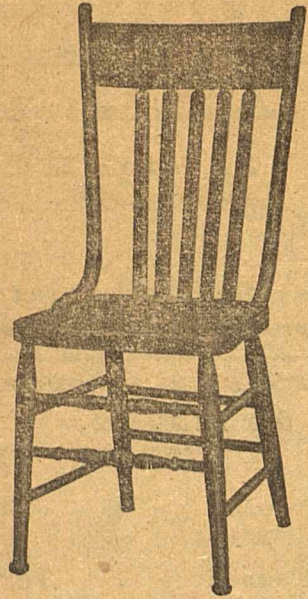
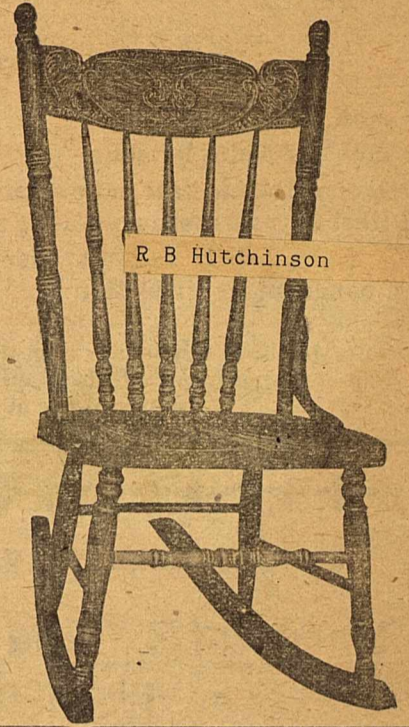

Keep Business Going.

FOR OUR COUNTRY'S SAKE.

(The following is a Wanamaker ad and being good and to the point, Milton Brown Jr. of the R. H. Kemp Lumber Co. asked us to print in Herald—Ed.)

Our country prosperous can pay our war costs as they come, and have left enough over to aid our Allies. Our country unprosperous, with business halting, money hoarded, through fear or false economy, will be hard pressed to keep food on the table and clothing on the back.

Keep business going. Keep money in circulation. Keep employment for everybody. Keep wages good. Keep on making money that we may have money to spend for war sacrifices.

The worst thing that could happen to the world these days would be a depression in our United States. War in itself does not cause business depression.

The billions of dollars of money to be expended in war preparations, will be put into circulation in our own country and this in itself will create new wealth for use in the world-struggle for humanity.

The one thing that might halt business now is an unpatriotic psychological feeling of panic and a false idea of patriotic economy.

Patriotic economy means the elimination of waste and extravagance. It means the conservation of our food products, our natural wealth, our health, our energie, our labor, our very lives.

It means putting more efficiency in everything we do so that each unit of money, energy and intelligence may accomplish the utmost.

Patriotic economy does not mean the lowering of America's standard of living, which would make us less efficient physically and mentally, nationally and individually, and would kill the spirit and the will to do the truly self-sacrificing things to be done.

Cities and communities must go on with their civic improvements. Road building and public works must proceed. Railroads must renew their equipment. Factories must be kept going to their full capacity. Labor must be employed. Homes must be kept up. Merchandise must be produced, distributed and used. War duties and war expenditures must be in addition to peace duties and expenditures. The more we do the more we want to do. The more money we spent the more we will have in our pockets to spend. Money creates money.

In a word: the natural sane life of the country must proceed as though we were not at war, in order that we may have the necessary prosperity to promote to a quick and successful conclusion.

President Willson sounds the keynote in this sentence: "It is evident to every thinking man that our industries, on the farm in the ship-yards, in the mines, in the factories, must be made more prolific and more efficient. Our industries can be more

prolific only if the people buy and use the merchandise produced by our industries. Manufacturing slackens when business slackens. Manufacturing grows in a prolific way when business grows. And business can grow and remain healthful only when the people buy and keep money in circulation.

Business is going—in the east The West, the North, the South. The country is prosperous. Last Month's increase in business was very large. Banks may wait in their operations until the government bonds are assimilated. People may pause temporarily in their outfitting to arrange to meet the new conditions. But the unloosing of billions of dollars will unloose a flow of prosperity absolutely necessary to sustain the world's burden.

Individuals must not lag behind. Seven billions of dollars to pay is only \$70 per capita in the United States. Yet seven billions of dollars put into work at 6 per cent a fair estimate of the producing power of money will create 420 millions of new wealth.

The income tax we pay will not be a tax on prosperity, but a spur to prosperity. Every dollar the individual pays out will come back to him with interest in the general prosperity of the people.

