Some Barbecue

We Claim

About the 13th year of Terry's history in picnic business has been passed, and still there is not a failure, or symbolance to one to her credit, and if the one on August 3rd was catalogued, it would take high place among all of them, in point of numbers and entertainment, along with the abundance of good eats.

Along early in the morning, when the editor was planting beans and peas with the good season in the ground, wagons, buggies and autos were rolling in, and by three in the afternoon the number of autos were estimated at about 900, there being nearly 300 at the goat roping at that time, and they were not missed from the picnic grounds.

Probably 100 automobiles and between 500 and a 1000 people gathered at the station now under construction, about 11 a. m. to see the first passenger train roll in, which brought down about 200 from Lubbock and other points north, and of all the tooting of auto horns and shouts of the people it came off then. It was a history event of our lives. The train was run out from Slaton and contained four day coaches and the private car of the Santa Fe officials. Mr. Sears general superintendent, of Amarillo, Mr. Albert Easing, division superintendent of the Slaton division, and Mr. S. E. Eoss, of Lubbock, assistant to Chief Engineer Felts of this road, were the officials aboard. Conductor J. A. McHugh had charge of the train, and Engineer D. D. Butler was pulling it.

We wish to state here that the officials were well pleased with

Brownfield and surrounding territory, and they promised us local freight just as soon as it was possible to get it. Another thing, when the breakman and engineer saw the table set for dinner, he remarked to a friend that they would not have to pull the train back to Lubbock for dinner, as they did a few years ago when they pulled an excursion to another town, and his words came true.

Before the dinner hour, Judge W. W. Price, in a few and appropriate words welcomed the huge crowd of 3000 or 4000 to Brownfield. He was followed by Judge McGuire, of Lamesa who made a splendid talk on the events of the day, and the future of this great country. Judge McGuire will probably be a candidate for our next District Attorney. He was followed by Judge Geo. W. Neill, who as Secretary of the Railroad Committee, has labored so long and faithfully to get the Santa Fe in Brownfield, he very humorously totaled the many events that have taken place with the committee since he went to work, but added that he had never totaled the "lies" he has told about it. The Lubbock Band then gave us a half hour concert, and dinner was announced.

The nearest failure of the day was when dinner was announced a little premature, before the meats had been brought up, and the first rush to the table got what had been brought, then the crowd took to the deserts, but they soon found that there was abundance of meats, and settled themselves for a good old dinner of barbecued beef, mutton and pork, coffee, light bread, pickles etc. But it is well neigh impossible to handle three thousand

people a day without some flaw and the table committees are to be complimented in handling the situation so well. Probably two or three whole beeves were carried home, after everybody got all they wanted.

In the afternoon Prof. J. D. Sanderfer, President of Simmons College, Abilene, delivered one of the best lectures ever heard here on good roads and good citizenship. Among the other things he said: "You people are not only to be congratulated on getting a railroad, but you are more to be congratulated on getting the Santa Fe, for it is able to do things and do them right."

There was amusement plenty for those who love to see the larriest spin through the air. A Seminole boy got the goat roping prize, having caught and tied his goat in 18 seconds. Then there was dancing for those who like that. Misses Cathering Powell and Mary Joe Neill, had charge of the Red Cross booth, and did good business both in getting new members and collecting funds.

The day passed off peaceable and quietly, there being absolutely no disorderly conduct on the grounds all day. You will hear of another big one next year.

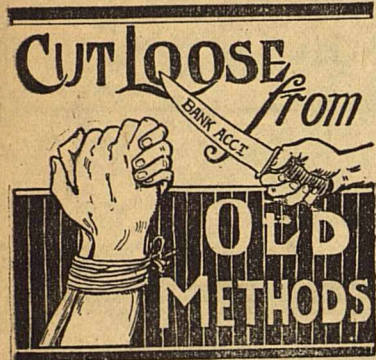

Farm Labor Mobilization.

Upon the farmer rests a large measure of responsibility of winning the war in which we are now involved. The importance to the Nation of food and clothing, especially for the present year, cannot be over-emphasized. The world's food reserve, and of raw materials for manufacture of clothing and other necessities is very low. Not only our own consumers, but much of the world at large must rely more completely than ever before upon the American farmer.

One of the principal limiting elements of production on the farm is the shortage in the supply of labor, and the haphazard methods and lack of system heretofore used in securing uniformity in distribution of farm labor.

In order to secure the greatest possible uniformity in distribution of farm labor, and to offset the shortage that now exists, especially throughout the South and West, the United States Department of Agriculture, cooperating with the State Labor Department, the Co operative

Extension Department of the A. & M. College of Texas, the Texas State Council of Defense, the State Department of Agriculture and a number of other State departments, has undertaken the mobilization of farm labor in Texas.

