Good Roads Talk.

Tuesday morning, E. J. Hernan, of Washington, D. C., came in on the mail car from Lubbock and addressed the citizens of Brownfield, who could be gotten together hurriedly for the purpose, on the question of good roads, and wherein we would be benefitted by getting the National highway through our town and county.

Mr. Hernan is one of the Directors of the International Good Roads Association, and not only understands the value of good roads to the country, town, school and community, but is a fluent and enthusiastic speaker, and though you had never been an advocate of good roads before, after hearing him, one cannot but be convinced of their value. In fact, it is a business proposition, and is a waste of good money not to have them.

A local association of the State Good Roads Association was organized here who will push the matter here, by talking and educating the people to their value, and to insist on our representative and state senate using their influence in the State Legislature in creating a board of State Road Engineers, which will have to be done before Texas can enjoy any possible part of

the appropriation by the Federal Government as her share, which is more than \$4,000,000.00.

Further, as Mr. Hernan said, we have no absolute assurance of getting this National highway through our county, if we show any indifference, but that a more progressive tier of counties to the north or south, by organization can step in and get them. He said by getting together under an organization which would be recognized by the Federal Association, as they do not recognize individuals, but co-operation of individuals.

He was here designating the road, and said he was not sure yet whether it would come via Lubbock or Tahoka, but that no town could be sure of it unless they got in harness and showed the authorities that they meant business.

A local organization of several members were gotten together, and everything will be gotten in shape to thoroughly co-operate with those higher ups, as Terry county is too progressive to think of loosing this National Highway which will be in every way equal and in some superior to another railroad.

We acknowledge with thanks that it is a splendid grazing country, but when our text books put that as their limit, we think it is time to raise a fearful kick, when we know that two thirds of the wheat in Texas is produced in what is known as the Panhandle, and for the past few years we have furnished the cotton belt of east Texas all, or prac-

tically all their surplus feeding grains, such as corn, maize and kaffir. Of course all the pupils of West Texas know better, they know they are studying a lie, but what about the pupils east of the 98th meridian. Every Commercial Club and former organization in West Texas should never let up with their legislators, till we have a modern, revised geography for Texas children to study.

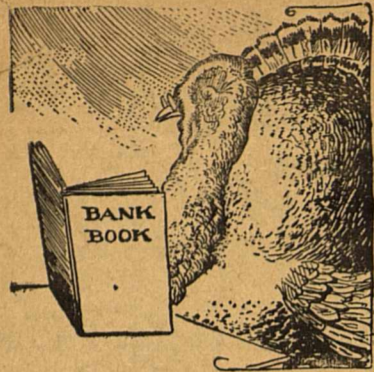

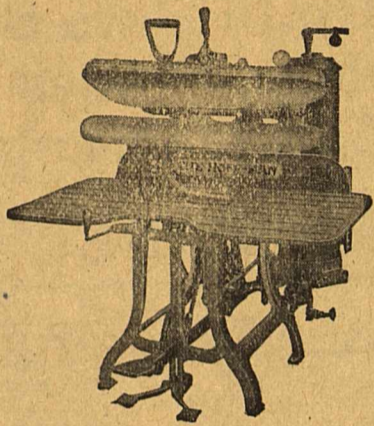
