of every voter to study carefully this subject．Hon．Ellihu Root，in discussing this question before the Constitutional Convention of New York，recently said in part：
II am opposed to the granting of suffrage to women， women and to every woman；and because it believe would be an to thyury to the State，and to every man and every
woman and beause I believ it woman In the State．It would be useless to argue this if the right of suffrage
were a natural right．If it were a natural right，then women should have it though the heavens fall．But if there be any one thing settled in the long
discussion of this subject，it is that suffrage is not a natural right，but ig simply a means of government，and the sole question to be discussed is
whether government by the suffrage of men and women will be better gov． Into my judgment，sir，there enters no element of the inferiority of Woman．It is not that woman is inferlor to man，but it is that woman is
different from man；that in the distrlbution of powers，of capacities，of qualities，our Maker has created man adapted to the performance of certain
functions in the economy of nature and society，and woman adapted to the Derformance of other functions．
