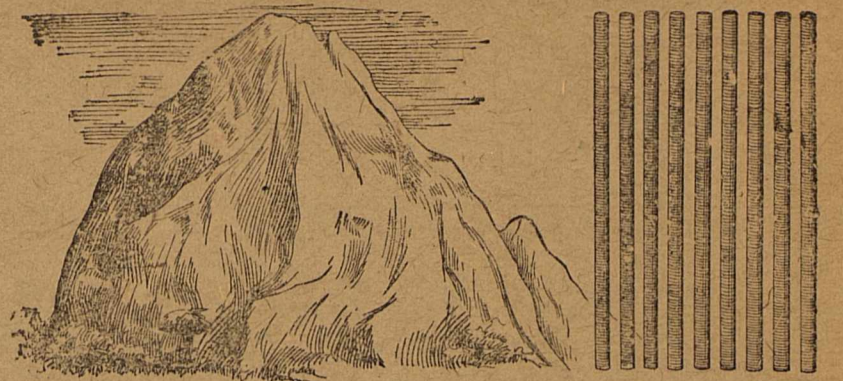

Railroads and Railroad Securities



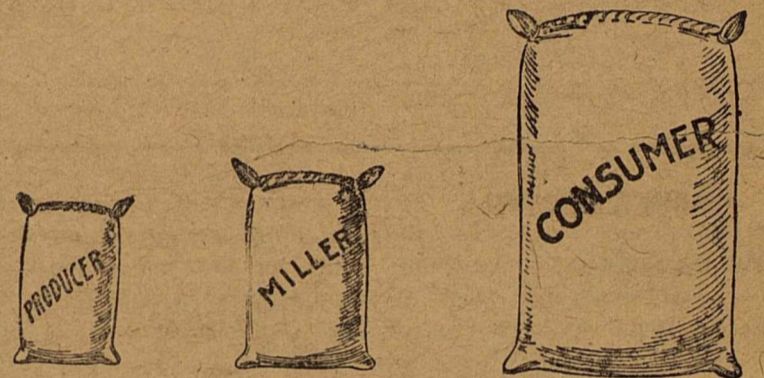
VALUE OF TEXAS RAILROADS EQUAL TO NINE STACKS OF TWENTY DOLLAR GOLD PIECES PILED AS HIGH AS OUR HIGHEST MOUNTAIN.

Railroads are the most vital force in human existence and are the strongest creative factor in the state's wealth. The assessed value of our railroads in 1911 was \$345,000,000, which is equal to nine stacks of twenty dollar gold pieces piled as high as Guadalupe Peak, the highest mountain in Texas.

One-seventh of the assessed value of all property in Texas is railroads, and new railroads in passing through a community add \$64,000 per mile to adjoining property and the distribution is free and equitable.

The Texas Welfare Commission is investigating the subject of railroads and railroad securities. R. C. Duff of Houston is chairman of the sub-committee having the question under consideration

Rice is the most nutritious food known in civilization. It contains more life-giving powers than any product of either the animal or vegetable kingdom. As a food, it is the King of products and unaided, it has supported human life for ages. Rice pays the highest toll to reach the consumer of any staple article of trade. The producer sells it to the miller for four cents per pound. The miller runs it through the mill and sells it for five cents, but the consumer pays the grocer as high as fifteen cents for it.

The Texas Welfare Commission will consider the Production, Milling and Marketing of Rice. W. P. H. McFaddin of Beaumont is chairman of the sub-committee having this subject in charge.

POULTRY NOTES.

Winter-hatched chickens are the best layers.

No expensive apparatus is required to raise geese.

Never breed from yearling turkeys; select two-year-olds.

Never breed from late-hatched turkeys, if it is possible to get better.

Not only is the demand for eggs increasing, but also for chicken meat.

Much of the mortality among little chicks is due to their being fed too soon.

Instead of being overdone, the poultry business is scarcely growing fast enough.

Don't overfeed the first week of fattening. Rather feed lightly three times a day.

The food in the chick when hatched will be fully assimilated and digested in 48 hours.

All things considered, there still remains plenty of room for all in the poultry business.

In making up a ration it is important that it contains food that the fowls will eat readily.

Cornmeal, meat and potatoes are three of the most valuable ingredients in the fattening bill of fare.

There are three things necessary to successful turkey raising, good stock, proper feeding and good care.

