

This is notably true of Maine, a prohibition state. There is ten times as much drunkenness per capita as there is in France.








NEW STYLE OF CULTIVATOR

50c Purpose of Inventor to Perfect Machine With Series of Hoes That 15c Can Be Adjusted.

In describing a cultivator recently invented by Clifford A. Cowin of River-10c head, L. I., the Scientific American 05c says:

The cultivator shown in rear perspective view in elevation, is of the adjustable type. The purpose of the inventor is to provide one with a series of hoes connected together so as to be adjusted simultaneously with means for locking them in an elevated posi-tion out of contact with the ground, and with means for locking them in a plurality of adjusted positions intermediate their uppermost and lower most positions. 
