My methods of discipline have sometimes been criticized, and sometimes misrepresented, but at no time, so far as I know, have I ver been accused of playing double or shirking a duty. I have never betrayed a confidence nor gone back on a friend; and if I am elected to the office to which I aspire, I promise to perform the duties of that office as faithfully as I have others in the past.

I am a democrat and have always voted the ticket straight. I am in favor of good roads, good schools, the enforcement of the law, and of better conditions generally, but I am not in favor of a careless and extravagant expendicture of the county funds.
