

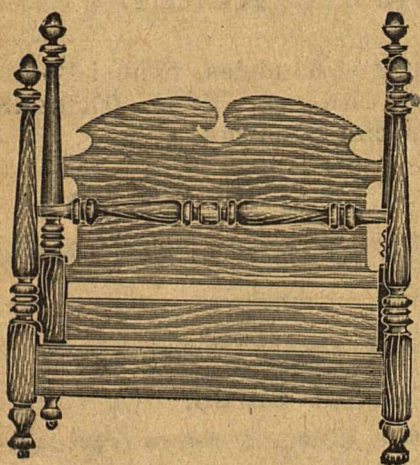

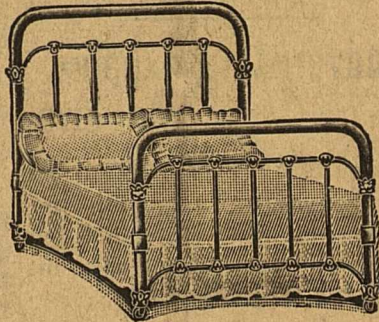

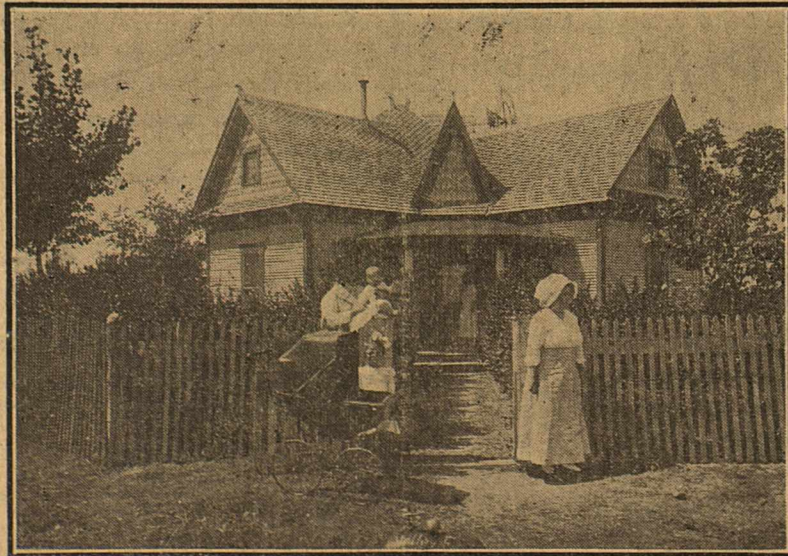

The Valley Farm.

Maybe there are some people even in Terry county that don't know where the Valley Farm is situated, and if you live in Brownfield, it is right under your nose. It is generally known as the Hardin homestead. Right here, we want to say a few words on naming your home. Some people think it is very undemocratic to name your homes, but if you will think for a moment you will readily see that it has been practiced in the southern states, the home of Democracy, for time immemorial. For instance, the home of Washington was Mount Vernon, that of Jefferson, Montecello; Jackson, The Hermitage, and that of Gen. Robt. E. Lee was Arlington. Now it is a cinch, that if you take no pride in the homestead, it will not take much pride of you, and to get the best results, and get the whole family interested, including the cook, call a consultation of the family, find out what they had rather have the farm named, and christen it.

There are still a few people in Terry county that think that it

takes a section or more for a family to live on, but that idea has been forever blasted, for this family we are writing about is making a living yea, they are making money on eighty acres, and before this article is finished we are going to produce the figures for your consideration.

Why, you don't have to have the whole world at your back door to make a living; there are people in the world, lots of them who are making a better living than the most of us on five acres, not half such land as we have in old Terry. But Mr. Hardin is no foreigner; he is just a plain old

American citizen; never knew anything else.

Well, the Valley farm, photo of which is shown in this issue, is situated right here on the town section, the southern portion, and gets its name from Lost Draw that passes through it, forming a valley. There are 66 acres in cultivation, two in houses, lots and orchard, and the balance in pasture. It is too early yet to give this year's crop, but we are going to give the 1914 crop:

Eight bales of cotton off nine acres, which brought \$375.00 including the seed. 300 bushels of corn brought \$160.00. Ten tons of maize brought \$100.00. Bundle kaffir corn and feterita brought \$65.00. Meats and pigs \$40.00. Potatoes \$25.00. Cows and calves \$115.00. Chickens, eggs, butter, etc., estimated at \$20.00. Total \$900.00. Now don't you get it into your head that Mr. Hardin sold everything on the farm, for he did not. He has lots of feed yet from last year's crop; plenty meat to do him till he kills again; plenty chickens and eggs for home use, including milk and butter. In fact he has a living at home.

The Valley farm will do even better this year. While cotton is not quite so good, he will make 1000 bushels of corn this year, kaffir, maize and feterita, about the same only greater acreage. Besides all this, he has about 120 gallons fruit put away for feasting this winter, not to say anything about a goodly lot of the National Drink.

Folks, come to Terry, where you can get a cheap home, and live like folks are supposed to live. Don't let old King Cotton rule you, with your nose to the grind rock always.

Bledsoe, of Lubbock, and Hon. N. R. Morgan of Seminole, are candidates for the place. It is expected a special session of the Legislature is to be called at an early date.

Our Misnamed Ruins.

Many visitors to the prehistoric Cliff Dwellings of the Mesa Verde National Park in southwestern Colorado are astonished to find that what is commonly described as a dwelling is not properly a dwelling at all but a village or a city. The celebrated Cliff Palace is not a palace. Neither is Spruce Tree House a house, nor Balcony House a house. Each of these is a complete town which once, in the dim ages before the earliest Indian tradition, was an organized community, often of considerable size.

The arrangement of houses in a cliff dwelling of the size of Cliff Palace, for example, is characteristic an intimately associated with the distribution of the social divisions of the inhabitants. The population was composed of a number of units, possibly clans, each of which had its own social organization more or less distinct from others, a condition that appears in the arrangement of rooms. The rooms occupied by a clan were not necessarily connected, although generally neighboring rooms were distinguished from one another by their use.

PLAINS

The county was covered last week by a series of rains which totaled in precipitation about 8 inches, all lakes being filled in consequence and the ground thoroughly soaked. These rains have done but little if any damage to crops in the way of waste, while on the other hand they will be beneficial to all late crops and may add something to the ranges. Come to Yoakum.

We understand that Poole and Holloway have leased their range to those parties until next May and that the steers will be kept on the present range this winter.

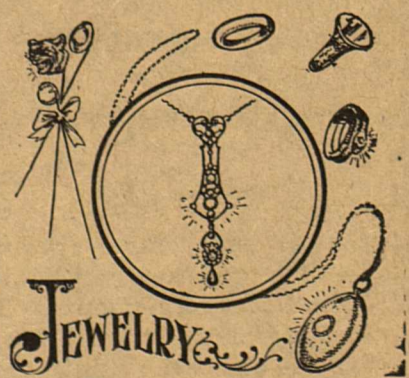
G. D. Jones and wife of Odessa were visitors at the Long Hotel this week, they being relatives of Mrs. J. P. Long.