Under the plan adopted the United States Department of Agriculture has appointed a "State Farm Help Specialist", whose office is with the State Department of Labor, and who has the direction of the work in Texas. In counties having a county demonstration agent of the Extension Department of the A. & M. College, the county agent becomes the county man of the mobilization work. In counties having no county demonstration agent, some one is selected by the State Farm Help Specialist to act as county man.

It is the duty of the "County Man" to thoroughly inform himself of farm labor conditions in his county, to secure the services of as many community men as possible to assist him in the work by keeping him in touch with all the farmers and farm laborers in the county, to make assignments of labor

where necessary within his own county and to perform any other service to the farmers and farm laborers that will be of assistance in supplying the demands for labor and in keeping the labor employed.

In case of a shortage of labor in the county, the "County Man" will enroll the names of the farmers wanting help, stating the number of laborers wanted, the kind of work to be done, the wages to be paid, whether with or without board and such other information as may be necessary and immediately forward to the State Farm Help Specialist. In case of a surplus of labor in the county, the "County Man" will enroll the names of all persons available for farm labor giving age, sex, nationality, kind of work desired, wages demanded and such other information as may be necessary and forward to the State Farm Help Specialist.

Upon receipt of a report of a shortage or surplus of labor from any county man the State Farm Help Specialist will immediately proceed to fill any shortage from any surplus that may exist in another county, always making assignments from other counties nearest the county in which the shortage exists in order to minimize the cost of transportation.

All farmers who are wanting help, or who will want help, and all laborers who are seeking employment on farms should immediately get in touch with their "County Man" or if there is no county man in county, with T. C. Jennings, State Farm Help Specialist, Box 266, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, and be enrolled. This service is absolutely free, no cost to either farmer or the laborer.

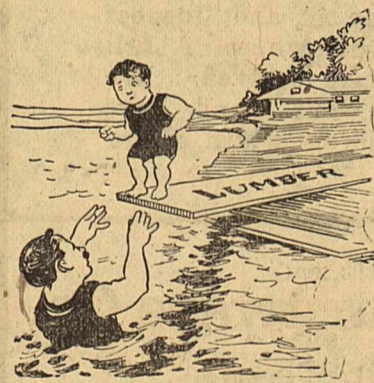

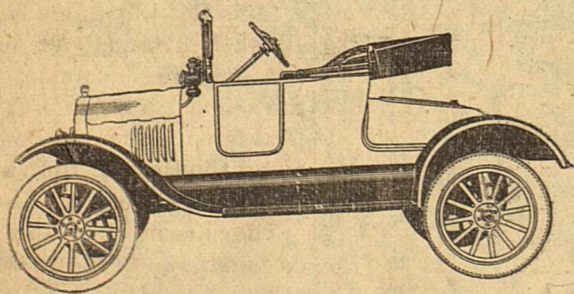

JOB WORK

Open Letter

Quanah, Texas, 7-30-1917.
Mr. J. B. Overton,
Lubbock, Texas.

Dear Sir:—Have been intending writing you for some little time relative to the building of the Brownfield gin, but as I was unable to give you any definite information in regard thereto, have kept putting it off until the present time. It is of course, of sincere regret to us that we are unable to proceed with the construction work at that point, but due to difficulty in obtaining materials and the short crops down there, we cannot see our way clear to go ahead this season. We realize, of course, that you were particularly interested in getting this gin built, and as you have promised the people in that territory that we would put up a first class modern gin plant, and it will no doubt be some embarrassment to you to explain to them that we are not going to proceed with the work, but just want to say that the causes are beyond our control, or we would go ahead with it. In order to put you next to the situation, will say that we thought we had the lumber bought for the plant three different times, but each time the order was cancelled before shipment was made and we just had our last order cancelled within the last two weeks, and now it is absolutely too late to think of trying to build the plant. There is another thing too, that we have not received shipping papers on, and that is our power plant. We placed the order for a first class, automatic self oiling engine, with steel jacketed boiler, some three months ago, and have been unable to receive shipping papers covering same. We have written the manufacturers of the steam plant, and they advise us that most of their material is in requisition by the government, and that they do not know when they will be able to ship, so you see our hands are tied in the matter and even if crop conditions were good, am afraid it would be impossible to build the gin this season.

In view of these facts, believe you should have no difficulty in the people in that territory that our intentions were good, and we fully contemplate building the gin another season, regardless of crop conditions.

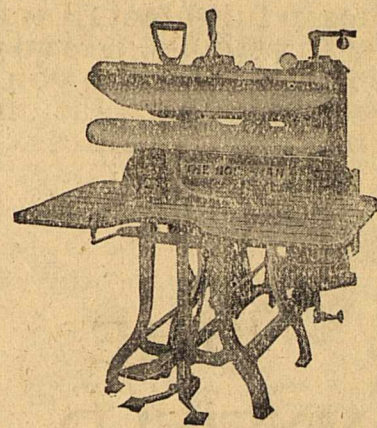
