What has become of our Farmer's Institute? Do we have to have a foreign promoter here all the time to keep things going? If we do we had better have a guardian appointed to keep our homes, farms, businesses going.

A party out in the country was phoning in to one of the lumber yard managers this week, asking for a carpenter. The lumber yard man had a hard time explaining that all the carpenters were very busy, had all ahead they cared for, and were the most independent set of people in Brownfield.

There are oceans of water un-

der Terry, and it ought to be utilized in bringing early spring gardens, for family and local use. The reduction in the cost of living must begin in the rural communities. When the farmer and small town man quits living less out of the paper sack, then we talk more of the almost prohibitive cost of the necessities of life.

Lots of us poor mortals never think of the foolishness of testing the strength of our property just to see what will happen. There is no need to try out a good car on a steep embankment when unnecessary, or to try bursting a diamond to try its hardness tempt those we love and admire beyond necessity, or see how near we can miss heaven and yet get there. In the first place, such tests are foolishness, and in the next place, we may test beyond endurance, that we prize.

The last grand jury returned two bills of indictment, both against young men of our county for petty offences, both needless and altogether unnecessary. If there is a record we have that we wish to see kept is that we keep our young men and young women out of the courts of our land, for a habit early formed, may ultimately lead to harm to them selves and anguish of of their parents. This the first instance on records where indictments have been returned against our young men, and we hope will be the last. If there is a person in the county that wishes more to see our young people do well, it is the Herald, for we cant help feeling an interest in every boy and girl in Terry county, seeing as we have, most of them grow from childhood to young men and women. Boys, do keep your name off the Court records of this or any other country.

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Terry County:—Greeting:—

You are hereby commanded to summons, by making publication of this Citation and Notice once a week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return date hereof in some newspaper published in Terry County, Texas, H. H. Holden, a non-resident of the State of Texas, to whom the hereinafter property belongs, to be and appear before a setting of the undersigned special Commissioners, duly and legally appointed and qualified to be held in the Court Room, in the Court house, in the town of Brownfield, the County Seat of Terry county on the 22nd day of December, 1916 at 2 o'clock p. m., then and there to answer the petition for condemnation of the South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company filed with the County Judge of Terry County, Texas, on the 20th day of November, A. D. 1916, in cause No. 57, wherein the South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company is plaintiff and H. H. Holden is defendant.

The nature of the Plaintiff's suit is as follows, to-wit: Petitioner, South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company, a body politic duly incorporated under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Texas, having its principal office in the City of Lubbock, County of Lubbock, State of Texas, complaining that H. H. Holden, a resident of Los Angeles, California, respectfully represents that by the terms of its charter it is authorized and empowered to locate, own, operate and maintain a railroad through certain cities, towns and counties in the State of Texas, including Brownfield and the County of Terry; and for that purpose has authority among other things by the general laws of the State, to receive, take, hold or obtain any lands necessary for the purpose of locating, constructing and maintaining its railway. That for railroads and other lawful purposes, as hereinafter set forth, it is necessary for petitioner to have the possession and use of the following described tract of land situated in Terry County, State of Texas, to-wit:

All that part of Lots Four (4) and Five (5) in Block One (1) in First Addition to Brownfield in the town of Brownfield, as designated on the map or plat of said addition of records in the Deed Records of Terry County described as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner of said Lot Four (4); thence south along the east line of said lots to the south line thereof; thence west along the south line of said Lots Four (4) and Five (5) to the southwest corner of said lot Five (5); thence north along the west line of said Lot Five (5) a distance of One Hundred Fifteen and Ninety-One One-Hundredths (115 91/100) feet to a point, thence northeasterly along a straight line to a point in the north line of said Lot Five (5) distance Thirty-Nine and Seventy-Three One-Hundredths (39 73/100) feet from the northeast corner of said Lot Five (5); thence east along the north lines of said Lots Five (5) and Four (4) to the point or place of beginning. Containing Thirteen Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Two and Six Tenths (13,752 6/10) square feet, more or less.

That the petitioner desires to obtain the possession and use of the above described tract of land for the purpose of right-of-way for its station grounds, depots, main tracks, passing tracks, switches, yards, water tanks, coal bins, and for any other lawful railroad purpose. 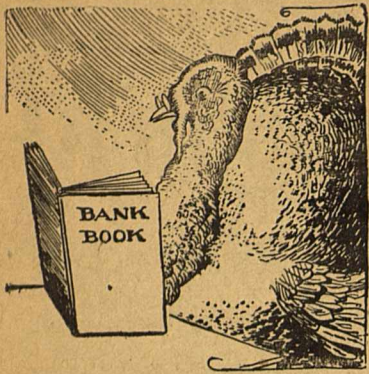

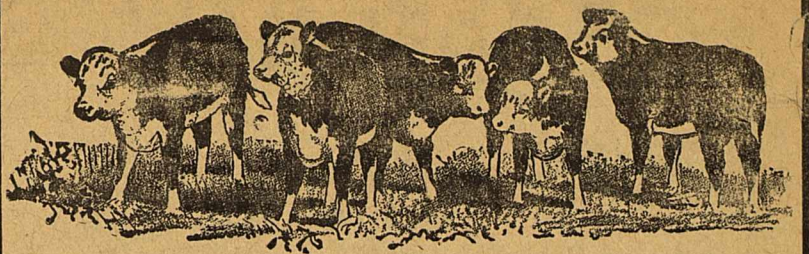

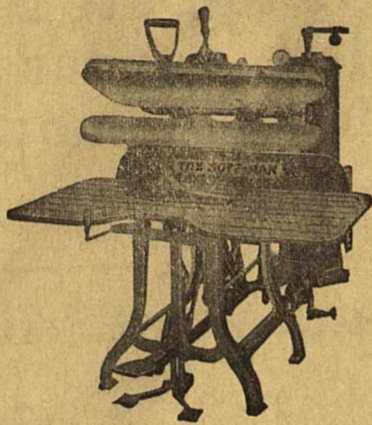
