Dr. Charles Lewis, president of the Bailey County Hospital District Board announced Saturday, May 23, that Dr. Homer Algood of Mobile, Ala. has authorized the hospital board to release his intention to move to Muleshoe and establish a medical practice. He expects to arrive in Muleshoe around June 15.

Dr. Algood, 46, has been engaged in general practice in Mobile for the past 15 years. The doctor is a graduate of the University of Alabama medical school and interned at Jefferson Davis Hospital in Houston. He served as an air force flight surgeon. He also served one year in residence in internal medicine.

Members of the hospital district board stated, "the proposed new hospital for Bailey County was a major factor in acquiring the services of Dr. Algood for Muleshoe." The doctor was in the Muleshoe area recently and was shown floor plans of the then proposed hospital which is to be constructed by the Bailey County Hospital District. He expressed a great deal of interest in the forthcoming hospital project.

As a result of the passage of the hospital district and bond issue last Saturday, Dr. Lewis said he feels confident this will help secure additional doctors for Muleshoe in the future.

Speaking for the voting majority who voted 'For' the hospital district for Bailey County and surrounding trade territory, I think, as probably many others did, its which side of the fence you wish to look

over and how you wish to look. I agree that our free enterprise system, which has built the greatest nation on the face of the earth, may be affected in this project by a small degree, however, I do not agree that in voting for the project that we sold our birthright in

this deal. This needed facility for our community is not totally financed by the government, nor will it be federally controlled. Some projects within our community have been totally financed by certain federal agencies and some of these projects weren't needed nearly as much as this

Furthermore, I would be one of the first to know that many patients have been lost in our community because of inadequate hospital facilities; many have survived who were still alive when they reached a hospital that was properly equipped and staffed.

We have lost some fine doctors to other communities, also some fine doctors by death due to overwork.

Many fine medical graduates who come from poor families and are not financially able to build a clinic or hospital are naturally forced into areas where facilities are available.

I am wondering if the 'silent majority' refuses to accept any government aid, for fear of losing their freedom, and how much income the 'silent majority' receives in ASC payments, from REA, co-op telephones and
