## Freed from Quarantine

Washington,D.C.-The acting Secretaryof Agriculture has is sued an order releasing, on Nov ember 17,from Federal quaran tine for cattle scabies (also called "cattle mange") the Counties of Howard and Borden in the state of Texas. The release of these two counties is the first effect of the general dipping or der recently promulgated by the State Live Stock Sanitarv Com-
mission requiring that between mission requiring that between
the dates of September 1 and Dec 3 mber 1, 1913, all affected herds in the qnarantine areas should be dipped twice, and all herds exposed to the parasite dipped once, under State or Federal supervision. The Depart ment of Agriculture though the Bureau of Animal Industry is co - nent of this order and sinee Sep tember 1 approximately State and Federal employees have been engaged in the inspec

- tion and supervision of the dip ping of cattle in the Panhandl country of Texas. The Panhandl Cattle Raisers' Association is a so cooperating with the State officials. It is expected as a result of this general dip ping of cattle that within a short time additional areas in Texas will be re-
