Of course, we realize that our read ers back east haveallseen trains even our Arkansaw readers, but none of them have seen the picture of a train coming into the city of Brownfield.

This pictur e was made Friday afternoon, June 15th, in what is now known as the Santa Fe addition, but steel was not layed into Brownfield proper, until June 16th.

We might mention here that the Santa Fe has utmost confi derce in the future of our town, for they are spending money by the thousands here and putting in very substantial improve-

They are building a depot 24x 100 feet, that architecturally, is a beauty. In connection, there will be 400 feet of platforms.


Their water work system will meet all requirements, and will be piped to the depot, and across the tract to the agent's home, also to the section foreman's home and the houses built for the section hands.
