In order to have a jury on hand the Judge took with him in his Ford, R H. Banowsky, J. T. May, J. F. Winston and A J. Stricklin, who together with Mr. Ellington and Mr. Ater, who were present, formed a commission to examine her sanity. After thoroughly questioning several witnesses, including her husband and Mrs. Smith herself, the commission decided that the defendent was of unsound mind, and recommended that she be placed in a hospital for the insane. This decision was agreeable to Mrs. Smith, as she said she wanted to get where she could receive treatment.






