### Chamber of Commerce

The Brownfield Chamber of Commerce met in regular session at the court house Tuesday night, and while probably not more than half the membership was present, those there were lively and made up for the absentees, and those who failed to put in appearance lost much good.

The subject of good roads was mostly discussed, and we want it understood right here, that the Chamber is determined that when the railroad runs into Brownfield, the western, as well as the eastern trade will find a good road running into this town. We note in the Plains Developer, that an earnest consideration of a good road running to the railroad is now under way over there, and they will find that Brownfield and Terry county stand ready to aid them in any way to get a good road to this point, which will soon be their nearest railroad point.

It is the earnest desire of the Chamber of Commerce to get the county to purchase some good teams, hire a good and competent man to take charge of them and not to let up till we have at least a good road running into town from at least four different directions. While they consider the one to the west of the most importance, they want a good one in every direction, and they will not be afraid of the disposition of the trade in the future. All people now realize that the trade centers to the good road towns.

It was suggested that the county could dispose of the teams at a good price after the roads were made, but the majority were agreed that when the county had used the teams for awhile, they would then realize that they were needed all the

time.

Taxable valuations will nearly double in the next few years, and as we are now realizing about \$1000 a year on our road tax of five cents, it will soon be to where we can keep this grader going all the time. Terry county people as a whole are great good road enthusiasts, and we see no reason why the Commissioners Court should hesitate a minute in building what the people want.