Keep business going for our country's sake. War cannot be waged and won without the sinews of war.

Proposed Amendment

To the State Constitution, Providing for and Relating to the Creation of Conservation Districts. Senate Joint Resolution No. 12.

Proposing an amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section 59, declaring the conservation and preservation of all the natural resources of the State of Texas are public rights and duties; providing for the creation of conservation districts, declaring such districts body politic and corporate, defining the authority of such districts, and conferring upon the Legislature authority to pass laws with reference thereto; declaring that the Legislature shall have authority generally to legislate for the purpose of conserving the natural resources of the State; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment; making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof and the methods thereof; directing the issuance of the proclamation therefor, prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section 59, and which shall read, as follows:

Section 59a- The conservation and development of all the natural resources of this State including the control, storing, preservation and distribution of its storm and flood waters, the waters of its rivers and streams, for irrigation, power and all other useful purposes, the reclamation and irrigation of its arid, semi-arid and other lands needing irrigation, the reclamation and drainage of its over-flowed lands, and other lands needing drainage, the conservation and development of its forests, water and hydro-electric power, the navigation of its inland and coastal waters, and the preservation and conservation of all such natural resources of the State are each and all hereby declared public rights and duties; and the Legislature shall pass all such laws as may be appropriate thereto.

(b) There may be created within the State of Texas, or the state may be divided into such number of conservation and reclamation districts as may be determined to be essential to the accomplishment of the purpose of this amendment to the constitution, which districts shall be governmental agencies and body politic and corporate with such powers of government and with the authority to exercise such rights, privileges and functions concerning the subject matter of this amendment as may be conferred by law.

(c) The Legislature shall authorize all such indebtedness as may be necessary to provide all improvements and the maintenance thereof requisite to the achievement for the purpose of this amendment, and all such indebtedness may be evidenced by bonds of such conservation and reclamation districts, to be issued under such regulations as may be prescribed by law and shall also, authorize the levy and collection with in such districts of all such taxes, equally distributed, as may be necessary for the payment of the interest and the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of such bonds; and also for the maintenance of such districts and improvements and such indebtedness shall be a lien upon the property assessed for the payment thereof; provided the Legislature shall not authorize the issuance of any bonds or provide for any indebtedness against any reclamation district unless such proposition shall first be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters of such district and the proposition adopted.

SEC. 2- The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held for such purpose on the third Tuesday in August, A. D. 1917, the same being the 21st day of August, A. D. 1917; at said election the vote shall be by official ballot which shall have printed or written thereon the words "For the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation" and also the words "Against the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation." All voters favoring this proposed constitutional amendment shall erase the words "Against the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation," which said erasures shall be made by making a mark with a pencil or pen through said words. All ballots cast as above provided shall be counted as cast for or against this proposed amendment, and if a majority of the votes cast shall be for the amendment it shall be declared adopted; if a majority of the votes cast shall be against the amendment said amendment shall be lost. All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualification of electors, the method of holding such election and in all other respects as far as such election laws can be made applicable.

SEC. 3- The Governor of this state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4- The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

