### Testing Out The

### Big Well

Mr. Wright, the contracting driller of the Santa Fe well, has successfully cased off the lower strata of water, pulled the casing up to the top stratum, incerted a five inch piping with a five inch cylinder, and has given it the twenty four hour test, as required by the company.

As we went by there Wednesday night Mr. Wright informed us that it had then been going for several hours at an even clip of 50 gallons per minute, which is 30,000 gallons in a ten hour day, and as much water as the company will need here for a long time yet, though Mr. Wright said the well was not doing anything like its capacity for the reason the sand strainer at the bottom is so fine that the water cannot come in nearly as fast as it can be pumped out.

This is a fine well yet no better than any farmer can have on their place here, and with such a well and five acres of land a man can make a living, yes, money, right here, the dryest years that come. M. V. Brownfield has estimated that such a well will easily irregate 25 acres of land, and we believe his estimate is very conservative.

# JOB WORK

### URGED TO EAT MORE RABBITS

English People Asked to Make Use of Wild Animals and Birds to Relieve Food Shortage.

It has been suggested by the food controller that more use should be made of the wild animals and birds which abound in the country, says a writer in the London Mail. Rabbits, wood pigeons and sparrows have been specially mentioned.

All three are a plague in the country today, and to make a systematic raid on them for food purposes would serve two useful ends. Rabbits are eaten chiefly between harvest time and the end of March, but they drift to the kitchen at all seasons. By systematic snaring or trapping great numbers could be available as a regular supply for the people of a district or for dispatch to the towns.

Wood pigeons as well as rabbits were recommended by the board of agriculture soon after the outbreak of war as forming "an excellent meat diet." Wood pigeons, or ring doves, abound in all wooded districts in autumn, winter and early spring, but they are exceedingly difficult birds to bring down in any number owing to their extreme cunning. It is only by well concerted shoots extending over a wide area that a supply of pigeons can be obtained. Through lack of men able to take part in such shoots no appreciable difference has been made in the number of wood pigeons during the war. For the table they are cooked as a rule in a pie with a few pieces of beef or salt pork.

### Fish Force-meat.

Three cupfuls pounded raw haddock or fresh cod, one-half teaspoonful salt, two tablespoonfuls melted butter, one-half cupful rich milk or cream, few grains nutmeg, two tablespoonfuls cornstarch, one-eighth teaspoonful pepper, or less if liked less highly seasoned.

To prepare fish, scrape the white, raw flesh from the bones and skin. About a pound and three-quarters will be needed, put the flesh through the foodchopper, then into a bowl, and rub with a potato masher till it is thoroughly broken up and very smooth. Add the other ingredients in the order given, transfer into a well-buttered mold or pan and bake for 30 minutes.

Serve it with desired sauce. When cold, it may be sliced, dipped in flour, and fried as any fish is, or it may be cut into cubes, combined with diced lobster, and served with white sauce; or it may be combined with cubes of roast veal and heated in brown gravy, or with bits of cooked cauliflower and celeriac.

### How to Cook Leg of Lamb.

To properly cook a leg of lamb, considering both flavor and economy, have it boned and rolled by your butcher. Be sure he sends you the bone and meat the day before it is to be eaten. As soon as it comes put bones in a kettle with cold water, an onion, and season with salt and pepper. Let simmer for three-quarters of an hour. When this comes to a boil put in the meat and keep at a constant boil for two hours. Take out meat and boil down liquor, then strain and cool. The next day take off fat, put in half a cupful barley and boil till tender. This will make delicious soup. The leg should now be covered with the fatty membrane that has been taken off the leg. This will give it flavor and serve to baste the meat. Bake in oven about one hour.

### Butter Icing.

A rich and delicious icing for cake, which surpasses any boiled icing, is made as follows: Cream one heaping tablespoonful butter with one and a half cupfuls pulverized sugar. Add the beaten yolk of one egg and stir until perfectly smooth. Flavor with orange extract or a little orange and lemon juice. It should be stiff enough so that it will spread easily and not drip from the cake.

### Cocoa Cake Without Eggs.

Mix four tablespoonfuls butter with one cupful sugar. Add one cupful buttermilk and one and one-half cupfuls flour which has been sifted with one teaspoonful soda and one-half cupful cocoa, one teaspoonful vanilla, one-half teaspoonful salt.

### For Quick Cooling.

If you wish to cool anything very quickly take a vessel of cold water and squeeze the blue bag into it until it becomes dark blue. Then add a handful of salt, and in this water place your jug of lemonade or milk or blancmange, or jelly.

### When Boiling Rice.

A teaspoonful of lemon juice added to a quart of water in which rice is to be boiled will make the rice very white and will keep the grains separate when boiled.

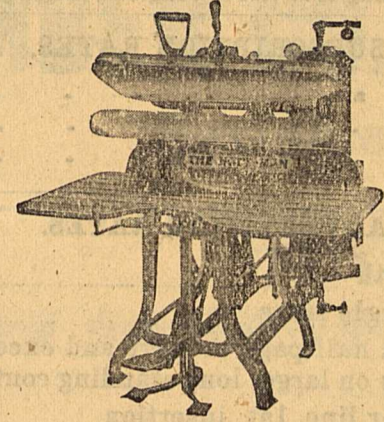

### Date of First Frost

Truckers and gardeners plant-

ing for late crops should be aided in determining their "best bets" on the first frost by referring to this historical summary of frost occurrences in various sections, recently issued by the United States Weather Bureau.

