HIGH SCHOOL CLOSED SATURDAY NIGHT

Although A Shorter Term Than We Want, it Was One of The Most Successful in History of the School

With ponderous applause, hearty congratulations and general good will, the Brownfield High School closed last Saturday night on the most harmonious and successful terms taught here since we have been a citizen of the town, not that we aim to disparage any particular term or teacher, for we have had good teachers and a splendid school all along, but teacher, pupil, trustee and patron have seemingly worked all abreast this year, and such a combination is an irresistible force that makes a go of any undertaking.

To Keep off The Rabbits.

In the early Spring, when garden plants are just coming up, rabbits frequently do much damage. Here is a certain method of killing them: Take a supply of sweet potatoes, turnips or some other vegetable that rabbits are fond of and bury them at intervals throughout the garden, leaving a small part exposed. Hack the exposed part freely and fill the cuts with strychnine or arsenic. The rabbits will eat the vegetables and die promptly. Be sure to cover the baits during the day, and after the rabbits quit troubling you, the vegetables should be burned.

Clean Up Day

Maids and Matrons Offer Good Prizes to the Little Folks.

There is to be a "clean up day" in Brownfield. All the cans, ashes, papers, trash, old ropes, in fact all the junk and everything that makes the town unsightly is to be cleaned away.

The ladies of the M. & M. Club will give prizes to the children who gets the biggest piles. For the largest pile gathered by a boy \$3.00 will be given and for second \$2.00. The girl who gathers the largest pile will receive \$3.00 and the second largest \$2.00.

This will be good money for the little folks, as well as a fine way to make our town look good. Since this has been spread abroad, the little folks have kept the phones busy speaking for the tin cans of their neighbors.

The business men have agreed to hire wagons to haul trash away, and three of them will ride around that afternoon to measure the piles.

The prizes will be awarded in the court house square at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of Friday the 9th of May.

Everything must be ready by noon on Friday and the names of all competitors must be given to Mrs. Percy Spencer by 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

To the person who has the most orderly yard and premises, a blue ribbon will be given. Don't you think our town will

Each contestant can have as many as three piles.

Spray Your Fruit Blossoms.

Most fruit trees are in blossom now, or will be soon, and it is important to fight insect pests. The codling moth is probably the worst insect found in Western Texas, and is most active. It deposits its eggs in the blossoms and these develop into worms which ruin the fruit. Spray the open blossoms with a solution of arsenate of lead, in the proportion of three pounds to fifty gallons of water, and repeat the treatment ten days later. This will destroy most of the worms, but another dose about three weeks later will be good. These three treatments will also have the effect of killing the eggs of many other insect pests that work upon your trees. Nothing pays better returns on the investment than proper spraying of trees in the spring.

About the best information we have seen about silos and their adaptability to the Plains is a letter from H. M. Bainer, Agricultural Demonstrator for the Santa Fe railroad, and addressed to the Brownfield Hardware Co. This letter will be published in full in next week's Herald, and we want every farmer and stockman in Terry county to read it.

With this issue, the Herald closes its eighth year and begins the ninth, and has been under the present management almost four years. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PRESCRIBING QUALIFICATIONS FOR DISTRICT JUDGES OF THIS STATE AND PRESCRIBING THEIR TENURE OF OFFICE.

(S. J. R. No. 11.) A JOINT RESOLUTION.

Amending Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the creation and formation of judicial districts, the terms of compensation and qualification of the judges of the district courts, and the times of holding court.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, Article 5, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, one or more judges, each of whom shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a practicing lawyer of this State or a judge of a court in this State for six years next preceding his election; who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election; who shall reside in his district during his term of office; who shall hold his office for a period of four years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary of three thousand dollars, until otherwise changed by law. Court shall be held by a district judge at the county seat in each of the several counties at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the holding of the district court when the judge thereof is absent, disabled or disqualified from acting. The district judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the 19th day of July, 1913, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district courts," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot the words: "Against the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district court."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated to pay expenses for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Terry County Sheep and Wool Statistics.