Free range chickens are never so tender for roasting as those with limited range and fed on pure feed.

When a flock does not produce as fertile eggs as it should, the best remedy is to introduce new blood by buying males from a farm range flock.

Some folks are forever planning ahead and figuring how to make chickens pay, and while they are putting along with their plans and figures the hens and their broods are neglected.

Gluten meal is one of the by-products made from corn in the manufacture of starch or glucose. It comes from the flinty part of the kernel and is very rich in protein. It is valuable for poultry.

Prof. John Fields says it is probable that soy-beans would be better for growing poultry than cow peas. They give a greater yield of grain, and are of very similar composition and feeding value.

The brood sows should have all the bright clover or alfalfa hay that they will eat.

The cleaner the feed and feeding places, the better the quality of the pork in all.

It is conducive to health to feed hogs when they can have the range of the pasture field.

These seeds, like the elm and soft maple, which ripen in May or June, belong to the "sooner" class.

Never work a team of colts together until they are thoroughly broken, as they will worry each other.

Fixing up the neglected holes about the drinking tank is now in order. Fill them up now and avoid trouble.

The man who calls improved stock "fancy stock" will have an account to settle with his Maker on the judgment day.

Carry your good care of the ewes this fall as far as feeding plenty of nice bright oats to keep them in condition.

The old troughs will soon have to replace the fountain waterers or there may be a burst fountain some cold morning.

After the strawberry bed has been set and cared for through the summer, it should be mulched through the winter.

The milk should be strained through one thickness of clean white flannel and then should be quickly cooled and well aired.

Wise turkey breeders will not breed from the same tom more than one year unless the same breeding hens are retained.

No matter how highly bred and carefully cultured a colt may be if it is not carefully trained and properly developed it loses its value.

The first thing to do with the newly-born lamb is to get it full of the ewe's first milk, after which its chance for living is equal to that of the calf's.

For general or common use, caustic or burnt lime or ground limestone are employed almost exclusively for the correction of soil abnormalities.

Wetting the hoofs with a sponge and clean water every day, or simply dipping each foot into a pail of water, will keep the feet from becoming dry.

If there are two kinds of roughness for the cows this winter it will be better to feed of both at the same time rather than to feed out one then start on the other.

Look out for a collar that rubs a lap of flesh at every stride of the horse. It is liable to wear a gall on his neck, and much sooner sometimes than suspected.

The neck and shoulders of a horse are points that must not be overlooked when buying. A weak neck and a narrow breast do not go with the most desirable horse.

During the winter the dairy farmer has more time to figure out his plans for improving his system of farming. The great question should be to get a better and more profitable lot of cows.

It would be easier to keep good men on the farm if the dairy farmers would keep better cows. A man appreciates the opportunity of handling good stock, and he realizes that some responsibility is placed upon him if he knows that nothing but valuable and profitable cattle are kept.

