A papal decree issued from Rome recently orders the Catholie church in ail parts of the world under severe penalty to prohibit dancing of any kind at church entertainments, whether arranged for already or planned for the future. The decree re cites that in the last century in

families to balls which used to be protracted to a late hour at night by entertainments and other forms of amusements" that "the perils and losses caused by the growing customs considered it their duty to forbid them" and accoreingly issued an an order for priests to "take care to remove entiaely that a ouse in which entertainment and balls are held for the purpose of premoting pious prejects."

The United States Geological survey of the Interior Depart gent has carried on map work in Texas since 1884. For four years the work was done in cooperation with the State and in
1915 in cooperation with Harris 1915 in cooperation with Harris f the area of the State has now been topographically surveyed and nearly a hundred of the re suiting maps have been published and are for sale at nominal prices In Texas up to 1915 the Survey had run more than 10,000 miles of level lines and marked 4,600 points with metaltablets or posts showing their heights above sea level.
