Railroad Movements

Messrs. M. V. Brownfield, Judge Neill and R. H. Banowsky went to Lubbock last Friday to see how every thing was comming up there concerning our mutual railroad, and found every thing up there optomistic con. cerning early construction.

Mr. Ross, head of the construction department, took them over to the material yards, where a mile or two of tract has been layed to accomdate material, and showed them huge piles of steel and ties, and informed them that they were looking for a train of steel and 250,000 ties in this week, and found instead of light steel that it was 85 pound steel which just likes 5 pounds being the heaviest.

Mr. Ross further informed them that the road to Terry can be put up in twenty days with elevator graders, and that just a few men and teams will be required to follow to make culverts places. Trains will be tooting in Brownfield before we hardly know it, and we will then







As, a preliminary event to the Elevonth International Soil-Products Exosition and the annual session of the nternational Dry-Farming and Irriation Congresses at El Paso, Texas, n October, the greatest dam in the orld, impounding the largest artifiial body of water in the world, will be dedicated at Elephant Butte, New Mexico, by President Woodrow Wil on.

The date for the dedication of this lam is set for October 14. This event vill be immediately followed by the pening of the Soil-Products Exposiion at El Paso, where it is expected at the president will also speak.


The products now growing throughut the Rio Grande Valley below the dam will be thoroughly represented at the Exposition, where they may be mpared with similar products grown n many parts of the world. Delegates to the Congresses and visitors to the Exposition will have ample opportunity of visiting and inspecting

his great structure, as well as the vast and fertile valley which the vater it impounds is designed to irrigate.

The dimensions of this dam, the quantity of water it will impound, nd the area which will finally be rrigated from it, are set forth m tupendous figures. Nevertheless, a ull understanding and appreciation of this immense proposition, which appears to have been so capably designed and executed, is not possible without a personal inspection.

The dam is 1,200 feet long at the top; the height from the deepest excavation is 30%.5 feet; the width or thickness of the roadway at the top is 16 feet; the structure contains 610,-000 cubic yards of masonry.

The reservoir, when full, will contain 2,642,292 acre-feet of water. This is 115,098,000,000 cubic feet, or 862. 200,000,000 gallons. It would cover to a depth of one foot an area of 4,285 square miles. The denth of water near the dam will be 192 feet; average depth over the entire reservoir. 6 voir will be 134 miles; its maximum length 45 miles; shore line 200 miles, and area of water surface 42,000 acres. The total cost of this dam and accompanying work will be in the neighborhood of ten million dollars. Annual payments to the government will finally reimburse it for this expense.
