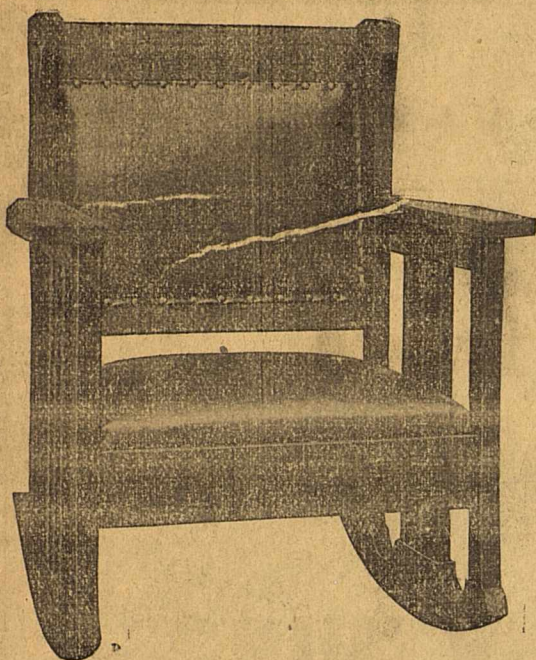
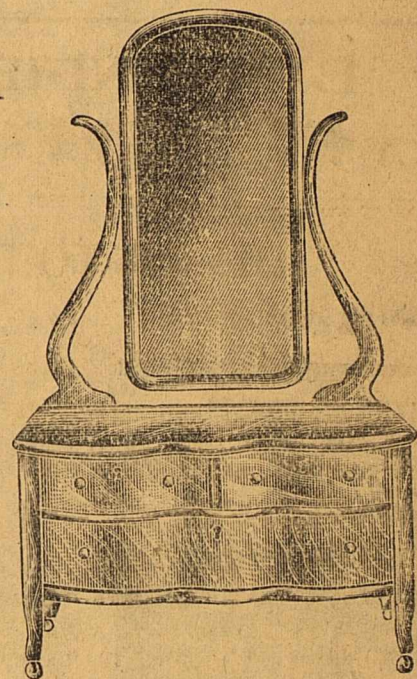

### No Pipe Dream.

Houston, Texas June 25th.

America's legions which in the dreams of some of the nation's great men were to "spring to arms over night" and take up the battle for freedom and humanity are as yet "dream legions". Three months have gone by since the declaration of war. The President of the United States has issued a call for recruits; the Governor of every State has called upon the citizens to come forward and join the National Guard. Immediate need of men to go into training has been herald in newspapers, from the stump and in brilliant colored placards which line the billboard in cities and along the countryside.

Yet America's legions have not "sprung to arms".

Is America asleep? Are the people indulging in pipe dreams? Has talk of the desperation of Germany, internal trouble and the weakening of the German forces wooed this nation into the belief the War will easily be won?

A cartoon in a magazine of recent date pictures the average American citizen reclining on a bed of ease, smoking a "Dream Pipe". He is indulging in the pleasing dreams of "the early collapse of Germany", "Magic submarine exterminator", "easy victory", "U. S. armies in Europe immediately", "food problem solved". A smile wreaths his face. There is no hint in his appearance of troublesome times, nor sacrifices, nor War.

Yet the Nation, big men admit it, faces the gravest period in its history. Not only is Germany's military strength unimpaired; not only is her economic condi-

tions better than that of any of the countries of the entente allies; not only is her submarine campaign bearing a fruitful return in sunken ships, but in her determination to crush democracy has grown with progress of War.

Three years of carnage has not satisfied the desire of the German Kaiser. His recent

note to the deposed King Constantine of Greece in which he declared "the mailed fist of Germany will avenge you", does not mean that the German Emperor is tiring of the struggle. But it does indicate that autocracy, in the mind of the Emperor must reign supreme, and democracy must be crushed.

In view of these conditions,

does it appear America will have an "easy victory"?

Army officers do not believe so. Some of them freely predict the war will last three to five years longer. And America must win the War.

Texas has been called upon to do her part. Texas has been asked to provide 12,000 additional sturdy, strong hearted men for the National Guard. Within a few short weeks the Nation will call upon Texas to deliver this number of first class fighting men.

Texas has already contributed 4000 National Guardsmen. But she must do more and, probably more.

Throughout the State units of the Guard are being rapidly recruited. By July 1st, it is expected the new regiments will be filled. The Nation expects to receive the new division by August 5.

Texas must not hesitate. The Lone Star Republic would not have been born, if Texans of that generation had waited for some one else to step forward. Now is the time when the Texans of this generation may show they have the same "stuff" that their forefathers displayed when they wrestled Liberty from Santa Anna.

If Texans of this generation don't display this bravery, if they do not come forward to battle for the freedom which the blood of their forefathers won, the deeds of those old heroes will have been for naught.

Do as your forefathers did. Take up the battle for freedom and Liberty.

There is a National Guard unit organizing in your town or nearby. Obey the impulse to be a man.

## Drilling For Oil in Andrews County.

Although rumors have been afloat for several weeks that oil leases had been secured on several thousand acres of land in the West end of Andrews county, little significance was attached to the rumors until the first of the week, when six big wagon loads of drilling machinery passed through Andrews enroute to ranch until recently owned by F. M. Knight, now property of Burl Holloway. The drill which is a star rig was brought overland from Lamesa, we understand.

The drill was set Tuesday and actual drilling is now in progress three miles south of the ranch house.

