The list included many residences in town that were insured for a few hundred, and the loss was not great, but the business houses take a much higher rate, and of course were the heaviest losers.

Among the heaviest losers, were, the Brownfield Hdw. Co., \$85.00; Brownfield Merc., \$50.00; Brownfield State Band, \$45.00; Herald \$30.00 and the Barber shop about the same.