C. S. News Service.

The proposed tariff schedule now under consideration by congress, putting wool on the free list, is of interest to the sheep growers of Terry County. The present tariff on wool is, approximately, 11 cents per pound. The quantity of wool clipped in this County is not of record, but the clip per sheep per annum amounts to about five pounds.

There are 2588 sheep and goats, valued at \$13206 by the Federal Census Department, on the farms and ranges of Terry County. The annual wool and mohair production is valued at \$267 and 34 sheep and goats are sold and slaughtered each year, and their total value is \$173.

The number of these animals on the farms and ranges of the entire State is 1,808,709, which a value of \$6,301,364. The production of sheep and goats is 591,976 annually, valued at \$1,361,544 and the State's yearly wool production is valued at \$2,267,308.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing All State District, County And Precinct Officers Within This State Shall Be Compensated By The Payment of A Fixed Salary.

(H. J. R. No. 41.) A Joint Resolution

Of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new section to be known as Section 58, providing for the tenure and compensation of public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be added to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be known as Section 58, which shall read as follows:

Section 58. All State, district, county and precinct officers within the State of Texas, shall hereinafter be compensated by the payment of a salary to be fixed or provided for by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State will, as directed by the Constitution, make publication of this proposed amendment in the manner and for the time as required by the Constitution, the amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature of this State at the general election to be held for State officers on July 19, 1913, the returns of which shall, as provided for in the Constitution, be made to the Secretary of State, the result ascertained and proclamation made as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of the Constitution. There shall be written or printed on the ballots to be used at such election "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" and those favoring the adoption of said amendment shall erase the language "Against the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" by running a pencil or pen through the same, and those opposing the adoption of said amendment shall erase the language "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years," by running a pencil or pen through the same.

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

BROWNFIELD TEXAS

District Court

Convened this week with Judge W. R. Spencer, Atty. G. E. Lockhart, Sheriff Geo. E. Tiernan and Clerk D. J. Broughton, all present and ready for business. The Judge empaneled and charged his Grand Jury Monday morning, with R. H. Banowsky as foreman, and including the following other members. Dale Adams, S. H. Holgate, D. Hunter, W. B. Snodgrass, Noah Bell, A. E. McPhaul, W. G. Myers, M. D. Williams, Jack Bryan, H. H. Longbreak, and F. W. Proctor. Lee Allmon was door baliff and J. W. Ward and Arral Williams were appointed as riding baliffs.

After being in session three days and examining many witnesses the Grand Jury returned two bills of indictment, both being misdemeanors, and the Judge declaring these cases to be out of his jurisdiction, they were transferred to the County Court for trial. The Jury was discharged.

After assembling the Petit Jury Tuesday morning, they were immediately discharged and allowed one days pay.

The Court tried the following cases.

J. B. Stone vs. J. T. May et al; dismissed by mutual agreement.

A. W. Blankenship vs. G. J. Rose; verdict for plaintiff by default.

Ex Parte Ben H. Dixon; removal of disabilities as a minor, allowed.

J. W. Taylor vs. R. L. Richter; verdict for plaintiff.

Mrs. Alice McGeehe vs. Clyde Hudson; dismissed for want of prosecution.

M. D. Williams vs. Unknown heirs of Ambrose Alexander. Court held he was disqualified in this case, on account of being plaintiff's former attorney.

Brownfield Merc. Co. vs. J. W. Ellis; dismissed.

Harry Braidfoot, A. B. Bynum and W. J. A. Parker were appointed as Commissioners to select the next Juries.

As court has not adjourned, other cases that may be tried will be reported in next issue of the Herald.

Dealing With The Pests.

