District Court

Judge W. R. Spencer came down Monday and empaneled and charged the Grand Jury, and set them to work, but left Tuesday morning for Sweetwater, Judge W. W. Beall, of that place being disqualified down there and Judge Spencer disqualified here, so they swapped places, but Judge Beall says he cheated Judge Spencer, as he will have lots of work to do at Sweetwater, and he (Judge Beall) is having a good time here, hunting rabbits.

Among the visiting attorneys were, Durst & Steed, of Post City; District Attorney G. E. Lockhart, of Tahoka; Littler & Penick, and C. E. Thomas of Big Springs; Roscoe Wilson, Percy Spencer, W. F. Schenck, Geo. R. Bean and Chas Triplett all of Lubbock.

The Grand Jury finished its labors Tuesday, and found two misdemeanor bills, and was dismissed by the court.

No cases were tried by jury. Concerning the back tax suits, a lot of them were settled, some 150 continued to perfect service and judgement against defendants in favor of the State and county, was rendered in a lot of them.

Mutilated Body of Infant Found in Pasture

The infant body of a new born babe was found in the Garnett pastures, about 14 miles south east of Tahoka, Wednesday morning about eight o'clock.

One of the Garnett boys started for the horses about eight o'clock Wednesday morning, and his attention was attracted to an object lying in a corner of the pasture, a few hundred yards from the house. Upon going closer he was horrified to find the mutilated body of an infant.

The discovery was telephoned to the county officials, and sheriff Redwine, District attorney Lockhart, County Judge Stokes, and County Physician L. E. Turrentine, left immediately for the scene of the discovery.

How death came to the child is a mystery. The body was badly torn and mutilated, supposedly by wolves or dogs; only the head and one leg and a part of the body remaining. Diligent search of the entire community failed to reveal a single clew, but it is the belief of the officers that the mystery will be cleared up.—Tahoka News.

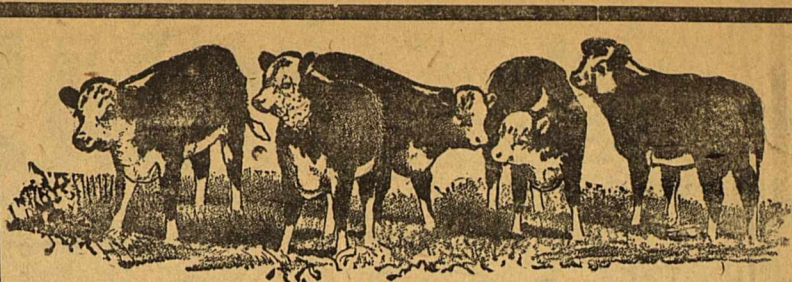
Company Increase

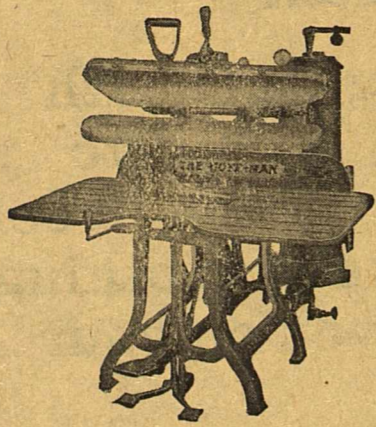

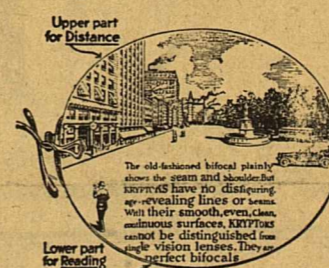
