





This being true, why will southern farmers and their wives and children work in large cotton fields in the heat and cold for about 300 days cheap cotton to pay for high-priced corn, bacon, lard, mules, and other the universe. The too exclusive culture of cotton has forced the price of cotton far below an equitable one and established the credit system. As long as southern farmers raised their supplies at picture shows and one cannot home there was no overproduction of cotton and no necessity for the credit system. 


