Mayes, in a recent address

mourn his death and a host of before the Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, said:

> "The Texas press has lead every movement for progress that the state has made during the past quarter of a century, and whatever the evils of our government may be, publicity is the cure. The movement for good roads would have died in its infancy had it not been for the press of the State.

> "A few years ago when it looked as if the entire state would be eventually planted continuously in cotton, the press begun to teach diversification, until now nearly every farmer is a diversifier.

> "Until the press took up the campaign for civic improvment, but little has been done in Texas to improve conditions in cities.

> "The Commercial Secretaries owe their success to the cooperation of the press.'

> Continuing his discussion of the press, Mr. Mayes said: "Do you realize, gentleman, that in newspaper offices in every section of this nation, Texas papers in their respective classes are regarded as the highest type of American journalism? when that is said it means the highest type of journalism in the world, for the American press leads the world."

Mr. Mayes is editor of the Brownwood Bulletin, and former president of the National Editorial Association, and his editorials are more widely quoted throughout the press of the state than those of any other

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TEXAS LIGNITE

Cheap and Abundant Fuel.—30,000,000,000 tons on Deposit.

In a report issued by Prof. W. B. Phillips, Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology, some interesting data is given on the fuels of Texas. The lignite fields of the State probably extend over 60,000 square miles, so the pamblet states and the spirited examples. phlet states, and the original supply of this fuel lying beneath our sur-face is estimated at 30,000,000,000 tons. As the amount taken from the earth so far amounts to only a small per cent, the supply of this fuel need occasion no anxiety for the next thousand years or so. Every known variety of lignite has been found in Texas, from a material carrying but a few per cent of fixed carbon to nearly 45 per cent and with from 30 per cent of volatile and combustible matter to more than 76 per cent. The beds of this fuel run from 15 feet and more in thickness to depts of 400 to 600 feet. The counties in which workable beds of lignite occur are Anderson, Angelina, Atascosa, Bastrop, Bowie, Brewster, Caldwell, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Dimmitt, Fayette, Freestone, kee, Dimmitt, Fayette, Freestone, Grimes, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Houston, Jasper, Lee, Leon, Limestone, McMullen, Marion, Medina, Milam, Morris, Nacogdoches, Newton, Panola, Rains, Robertson, Rusk, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt, Webb, Wood and Zavalla. In a general way, workable lignite is found in all that part of Texas lying east of the 97th meridian of west east of the 97th meridian of west longitude and north of the 31st degree of north latitude, but there are a few important areas outside of these boundaries.

The average value of the lignite mined in Texas in 1910 at the mines was 96 cents, the production having been 979,232 tons, the largest in the listory of the State.

It may be accepted as a fact that there is enough lignite beneath the surface of Texas to run our engines, supply our factories and provide fuel for heating purposes for several centuries to come.

The University of Texas is using lignite for running the power house of that institution, a Texas rail-road is using it for fuel, and Texas lignite bids fair to become universally used as a fuel during the next decade.
