Uncle Tom DeShazo brought in a sample cluster this week, that weighed one and one fourth pounds, and measured 17 inches in circumference. He had a row of them 60 yards long, and harvested about eight bushels all together. He measured four of the hill, and each of them had a ten quart water bucket full of chokes under them. Now that is going some, but Uncle Tom is conservative in his estimate, but he measured them.

W. R. Bridges planted a small patch of them this year, and after carefully digging and weighing them he estimated that there would have been 10,000 pounds to the Neither of these farmers raised them by irrigation. Our loose sandy soil is the home of them.

They are not only a very fire food for stock, but Mr. Bridges informed us that they tried them boiled, baked and fried like potatoes, and that they were little behind this splendid food as an eater.

We have been told that people who are trying them out, plant one row of them and the next one in peanuts, and turn their hogs in, and the combination of the two make a balanced ration

#### IMPROVING THE CAMP MEAL

Various Condiments That Should Never Be Forgotten When Party Goes on an Outing.

A well-filled box of spices will be thankfully remembered at every camp meal, if somebody is thoughtful enough to pack it and see that it reaches its destination, for even the plainest food can be rendered appetizing by judicious seasoning, and the most appetizing dainties of camp fare can be improved by spices that bring out their flavor.

Of course, you will remember to take along salt and pepper, but if you want the taste immortal have the last of cayenne. A box of paprika, too, will give at tasteless moments a pleasant fillip, while lemons and garlic will be worth their weight in gold at all times. Remember the following things as well: onion juice, herb bouquet and a flask of whisky or brandy. A tablespoonful of the last may be put in canned meat soups instead of sherry, which is more bulky to carry.

Tomatoes always liven up a canned soup, and so also a shaving of garlic and a squeeze of lemon juice. When using the sauce remember that it must be cooked with the soup. A raw egg, beaten into the soup after it has been taken from the fire, or milk cooked with it, is a splendid reviver.

Avoiding Danger in Mines. It is fairly a problem to install motors, controllers and other apparatus in mines in such a way as to avoid the danger of igniting fire damp. Modern gractice in Europe now provides three protecting methods-all inclosed, partly inclosed, with use of wire gauze plates, and oil bath apparatus. Various apparatus, such as transformers, controllers and switches, need to have a special design for use in mines, not only on account of fire damp, but because of prevailing dampness and

How long ago life began no one has definitely determined; but it is known to have been many million years ago, for the remains of extinct animals and plants are found in the oldest sedimentary rocks.
