Surveyers Here Again. Weather Forecasting
The Santa Fe Rallroad survey ers came in again Sunday, and pitched camp. Their orders this time was to find the cheap est crossing on the draw near town.
Early Monday morning, they began a survey a mile northeast of town,coming just east of the Methodist church. and crossed the draw in Dick Brownfield's pasture,making a connection with the original survey, south west of town. Then they ran a survey in the western part of town, about midway between town and the survey they ran two weeks ago. We did not learn which survey of the three the engineers considered the cheaper.

Pre tentions of this character meet with a certain credence because there are a number of people who still cling to the ancient belief in the influence of the moon on the growth and development of crops, and to the idea that the weather conditions depend upon plaretary and astrological com hinations As a rule the gener public is orly partly familia modern scientitic facts and e ins overr-ady to accept con fidently at face value almost any announcement of alleged new ducoveries, enpecially when thei exploitation is clothed in skillfu alus ons uitems of the latest scientific information and is accompanied by clever repre
sentations of the benefits that sentations of the benefits tha are to result.
The latest, misrepresentation of this character now being pre sented to the people of the country in the columns the daily press is an the daily press is an alleged new system of long-range weather
forecasting said to be based on the rifts and spottedness of the sun and its shafts of solar radiation.

When the disk of the sun is minutely examined with power ful telescopes, or when photo graphed with the aid of the modern spectrohelingraph, the surface presents a characteris tic spotted appearance which undergoes slight changes from day to day,and greater changes with longer intervals of time, de pending upon the well known otation of the sun upon its axis and the periodic recurrance of the sun spot maxima and minima These and certain well-known related phenomena are repre sented to be the basis of the so called discovery
Duriny the past several yar the Weather Bureau has received, in the form of letters, circul ars,diagrams and blue priuts. full specifications concernins all essential details of this alleged new system of forecasting The so called discovery is fully known to the Weather Bureau and bas received fair and impartial study nd examination by its scientific taff. Moreover,other scientists of international reputation now
connected with the strongest connected with the strongest
institutions in the world engag. ed in astronomical research and con lucting investigations in solar and terrestrial physics have also passed upon these new theories. These authorities are in accord that the deductions and conclusions drawn from the solar conditions on which the new system is based are un
warranted. Solar phenomena of the kind described do not have any direct influenceup on the weather at any particular time and place, and therefore cannot be made the basis of weather forecasting.
