#### Showing the Train

In this issue of the Herald, and for the benefit of our foreign readers, we are showing a cut of the incoming work train laying steel into Brownfield. Of course, we realize that our readers back east have all seen trains even our Arkansaw readers, but none of them have seen the picture of a train coming into the city of Brownfield.

This picture was made Friday afternoon, June 15th, in what is now known as the Santa Fe addition, but steel was not laid into Brownfield proper, until June 16th.

We might mention here that the Santa Fe has utmost confidence in the future of our town, for they are spending money by the thousands here and putting in very substantial improvements.

They are building a depot 24x100 feet, that architecturally, is a beauty. In connection, there will be 400 feet of platforms.

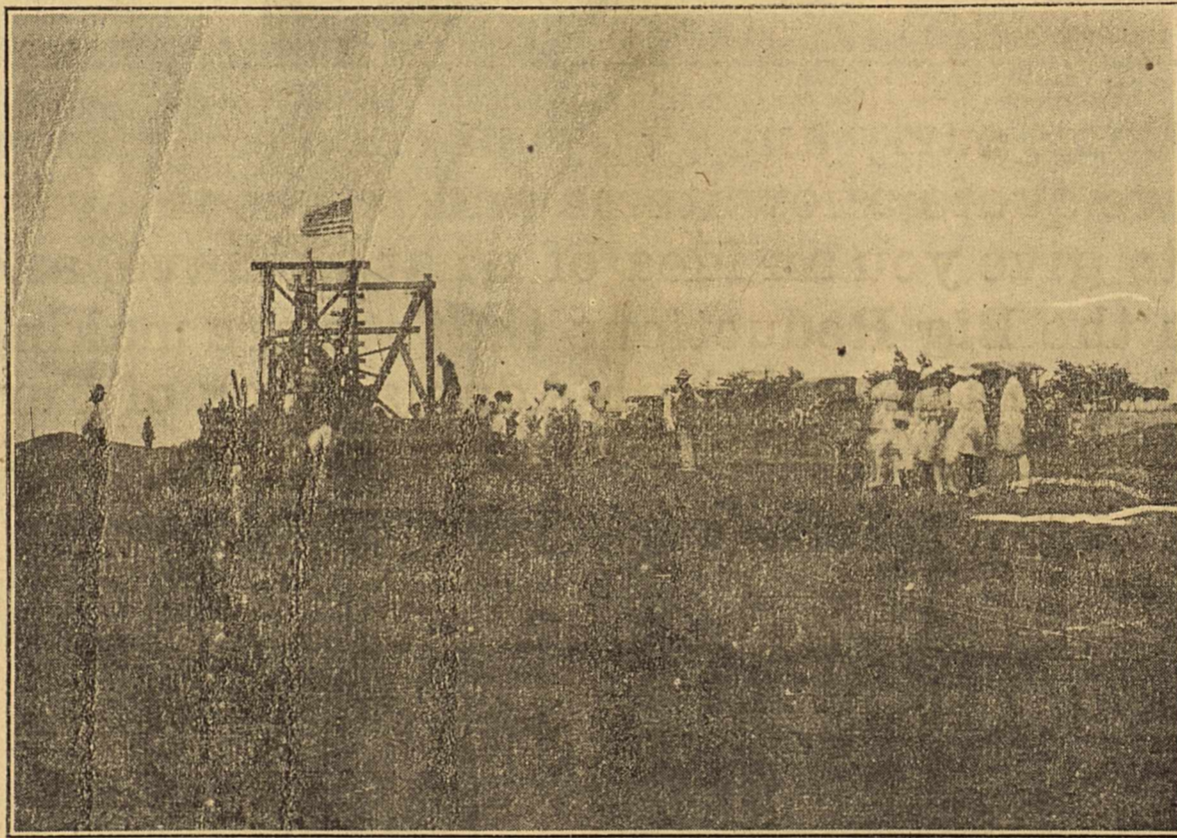
Their water work system will meet all requirements, and will be piped to the depot, and across the tract to the agent's home, also to the section foreman's home and the houses built for the section hands.

### Touring Europe

Iredell Record: A few years ago we all wanted to go to Europe and regreted that we were not financially able to go. Now we are offered all expences paid and a good salary while we are gone, but most of us have changed our minds and don't want to go at all.