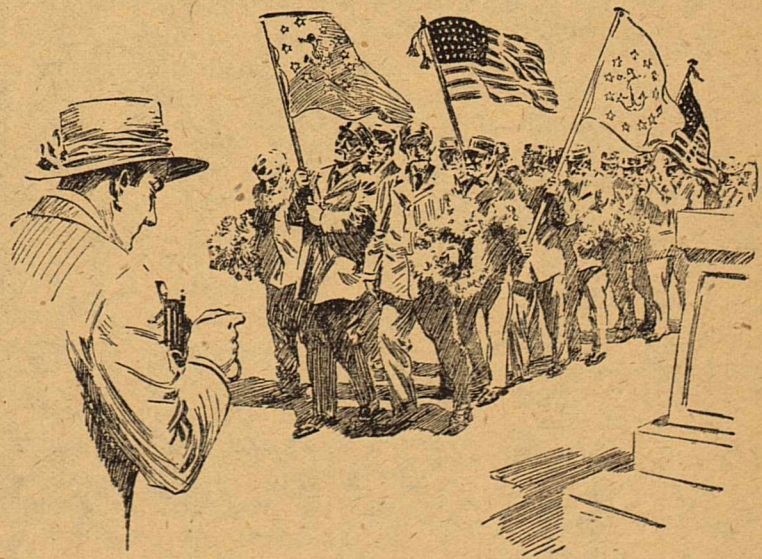

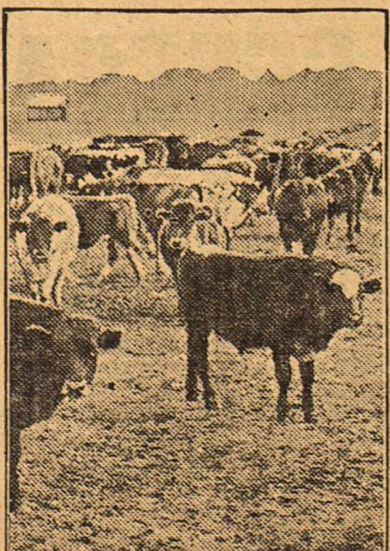
HORSES PIGS and CATTLE

RAISING STEERS FOR MARKET

Feeder of Seventeen Years' Experience Says Best Grades Are Always in Good Demand.

Does it pay to raise purebred steers for the market? Some say yes, while others answer in the negative. But an Iowa man says it pays to get a good start if a feeder intends to make a good finish of the feeding experiment.

This feeder, who was recently on the market with stock, went on record in boosting purebred cattle for feeding purposes, as his 17 years of experience that the good grades are always wanted, and are the largest money-makers in the end. The affirmative side of the

question has a strong booster in this gentleman, who has been practicing what he preaches for many years past.

Each year he has been in the habit of feeding a bunch of purebred baby heeves for the summer market, and each time has been successful in getting out on the venture. At his farm he maintains a drove of Hereford cattle and aside from the regular breeding business, he raises a drove of steers for the killers each year.

Many feeders think that purebreds are for breeding and most anything will do for the killers, but cases of this sort argue well for cattle of good blood to be finished for the market.

The feeder who recently made these remarks is emphatic in saying that it pays to raise purebreds for feeding purposes, and his advice to young men just getting into the live-stock business is to get a start on a purebred herd as soon as possible. A good start shortens the road to a successful ending in a business of this sort.

FLEECED LAMBS MAKE GAINS

Old Idea Regarding Recuperation Sustained by Test at Nebraska State Experiment Station.

The old idea that a shorn lamb will regain in a week or ten days the weight of the wool removed from it at shearing time was vindicated recently in an experiment at the Nebraska state experiment station. Five lots of 12 lambs each were used in the experiment, each lot fed a little differently. As the lambs were too heavy to hold for the experiment, there was an average loss of five cents per animal, but the fact that the lambs did especially well after the fleece was removed proved the old theory. The daily gain was .51 of a pound.

PROPER SHELTER FOR LAMBS

Animals Fed in Well-Ventilated Barn Make Same Gains as Those Kept in Open Sheds.

In a series of tests in feeding western lambs, the Indiana experiment station found that lambs fed in a well-ventilated barn at the same amount of feed and made the same gain in weight as those fed in an open shed.

The profit per lamb was 94 cents per head in a barn, as compared with \$1.04 per head in an open shed.

Although feed was high in price, the margin in value of feeding and fat lambs was sufficient to insure a satisfactory profit on the operation.

FERTILITY LOSS IN PASTURES

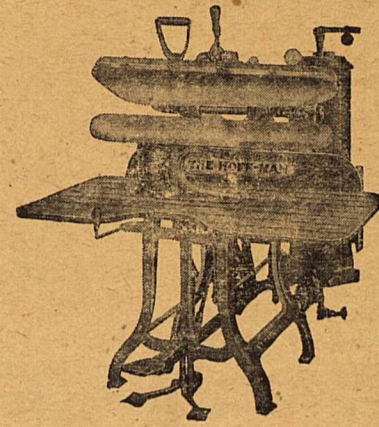
Steady Drain of Phosphorus From Land Where Sheep Are Grazed Is Seen by Expert.

(By DR. CHARLES E. THORNE, Ohio Experiment Station.)

Even when permanent pastures are grazed by so perfect a manure producer as the sheep, it is evident that in the bones of the young stock grown upon it and sent to market there must be a steady drain of phosphorus and lime, which must ultimately become manifest in reduced production, and experience has shown that the use of phosphatic fertilizers upon such pastures produces a marked increase in the production of grass.

Bohemia and the War

"Bohemian National Alliance of America which numbers eighty thousand members and is the principal organization of Bohemian speaking people in the United States, addressed to its membership the following appeal which was given a prominent space in some fifty Bohemian newspapers.

"No one in America was keen for the war, not even our people who had so many reasons to desire the destruction of the German and Austrian system of military, absolutist rule. Our president for more than two years bore with insults and injuries offered by Germany, knowing that the people were not yet ready for war. But God make blind those whom they want to punish. The Kaiser and the clique of courtiers and generals which today rule Germany and its vassal, Austria Hungary went too far in their contempt of the American people and their president. The tremendous resource in wealth and manhood of the world's greatest republic will now be thrown into the scale and make absolutely certain the victory of the democratic nations.

