Eleven Million Annually For Feedstuffs.

C. S. News Service

The farmers of Texas do not raise enough cereals and forage crops for their own farm animals. They expend, according to a recent census report issued by the Federal Department of Com merce and Labor, \$10,800,000 annually for feed stuff. The official figures show that twentyseven per cent of the farmers buy feed.

Peter Radford, President of the Farmers Union, in discussing the subject, said: "A farmer should, as a rule, raise his own feed. While cotton is our money crop and the moisture requirements of cotton and cereals are in a measure antagonistic, and nature usually favors cotton, yet a farmer should plant enough feed to take his stock through the season."

The farmers of Terry County expend \$6571 annually for feedstuffs. 52 of the farmers of this county report purchases of feedstuffs and the annual expenditure per farms reporting is \$126. By proper diversification of crops this money can be kept at home.
