
Compensation of Employees for Casualties Occuring in Course of Employment.



THE TEXAS CASUALTY LIST IS APPROXIMATELY 9,000 PER ANNUM.

There is no responsibility resting more heavily upon civilization than the care of those injured while turning the wheels of progress and the maintenance of those dependent upon employees icilled in the pursuit of industry. There are killed during a year 350 people and 8,650 injured while in the employ of business and our industries bear a personal injury burden of a half million dollars per annum and it is reliably estimated that one-half of this amount goes to the damage-suit lawyers.

The Texas Welfare Commission will consider the subject of compensation to employees for casualties occurring in course of employment and Tom Finty, Jr., of Dallas, is chairman of the committee having the subject under consideration.

The Commissioners Court at its meeting this week ordered an election to be held in this county on Saturday, the 15th day of February, that the people may vote on the question of local option under the new law.-Yoakum County News.

We have never heard an election mentioned in Terry county, for the reason we never have any violations of the local option law, and a law with a jail sentence, or an election therefor, would only be an unnecessary expense. However, when the railroads come, and the bootlegger with it, as usual, Terry county people stand ready to take advantage of the new law for protection. But as long as we have our present citizenship, we have no more use for a penal law than a hog has for a sidesaddle. Come to Terry.

HEALTHY OUARTERS FOR PIGS

Animals Affected With Rheumatism Generally Become Unthrifty—Keep Houses Thoroughly Dry.

Rheumatism is commonly caused by allowing hogs to sleep in damp, filthy and improperly ventilated quarters The system of ventilation should be such that there will be no direct currents of air striking the animals. The sun should have free access to the houses at all times. This will keep the sleeping quarters in a dry, sani-tary condition. When affected with rheumatism, ment floor, false wooden floors should be provided, especially in the sleeping apartment of the building.

Other treatment is of little avail if comfortable sanitary quarters are not provided.

Wheat Shorts for Young Pigs. I hardly think there is any feed superior to wheat shorts for young pigs, says a writer in an exchange. A mixture of wheat shorts and finely ground corn chops, half and half, soaked in water for 12 hours and fed in a thick slop makes a fine ration. The pigs at the same time should have access to pasturage, if this is available.


GROW ALFALFA ON DRY LAND

Excellent Plan to Select Strain That Grows Coarse, Strong Stalk-Drill Seed Carofully.

In adapting alfalfa to dry farming a very good plan is to select a strain that grows a coarse, strong stalk, use the same strain of seed year after year and thus adapt the plant to local conditions. We would prefer to pay a dollar a pound for seed grown several years under such conditions than to use seed at market prices that has not been acclimated. The alfalfa seed from Turkestan which the agricultural department foisted on us several years ago is not suited to high table lands and does better in fields under irrigation which is just contrary to the dope that was handed out to us by the alleged scientists, says the Denver Field and Farm. We should say that a sufficient quantity to sow on dry land is to drill in eight pounds of seed the acre, using any of the upto-date styles of corn planters that carry an onion seed plate with holes thirteen sixty-fourths of an inch in diameter. Drill the seed carefully to the in perfect condition to assure germination of a full and even stand. Hav-This meanall accounts whether | ing drilled the seed with a two-row corn planter, the drills are just right to be cultivated with a common tworow riding plow. The shovels should be run to a depth of three inches and thus compel the alfalfa roots to keep below the three-inch soil mulch. It will probably be necessary to cultivate five times during the season and also to break the soil crust after each rain so as to lessen the loss of moisture. Early in the season until the growth is six inches in height harrow across the rows with a slant-tooth drag.






