

EARLY PATENTS IN AMERICA

First One Is Said to Have Been Granted as Far Back as the Year 1791.

It is reported that the first American patent for a piano was issued to James S. McLean of New Jersey, May 27, 1796; the first United States patent for washing machine was to Nathaniel Briggs of New Hampshire, March 28, 1797; first United States patent for steam engine was to James Paper: The Posterity of King Rumsey, August 26, 1791; first United States patent for gas engine was to Samuel Brown of England, March 2, 1824; and that the first United States patent for air engines was to E. and J. Prentiss of Baltimore, June 22, 1824.

Richard M. Hoe's first United States patent for printing machine was granted May 20, 1842, last patent April

27, 1880. John Ericsson issued his first United States patent February 1, 1838, when he lived in Sweden; his second patent was issued November 5, 1840, while he still resided in Sweden; a third patent issued in December, 1844, when he was living in New York; the last patent issued to him was on December 6, 1887, while a later patent issued to his executors July 8, 1890.

Thomas A. Edison's first patent issued June 1, 1869, No. 90,646; many hundreds of patents have issued to him since that date, the patent office fees alone running up into thousands of dollars .- Scientific American.




