Educational Department
What the schools of terry COUNTY NEED MOST
The Schools of Terry county need consolidation more than any other one thing where such course is practiable. Instead of having one room ne teacher schools, with small nrollment, short terms, and poorly paid, overworked teachrs, two or more of the small chools should be consolidated into a High Sckool with more eachers, longer school terms, better school houses and equip. ent for teaching.
Ex-Superintendent Bralley ays, "The consolidation of prtation of children to and chool at public expense ore in chool at public expense are in He in thi American Union; and in each of these states the results, univer sally conceded, from the plan are better school houses with adequate equipment, larger enrollment of children, more regular attenuance, elemination of tardiness, protection of the health and morals of the children in going to, and returning from school, better gradation of school, longer school terms, better trained teachers, and a decided improvement in eduational sentiment, all without marked increase in the cost of school mantenance.

Underthe present system it is mpossible to have the efficiency in the rural schools that we should have. No one teacher can successfally do all the work needed in such a school, and as a rule the school is too small and the fund is not sufficient to em ploy more than one teacher.
But owing to the sparsely settled condition of our county such a $y$ ystem is not practicable except in a very few instances We hope that in the near future we may have conditions more favorable for the consolidation schools than we have at prion of One thing all the schools in the County need is an interested patronage. The schools need patrons who will send their children regularly, who will talk for, work for, and stand by whatever is good in the school, and if some things are not just as they should be in the school, work for the betterment of those conditions.
If the school fund is not suffic ient for the actual needs of the school, work and vote for an in crease of the special school tax, even if it should add a few more dollars to your taxes. What is a few dollars compared to better ducational advantages for your children? Whatever the conditions, stand up for the good in your school and work for better conditions.
