He was one man that we can all say was a good man after he is gone, because we often said the same of him before he was taken away.

He was prominent in local Masonic circles, and was buried according to their ritual in Brownfield, yesterday.

Judge Geo. W. Neill, proprietor of the South Plains Telephone Co., informed us last week that he had a big crew of hands at work out from Lubbock, digging holes and setting posts for a through line from here to that city, up the Santa Fe right of way.

This is something we have needed for a long time, as service through Tahoka is very unsatisfactory and high, having to use the South Plains line to Tahoka, the Western to Slaton and the Southwestern to Lubbock, and by the time it passed through all these companies, the message not only come high, but was most of the time indistinct and delayed.

We will get more prompt and better service, but will probably have cheaper service. Then besides, we will have direct local connection with the people in the northeastern part of the county, who will put in phones.

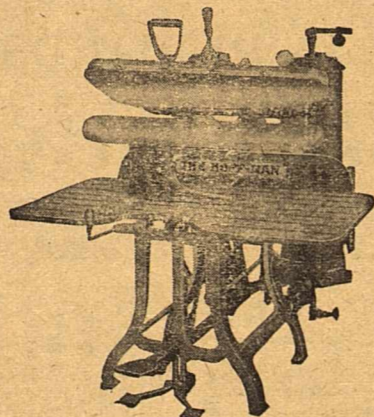

IMBECILES DO GOOD WORK

Experiment Draws Favorable Comment From a Leading New York Newspaper.

Charles Bernstein, superintendent of the State Custodial Asylum for the Feeble-Minded at Rome, N. Y., last year rounded up 25 of the higher-grade imbecile boys and men and sent them up into the Adirondacks for a month of summer camping. The commissioner of conservation at Albany rounded up 150,000 young evergreens and shipped them to a railway siding near the boys' camp. George Kuehn, a scout master, got the trees and the boys together in a spirit of outdoor competitive play.

In just four weeks these 25 feeble-minded wards of the state set out 150,000 young trees on 150 acres of deforested state land at a total cost of \$400. The work was worth \$1,000 to the state as it stood, and the commissioner of conservation called it just as well done as though civilian labor had been given the job.

These wards were turned from liabilities into assets in an experiment that could be duplicated this summer on a large scale. Politicians handicap such work whenever it is tried, and they almost prevented this venture, but despite them this pioneering will go on until the public awakens to its big significance as a partial solution for one of the grave and growing problems of our social economy.—New York Mail.

LAST ZULU ELEPHANT DIES

Was the Sole Survivor of Immense Herd That Once Roamed Native Forests.

There is not a single elephant left

in Zululand, once a paradise of these great animals. The last survivor was found dead the other day on the banks of the Unbolzi river, where he had lived since the early part of the reign of the great chief, Cetewayo.

An immense herd once roamed the Dugugugu forest and along the Unfolozi, but it was diminished by incessant hunting, until Cetewayo one day finally drove it away forever. The chief used to make medicine of certain portions of their bodies. On the occasion referred to he organized a mighty drive in which two elephants were killed and many wounded. One of the latter turned and trampled one of his pursuers to pulp. It was this animal which was captured and whose death is now reported.

The remainder of the herd broke away, and thereafter none was seen in Zululand.

Increase Corn Production

Washington, D. C., April, 18th. The Secretary of Agriculture, today (April 18) issued the following statement:

Corn is America's most important cereal. It can be grown successfully over a wider area than any other and furnishes nutritious food for man as well as the staple grain feed for cattle and draft animals. The production of corn should be increased this year to the fullest extent, taking into consideration seed, labor and existing economic conditions, and the availability of good land in corn growing regions not needed more urgently for other crops. The acreage may well be increased in most of the country east of the 100th meridian, as corn in general, thrives in this region.

An appreciable increase in the corn crop is most feasible, however, in the section of highest corn production. Favorable growing conditions exist in such regions; farmers there are familiar with corn growing; they have the necessary equipment available, and have adapted corn production to prevailing economic conditions. Farmers in such regions, through many years of experience, have learned methods of successfully combating adverse conditions. They know that the planting of virile, tested seed in well tilled, arable soil, immediate replanting of missing hills and early and continued cultivation of the fields count for much in the ability of the plants to produce a bountiful yield. This knowledge should be put to good use during the coming season in order that however un-

favorable conditions may be produced an exceptionally large crop may be assured.

In practically every county in the country in which experience has shown that corn may be produced successfully, the possibilities of increasing the corn crop without encroaching upon other important crops is at least worthy of consideration, if land, labor, and seed are available.