Killing frost has never occurred earlier than September 10 south of the extreme southwestern portion of South Dakota, extreme southern Minnesota, central Wisconsin, and the interior portion of lower Michigan. It has never occurred earlier than Oct. 1 south of the extreme north portions of Oklahoma and Arkansas, southern Tennessee, and the mountain districts of North Carolina and Virginia. It has never occurred earlier than Oct. 20 to the southeastward of the extreme northeastern portion of Texas, northern Louisiana, the central portions of Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and eastern North Carolina.—Weekly News Letter.

**Will Not Seize**

**Home Food**

There is no truth in a widely circulated statement that the Government expects to take food supplies from any family. Both the Food Administration and the Department of Agriculture join in a statement to contract what seems to be a deliberate propaganda to the effect that the Government intends to take from every family all canned goods put up in excess of 100 quarts.

This is only one of the variations of the rumor, which has been widely circulated. Another statement is that the Government has been urging the canning, drying and the preserving of fruits and vegetables so that they will be in a convenient form for the Government to handle and transport when it takes them away from the people. Further elaborations is that these goods are to be taken from American homes and shipped to England.

**SPECIFIC INSTANCE CITED**

In one instance a motorist stopped at a farm house to fill the radiator of his automobile. In the course of conversation he casually inquired whether the farmer's family was canning all the surplus fruits and vegetables in order to help conserve the food supply. He was informed that the farmer was not doing this because the Government intended to take all the canned goods away except a small part of it actually needed by the family itself.

The authorities state emphatically that no such course has ever been contemplated by the Government. On the contrary, both the Department of Agriculture and the Food Administration are strongly urging housewives to can and preserve, especially at this time all surplus fruits and vegetables in order that the households themselves have a cheap and plentiful supply of food.

## SIDEWALKS AND COLD GERMS

Relationship Between the Two Traced to Conditions Which Result in Getting Feet Wet.

That a close relationship exists between sidewalks and grip epidemics is asserted in Good Health by Martin Nevins. Grip and colds, says Mr. Nevins, are germ diseases. Germs are floating about us in the air. We breathe them in by the thousands. "But they are cowardly fellows—once they get inside of a healthy body they retreat." He goes on:

"It is only when one thing or another disturbs our health equilibrium that the 'bugs' manage to gain a foothold in our system. It may be injudicious eating, it may be lack of fresh air, but most frequently it is some kind of exposure—getting the feet wet—that lays the fortress open to them.

"It is not at all hard to get your feet wet. And that is where the sidewalk comes in. The ordinary sidewalk is a right-hand assistant when you want a cold foot bath. It is built flat, without any slope to drain it.

The condition is aggravated if there occurs a natural depression in the sidewalk. The water runs into it and stands until it is dried or is frozen. The natural result is a harvest of grip epidemics, and any number of colds, bronchitis and lung troubles. And tuberculosis, too—this disease can often be traced to sidewalks, since it usually starts with some simple lung affection.

"We must stop building flat sidewalks and make them convex instead, so they will drain easily, and elevate them slightly above the level of the ground."

## EFFECT OF MIND-WANDERING

Day-Dreaming With a Purpose is All Right but Much Time is Lost in Kind That Serves No Purpose.

Have you ever stopped to think how much time is lost in mind-wandering?

How many times during the day do you let your thoughts wander from the main task at hand? And once a person's thoughts start wandering, how they skip from one link of recollections to another until a chain of wasted moments is forged!

Mind-wandering seems to be a general characteristic of the human race, but those who have succeeded in conquering the characteristic and concentrating upon the task at hand have been the men who have moved ahead in the business and professional world.

Day-dreaming is all right when the dreams are busy with plans for promoting business methods or with ideas for practical inventions—and when other work is not being neglected.

The inventor of the steam engine, watching the steam in a kettle lifting the top of the pot and day-dreaming about what that power might be made to accomplish—was not wasting his time, but was advancing the human race.

Useful day-dreaming is all right, but mind-wandering should be relegated to the scrap heap.—Arkansas Democrat.

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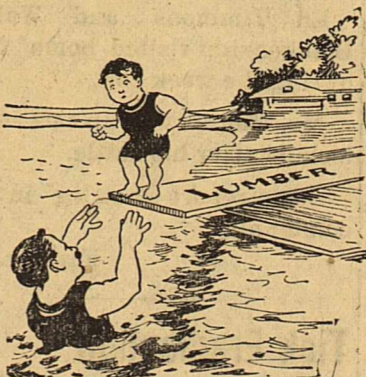

### Tick Eradication Booming

Washington, D. C. Oct. 2nd. With active work for tick eradication proceeding in 332,251 square miles of southern territory, the United States Department of Agriculture and State officials are decidedly hopeful that their cooperative goal—"a South entirely free from the cattle fever in 1921"—will be attained. Twenty thousand eight hundred and eighty two dipping vats were in commission in August and during that month 522,541 different herds, comprising 4,316,554 cattle were being dipped regularly every two weeks. A force of 1,901 Federal State, and county inspectors were actively employed in the work of getting rid of the cattle pest. When the territory now being worked is entirely freed from ticks there will remain only a comparatively small quarantined territory in the entire south.

Mississippi led with 187,330 herds and 1,373,952 cattle dipped regularly in 6,583 vats. This work it is believed, shortly will clean out the ticks from 45,176 square miles of territory

and free the entire State from quarantine this year. Louisiana was second in number of cattle dipped and Alabama third, each dipping over 660,000 animals. Arkansas was a close fourth with 648,000 animals dipped.

Texas, where dipping recently has become active, is handling 295,592 cattle, but leads all the States in area handled, with over 65,000 square miles being worked. Florida, where cattle are not so numerous, second area covered, with 53,111 square miles. One of the most hopeful signs is that the State legislatures of Georgia, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas and Arkansas have made the dipping of cattle to eradicate ticks compulsory.