The farmers of Texas, more especially Western Texas, suffer annually a most enormous loss from the depredations of the prairie dog and of the jack rabbit. Many efforts have been made to rid the country of these two pests and laws have been passed allowing each county to offer a bounty for scalps of jack rabbits, and elections may be held for the purpose of voting to compel land owners to exterminate prairie dogs on their premises, but neither of these remedies is at all effective. A certain county may be paying, adjoining counties where no bounty is paid many hundreds of the troublesome creatures continue to come in, and the bounty paid is practically wasted. Exactly the same condition exists with reference to prairie dogs. The only effective remedy for these troubles lies in the proper state laws. Since the enactment of the present state wolf scalp bounty law, the number of wolves has decreased in Texas fifty per cent, and they are being rapidly killed out en-

tirely. A similar law for prairie dogs and jackrabbits is the only sure and just solution of the problem of their extermination. If the citizens of Western Texas will give this matter serious thought and agitate it properly, such a law will be passed at the next regular session of the legislature and thousands of dollars will be saved annually to our farmers and ranchmen.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NECESSARY BUILDING FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AND ALSO FOR BUILDING OF VARIOUS INSTITUTIONS AND AUTHORIZING IMPROVEMENT BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF NAVIGATION, IRRIGATION, CONSTRUCTION OF BRIDGES AND THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF PUBLIC WAREHOUSES.

(S. J. R. No. 18.) Senate Joint Resolution.

To be entitled a Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same for public improvements.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection, and defend the State in war or paying existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in current revenue shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. The Legislature, however, shall have power to authorize the issuance of bonds to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of purchasing additional ground and erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas, including a medical department, an Agricultural and Mechanical College and all departments and activities of a complete university of the first class. The revenue received from the permanent University fund shall be available for the payment of interest on these bonds and for the creation of a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity and the Legislature shall also have power to issue bonds for the construction of necessary buildings for State institutions. The Legislature shall also have power to authorize the issuance of bonds secured by lien on the real property of the penitentiary system to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of constructing buildings and making permanent improvements.

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of or to any individual association or corporation whatsoever or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company; provided, however, that under Legislature provision any county, any political subdivision of a county any number of ad-

joining counties, or any political subdivision of the State or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations upon a vote of a majority of the resident propertayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except in case of improvement of rivers, creeks and streams, in building of levees to prevent overflow, in which case the bonded indebtedness may be for an amount not to exceed one-half of the assessed valuation of the lands of the district to be reclaimed; and, except, further, that the bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall not exceed the limit imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the legislature may authorize and in such manner as it may authorize the same for the following purposes, to-wit:

- The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflow, and to permit of navigation thereof or irrigation therefrom or in aid of such purposes.
- The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and water ways for the purpose of irrigation, drainage or navigation or in aid thereof.
- The construction maintenance and operation of bridges and macadamized, graveled, sandy clay or clayed sand or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof.
- The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses or in aid thereof.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection at a special election hereby ordered for the 3rd Saturday in July, 1913, the same being the 19th day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following:

For amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary system and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

Against amendment to Sections 49 and 52 Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products.

Previous to the election, the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the County Judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the voters in each county on which he shall have printed the form of the ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of the voters.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State. The sum of five thousand [\$5,000] dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THIS STATE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS, AND ALSO FOR THE OPERATION OF PUBLIC WAREHOUSES FOR STORING, HANDLING, CLASSING, MEASURING, WEIGHING, ELEVATING AND LOADING AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS

(S. J. R. No. 4) Joint Resolution
A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution of this State

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, that Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or to issue bonds for the purpose of making any loan or to otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall not exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon, and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

(d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses for storing, handling, classing, measuring, weighing, elevating and loading agricultural products. Provided the Legislature may establish such means and agencies as may be necessary for accomplishing the purpose of this amendment and if a State warehouse commission be provided for, their term of office shall be fixed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified electors of the State of Texas on the third Saturday in July, same being the 19th day of said month, and the amendment proposed to Section 52 of Article 3, as above indicated, shall be voted upon separately.

Those favoring the amendment to authorize road or other public improvements by a majority vote, shall have written or printed on their ballot: For amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by vote of a majority, and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by a vote of a majority.

Those favoring the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses shall have written or printed on their ballot: For the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products.

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated out to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.
