The attitude of Texans and of the Southerners generally show beyond a shadow of a doubt, Senator Morgan is quoted as having said, "that there is bound to be several well cefined transcontinental highways equally as good as the rock road which is to be dedicated as a lasting momorial to Abraham Lincoln.

The Ocean to Ocean Highway Association has plans for a route through the Middle West and Southwest that are bound to mature as the project is backed by the typical Western brains and energy. There is enumerable good roads associations that have stretches of good roads that they are not going to see isolated like an casis in the desert of the Western wilderness. Things will be blooming in the good roads line all over the west for the next two years, and once started will never cease.

It is said that the proposed tour is intended in no way to de tract interest from the Lincoln highway project, but to generate enthusiasm along some of the other routes, so that interest will not die out with the realization of one great ocean-to-ocean highway. - Dallas News.

Terry county received one blue, two reds and two white ribbons at the Fair, which was quite surprising, as only a small exhibit, hurriedly gotten together was sent, our main exhibit being gotten together at Gomez, and will go to the Dallas Fair. The prizes were taken on seeded ribbon cane, blue ribbon; one red on red kaffir and one on native grasses; two whites, one on sudan grass and one on Egyptian wheat, and run close on apples and corn.

Judge Neill said that Dawson county had a fine and well gotten up exhibit and took several prizes he also said we would have gotten first on kaffir corn if it had not got wet, turned black and moulded in transit. We will try to have a better exhibit on hand next year.

The Judge reports good crowds, and that the management were enthusiastic over the first trial, and were fair and liberal minded gentlemen. The Amarillo Daily News credited our exhibits to Bailey county and never did correct it.
