El Paso,Texas, June $\% 5,1916$.

## Mr. Stricklin.

Brownfield,Texas. Dear Sir:-

I arrived in El Paso yesterday afternoon and found everybody talking war.
Of course I expected to find the people here more or less in clined toward war, but didn't expect to fine quite so much sentimentas I've seen displayed by all clajses-there see ms to be no division of sentiment-but all seem to think we must wait no longer about giving Mexico a long needed lesson.
This town is full of Mexican refugees, and I am told that they are still coming over by the hun dreds.
It is being reported here that Villa was in Juarez yesterday, put I saw nothing of him this morning, when, in company with a man from Tennessee, I went over and rode through Juarez. However, we were not looking for Villa nor anyone else after we got over there and saw the situation. We didn't see a single white person and the staeets were crovded with groups Mexicans, all talking at once, quite a lot of them armed and a many appareutly drunk.
Many of them looked as if they hadn't been very well fed.
After having gone over there and seeing the conditions I feel that the U. S. should stop all crossing, both to and from Mexico,as it is very plain that with
the feeling that exists in the minds of both people it would be very easy for a clash to come. There is, I am told, something There is, $I$ am told, something
over five thousand soldiers quartered here now, which together with the big guns mount ed above the city, I feel that there is no danger here.
I am told that these guns are effective at a range of twerty two miles, and that Juarez can be
wiped completely off the map in wiped completely off the map in eighteen minutes.
I went out to Fort Bliss this afternoon and I certainly felt proud of our boys in the army. They certainly look capable, and I'm sure they are willing. Even now I see a squad of them com: ing up the street from toward the river with their deadly look ing guns on their shoulders, and
I can't help but feel that if Mexico doesn't look out, she may yet have cause to regret some of the inhuman acts that she has allowed her soldiers to commit against our soldiers and our people.
As I told you before I left
Browntield if war is declered I Brownfield,if war is declared I am going to remain here.
