How to keep the boys on the farm - build good roads.

A soft answer turneth away wrath, buta soft road turneth up worth.

Conservation of energy concerns all. It is clearly and fully involved in the question of improved highway.

The fable of the hare and the tortoise would be a literal truth, if the hare was travling on some of the Texas highways, and the tortoiseupon one of the improved roads.

Bad reads are taxes upon all and they place an appalling limitation upon the business and social life of the people of the rural districts.

Good farms, efficient schools, well filled churches and correct social conditions are never found along a poor highway.

There are three ways to build good roads viz; private subscription, taxation and by the issuance of bonds. The first is inadequate and would have to be local; the second is too expensive and is therefore temporary, the third is permanent and enduring.
