Sept.-When Governor Colquitt signed the emergency warehouse bill, which provides for a system of state owned cotton warelouses, he geve to Texas the distinction of being the first and only State in the union to aid her farmers by legislative enactment during the present European crisis. The Legislature was called together: in extraordinary session to consider this one measure and the bill was passed by both houses by more than the two-thirds majority necessary in this State to enact an emergency la w.