Several hundred thousand young Americans will visit Europe the coming year, with all transportation expences paid, including meals, and medical treatment for those who get seasick, in addition to free steamship tickets, complete outfit of clothing and a minium salary of \$33 a month. They will be required to do some work in Europe, but as most of them will be used to work they wont mind it very much. Also about one in thirty of them may get hurt if they stayed at home and drove automobiles or tried to cross busy streets where others were driving automobiles. Of course some of those who are destined to go on this European tour might prefer not to go, if choice was left to them. But after they do go, and come back, they will admit that they wouldnt have missed the adventure for any amount of money. The leading Americans of the next two decades will be those who will go to

Europe in the years 1917-18. They will take precedence in American politics, business and society. There will be discomforts and risks and many harsh experinces for these young American in Europe, but there will also be rewards.—Dallas News

### The Silo Conserved Feed

It is highly important to save the largest amount of feed this fall. The silo will preserve 90 per bent of the entire feed crop,

which if cured in the field loses 50 to 60 per cent. And the field cured forage soon becomes unpalatable and wastes greatly in the feed lot; silage does not.

This is a live stock country. every additional pound added to to the weight of the steer, lamb and hog means extra profit. Prices will stay up. Cattle have been rushed to market in unheard of numbers the first seven months of this year. The July record at ten leading markets is 1,161,369 head and for the seven months 7,338,965 head of cattle a net increase of 1,595,303 head or 27.77 per cent and for July 52 43percent.

Drouth conditions in the south west and high priced caused this rush to market. This section faces a golden opportunity. Every hoof retained at home until their is a material gain in weight will aid to increase the short meat supply of the nation and also pay handsomely.

This will require feed and feed therefore must be carefully saved. The silo never was so necessary. Some food crops may not mature. These may be preserved in the silo. Every pound of feed thus saved will make more beef, pork ,mutton and butter. It is patriotic and profitable.

There is yet ample time to build more silos. The cost, even in these days of high prices, is not prohibitive. Talk it over with the banker, the business man and the county agent.

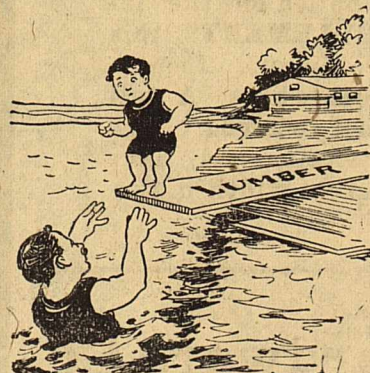

## Roswell After Midland & Northwestern Railway

The following appeared in the El Paso Herald of August 4th:

Roswell, N. M. Aug. 3.—A railroad to give this principal city of the Pecos river valley an outlet to the east is the subject that has the attention of a committee of ten business men, appointed after an enthusiastic meeting of 250 citizens had heard explained the project of M. B. Hereley, of Chicago, who was here a week ago and gave a luncheon to a group of local men at which he set his project in motion. The committee of ten has set out to secure a bonus of \$200,000 to be given to Mr. Hereley upon the entrance of the proposed railroad into the city. The promoter agrees, it is understood, to connect the road with

the Santa Fe at Brownfield or the Midland & Northwestern at Seminole. The cost of connection would be \$2,000,000, it was said.

Under the terms of the project trains would be running over the road into Roswell within 18 months. Hereley has spoken of an extension from Roswell to the Capitan coal and iron field. One said at the meeting that Roswell paid the Santa Fe system \$100,000 a year. The committee named includes J. F. Hinkle, C. C. Tannehill, Clark Dilley, L. O. Fullen, J. J. Jafa, Roy Ammerman, R. F. Jenkins, F. M. Avis, and John W. Rhea. Mr. Hereley who is said by some local men to represent the Santa Fe in its westward extension from Lubbock into the valley, with ultimate destination through Carlsbad, in El Paso, Texas, is looked

for here again soon. He was advised of the local efforts begun.

A proposal was looked for at the meeting from the builder of the Midland & Northwestern, but it was not received.

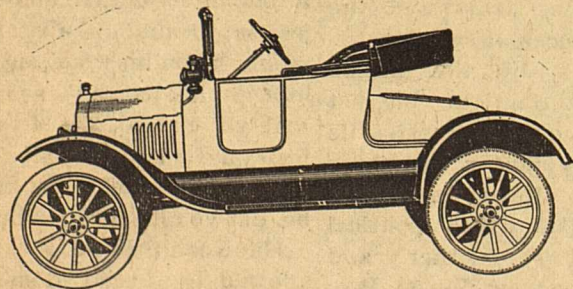

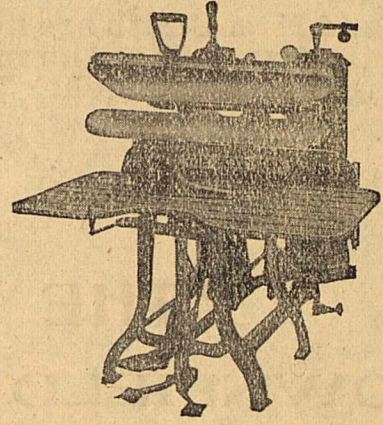