The system under which we lived formerly as Austrian subjects is doomed.

"We want to impress upon all members of the Bohemian National Alliance the duties which war lays upon all citizens of this country. Above all it is the duty of fighting for the land you made your own, to which most of you swore allegiance, the land which is dedicated to the eternal principles of justice and rule by the people. The president asks for volunteers. Prove to him that the Bohemian immigrant yields to no one in his devotion to the starry banner of America. Many of our young members are already in Canada ready to go to the trenches in France. Now a more imperious voice calls upon us to offer the supreme sacrifice fight for the cause we believe in and for the land to which we owe allegiance.

"All of us, old and young, men and women, have to conduct our selves as citizens of a country which is at war with a powerful unscrupulous antagonist. Forget all differences, especially of politics, stand firmly behind the president and the constituted authorities, say little, keep your dyes and ears open for hostile or disloyal acts, practice economy in family and personal outgo, buy the government's bonds and do your share without grudging to make our cause victorious.

"When the fighting is over and diplomats come together to settle affairs of all humanity by means of a just and lasting peace we know that the voice of America, now one of the arbiters of the world's destinies, will be heard in favor of liberty for Bohemia, freedom for our brothers upon which the hated German rule rested so heavily. For we ask for Bohemia the very thing which Bohemia has always championed: rule of the people, for the people by the people. Dr. L. J. Fisher." Seymour Banner.

RIGHT PRECAUTIONS TO USE

In Case of Outbreak of Hog Cholera Everything Should Be Done to Prevent Spread of Disease.

When cholera breaks out on the farm, the dogs should be tied up—the live stock should be shut out of the hog pen, and the wagon wheels should be disinfected so as not to carry the disease from this farm to the neighbors, or even to scatter the germs along the road. The farmer should not leave the infected pig pen without a thorough dipping of his shoes, rubbers or rubber boots in a solution of water and creolin. Lime should be scattered in the buildings which are occupied by the sick pigs.

Every pig or hog that dies should be buried at least four feet deep in the ground or should be burned. A small trench open at both ends and covered with pieces of iron or with a piece of hog fence will make a good oven in which to burn all hogs that die of cholera.

The hog wallow should be eliminated and a hog bath tub made to take its place. Fill it with clean water and put in a small amount of coal tar dip. The pigs can be fed wood or coal ashes with a little sulphur scattered over them.

Value of Sweet Clover.

Sweet clover cut at the proper stage has a high feeding value, resembling alfalfa in this, as it does in appearance. Cattle and sheep do not eat it as readily at the start as is the case with other hay, owing to the peculiar aroma of the plant, but those who have tried it out thoroughly claim that they soon become accustomed to it and eat it as readily as they do clover or alfalfa hay.

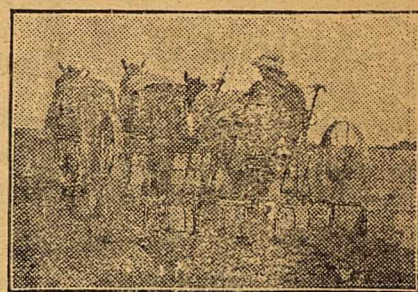

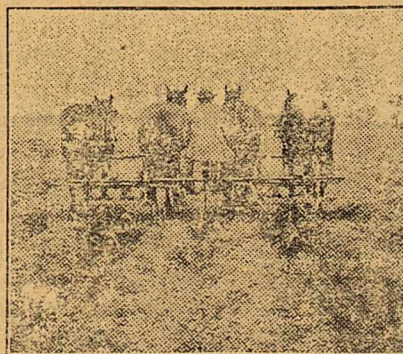

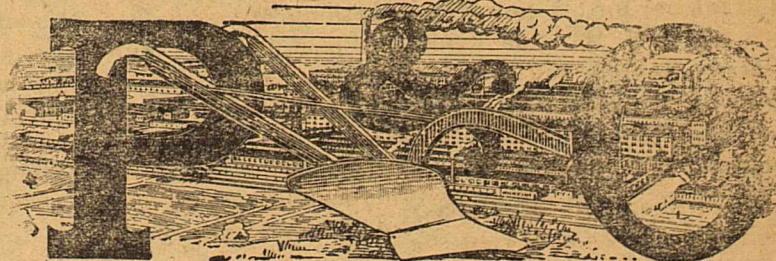