When interviewed Monday by the writer, Mr. Holloway stated frankly that he did not know who was behind the drilling; that he gave W. J. Morgan & Son, real estate agents of Midland, a 12 month option on the land and that they had given leases to unknown parties. "But", said Mr. Holloway, "I have reasons to believe that the Santa Fe. Liquid air is poorly adapted to the uses which were suggested for it when it was first made in large quantities—that is, for refrigeration and for power. Its latent heat of evaporation is small and its specific heat is also small. It cannot compete with ammonia for refrigeration. It cannot be kept in a closed vessel, but must always have a vent to the air. For explosives many better materials are available. It is used to some extent to secure the oxygen of the air by first liquefying the air and then boiling off the nitrogen, which boils at a lower temperature than the oxygen.

## The Tax on Automobiles.

On and after July 1, 1917, all motor vehicles must be provided with a number plate or marker provided by the State Highway Department of the state—said plate to be replaced at the cost of the owner if same is lost.

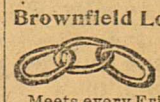

## FARM ANIMALS

TIMELY HINTS OF SHEEPFOLD

Animals of Medium Grade Lack Condition and Quality Necessary to Bring Best Market Prices.

Why are pure-bred sheep the best for mutton? Because both lambs and sheep of the medium grade lack the condition and quality necessary to bring the best prices on the market.

Poorly bred sheep as a rule have long, loosely-coupled bodies with little spring of rib and rough outline, and are coarse and often paunchy. This class of animals is not desirable, and market buyers make the best of their bad points.

A good thing to remember when lambing time comes on: A lamb that is so badly chilled that it appears to be dead, may be revived by pouring down its throat a half pint of warm milk, into which a tablespoonful of gin has been poured. If there is no gin in the house, dip the lamb in a tubful of warm water, dry it off with

a rough cloth and place it near the stove. Get some warm milk into its stomach, if possible, and in a few minutes it will be as frisky as ever.

A bunch of sheep will clean up the cornfield in which the stalks are left standing in fine shape. They strip off the blades and pick up every kernel of stray corn left on the ground.

The great loss of lambs is, in some instances, due almost entirely to the fact that the ewes are allowed to run down and become weak before weaning time.

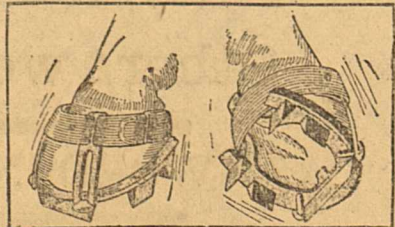
The quality of the market lamb depends largely upon the first four weeks of its life. Given a good boost then, he will, with reasonably good care, prove very satisfactory at market time.

If sheepmen will take the pains to dip their sheep at least twice before the winter sets in they will save much loss from ticks and scab. This takes time and some trouble, of course, but it pays.

Many farmers have the idea that after sheep are shorn, the ticks will abandon them. Certainly they do to some extent, but they immediately go to the lambs, where they find a comfortable nest and make life a burden to the youngsters. Buy a dipping tank and dip regularly twice a year.

### OVERSHOES FOR THE HORSES

A recently patented shoe, designed to save horses on icy streets, consists of an overshoe built to fit over the regular shoe and is kept in place by leather straps which fit neatly around the upper edge of the hoof, says Popu-

lar Mechanics. The overshoe has five large, sharp calks, the largest being in front. One calk on each side prevents skidding or side slipping, while one on each point holds the foot firmly on the pavement. It is made of malleable iron and adds but slightly to the weight of the foot.

### WINTER RATION FOR SHEEP

Feed is a great point in sheep growing. A good winter ration for mutton sheep consists of fine, well-bred hay,

about four pounds of ensilage or roots, with a grain ration approximating the following: Two parts each of wheat bran, oats, corn, one part of oil meal, divided into two feeds a day. The prices for prime mutton are usually best in the winter, after the cull stuff is cleaned up, but the price generally stays on a profitable basis.

Sheep are nervous animals and of rather delicate constitutions, and suffer more from bad ventilation and overcrowding than any other animal on the farm. It is a mistake, therefore, to confine sheep during the winter in close quarters. If kept dry, their fleece will keep them warm.

### BREED ONLY THE BEST SOWS

Animals Showing Poor Feeding and Milking Qualities Should in All Cases Be Avoided.

It is of very great importance that you use for breeding purposes animals that are easy feeders and good sucklers. Sows in many lines of breeding show very poor feeding and milking qualities. The sow that can produce six pigs or more and bring them through to weaning time in good condition is much more valuable to you than the one that will produce that number of pigs and, on account of poor milking qualities, bring them to weaning time in poor condition. By all means avoid poor sucklers and hard feeders.

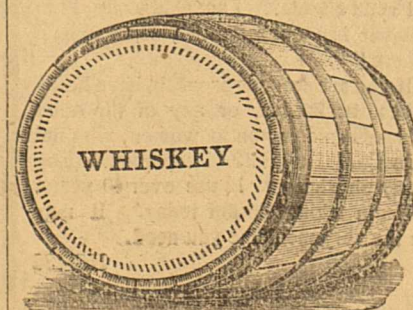

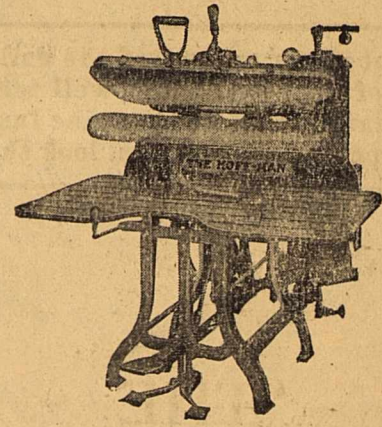