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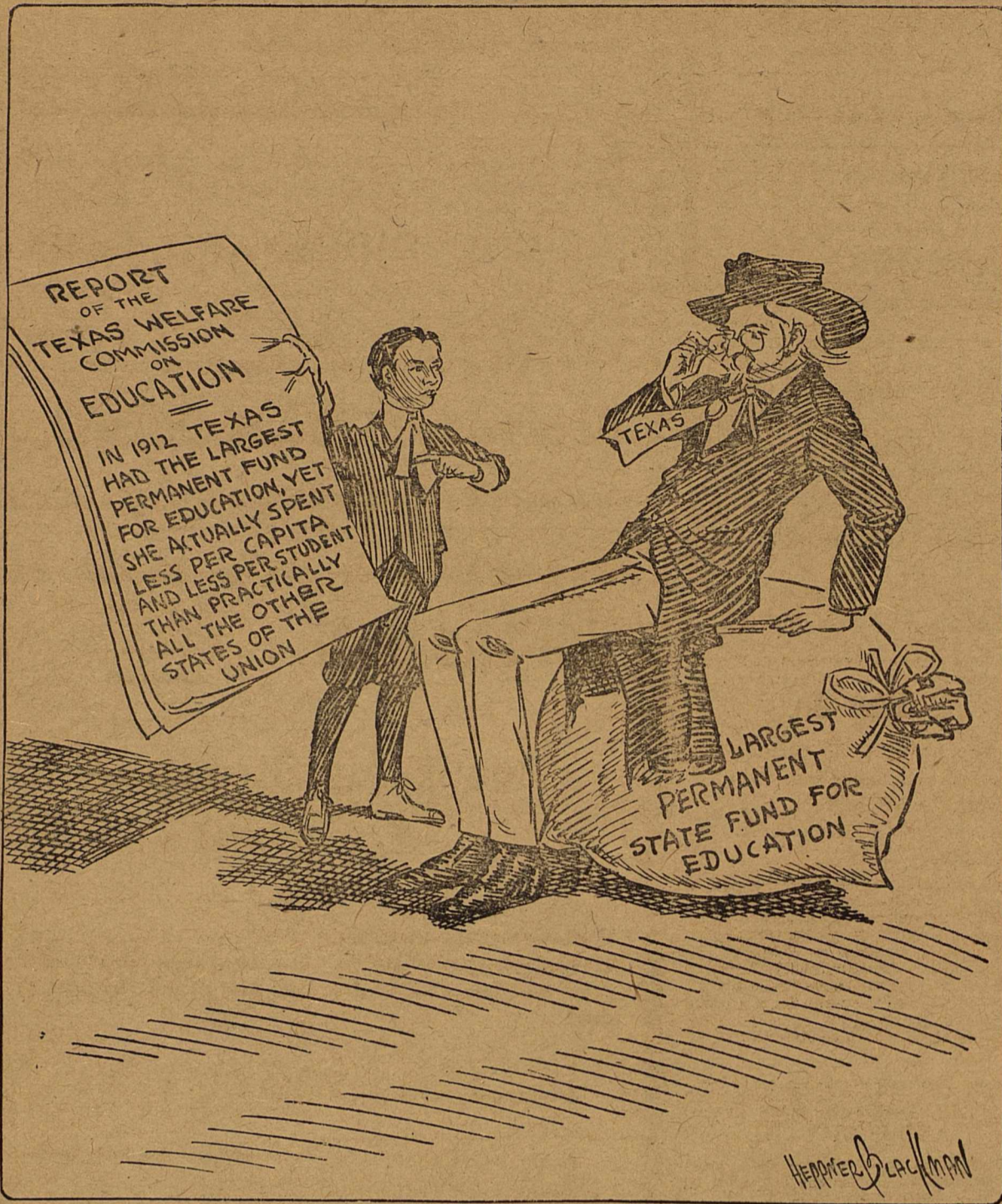

TRIO OF RAILROAD BUILDERS DISCUSS STOCK AND BOND LAW.

Law Prevents Independent Construction—Texas Only State Requiring Roads to be Built Before Bonds are Issued.

Houston, Texas.—The practical effect of the Texas Stock and Bond law upon railroad construction in Texas is of course best understood by those engaged in railroad construction than perhaps any other class of people. The Texas Welfare Commission invited the opinion of the leading railroad men of the country and three of the most prominent men are quoted below.

Mr. R. S. Lovett, executive head of the Harrimon lines, said in part: "I do not know of any independent line of considerable importance that has been constructed in Texas since this stock and bond law went into effect. The stock of the Trinity & Brazos Valley, as I understand it, is owned jointly by the Rock Island Company and by the Colorado & Southern and they have backed that enterprise. The Brownsville line and the Yoakum line, from Houston towards New Orleans, as I understand, have been backed and financed by the Frisco system. I do not recall any other line. There may have been many lines started but if you can show me a single line one hundred miles in length that has been constructed in Texas in the last twenty years—without the backing of a large system from outside the state—I should be very much obliged, because I do not remember any. Of course, one effect of this has been to retard the construction of other lines. Some may consider that that has been beneficial to the existing lines."

Mr. Frank Trumbull, executive head of the Katy system, said in part: "Under the present law you have got to furnish your railroad first and get your securities afterwards, that is, if you are selling bonds. That is not done anywhere else in the world, so far as I know, and it is not good financing, and if it is not good financing, it is not good for the State of Texas."

Mr. E. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe, said in part: "We have been able by means of our credit acquired outside the state to borrow money on that credit and spend it in Texas in spite of the stock and bond law. To say, as your Texas law practically does, that no bonds will be authorized until the money is spent, is equivalent, as to any new promotion of small lines, to forbidding their construction."
