## OUR PUBLIC FORUMA

### John H. Kirby ON BILL OF RIGHTS.

We should dedicate ourselves anew to the maintenance forever of the vital forces of the Bill of Rights. It was largely due to the wisdom of Jefferson and Madison that the first ten amendments to the Constitution of the United States were added; in fact they were adopted almost concurrently with the Constitution itself, and but for these amendments the Constitution would probably never have been ratified by a sufficient number of the states to put it in a effect. These ten amendments are states to put it into effect. These ten amendments are often referred to as the Bill of Rights, because they are a guarantee of the maintenance of human liberty and representative government under our federal system, as well as in some respects construing the Constitution itself as to the character of government created under it and the principles

to be maintained by it. In them we have religious freedom and freedom of speech or of the

press, and the right of petition; protection against unreasonable searches and seizures; no person to be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law; the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; the enumeration of the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people. This tenth amendment to the Constitution, which is one of the most vital things in all the Bill of Rights, so far as the maintenance of the autonomy and independ-ence of State Government is concerned, has been the victum of more assaults by political quacks than all the other provisions of the Constitution com-

From the beginning of the government there have been those of the type of Alexander Hamilton, aristocratic in their tendencies and without faith in the capacity of the people for self-government, who have advocated a strong central government, concentrating its powers at Washington City and controlling the liberties, properties, rights and habits of the people from this great central power house. And likewise there has been another school of political thought in this country holding the principles of Thomas Jefferson, who preached the doctrine of individualism, who held that all men were created free and equal that all governments derived their just powers from created free and equal, that all governments derived their just powers from the consent of the governed, and that the people were abundantly able to direct the energies of government in every department thereof and could be safely trusted to do so. Jefferson's theory of the separate independence and ospacity of the citizen was likewise extended to the separate sovereignty and capacity of the states. He believed in local self-government; in the selection of the people of representatives to carry on the affairs of govern-ment, legislative, judicial and executive. He fought with all the power of his great brain the Hamiltonian idea of a centralized power to direct the affairs of the people, especially in local state matters, and believed expressive in the of the people, especially in local state matters, and believed earnestly in the efficiency and wisdom of both the ninth and tenth amendments to the Com atitution



This is one time in our country's his. tory that the rairoads have the preponderance of public sympa thy, for the public is not easily blinded to these cardinal facts: That railroad employees are now pulling down higher wages than any other laborer;he has as short hours as the average; that the majority of railroads are already in the hands of receivers, and none are paying respectable divi dends; that a wage increase will only mean that "Jones pays the Freight," and the last clause is the paramount issue with the inocent bystander. When we take into consideration theat the 100,000 Western railway employees represent only an infestimenal part of our 100,000,000 population, who are directly interested interested in freight rates. and knowing that shorter hours will mean higher rates, and while they are raising no howl at the present rates, an increase at this time, when the roads are taxed to their capacity to move crops and merchandise, the public is in no condition to countenance a strike, or anything else that is likely to throw our country into a panic, with real famine in the interior cities. Unless the employees have the sympathy of the American public, they can never hope to win. To people of Western Texas, this threatened strike is especially repulsive, as we need need more mileage, especially in counties like Terry, with not a mile of track. But with persecutions, strikes, higher taxes and stringent laws forever hounding them, they do not feel justified in increasing a milage in a territory whose tonnage will not pay running expenses. Despite this fact, if the roads were given a square deal, we believe railroads would put in the needed mileage and trust to future developements of the country for returns on their investments. 





Range: Breeds in the West, east to Texas, Kansas, and Minnesota, and north to southern Canada: winters over most of the United States breeding range, south to Guatemala.

Habits and economic status: Very numerous in the West and in fall gathers in immense flocks, especially about barnyards and corrals. During the cherry season in California Brewer's blackbird is much in the orchards. In one case they were seen to eat freely of cherries, but when a neighboring fruit raiser began to plow his orchard almost every blackbird in the vicinity was upon the newly opened ground and close at the plowman's heels in its eagerness to get the insects exposed by the plow. Caterpillars and pupae form the largest item of animal food (about 12 per cent). Many of these are cutworms, and cotton bollworms or corn earworms were found in ten Mr. Whiteford and Grandpa stomachs and codling-moth pupae in Lovelace went to Brownfield 11. Beetles constitute over 11 per cent of the food. The vegetable food is practically contained in three items -grain, fruit, and weed seeds. Grain, mostly oats, amounts to 54 per cent; fruit, largely cherries, 4 per cent; and weed seeds, not quite 9 per cent. The grain is probably mostly wild, volunteer, or waste, so that the bird does most damage by easing fruit.





Habits and economic status: The bobwhite is loved by every dweller in the country and is better known to more hunters in the United States than any other game bird. It is no less appreciated on the table than in the field, and in many states has unquestionably been hunted too closely. Fortunately it seems to be practicable to propagate the bird in captivity, and much is to be hoped for in this direction. Half the food of this quail consists of weed seeds, almost a fourth of grain, and about a tenth of wild fruits. Although thus eating grain, the bird gets most of it from stubble. Fifteen per cent of the bobwhite's food is composed of insects, including several of the most serious pests of agriculture. It feeds freely upon Colorado potato beetles and chinch bugs; it devours also cucumber beetles, wireworms, billbugs, clover-leaf weevils, cotton-boll weevils, army worms, bollworms, cutworms, and Rocky mountain locusts. Take it all in all, bobwhite is very useful to the farmer, and while it may not be necessary to remove it from the list of game birds every farmer should see that his own farm is not depleted by eager sportsmen.


