When he joined the colors Committee and Uncle Sam took him in charge, life for him took on a new meaning. He saw a chance to do something and be something. He woke up. His captain says he is twice the man he was when he joined the army. This may be one of the extreme cases," said Uncle Dam. "I can tell you, though, that war or no war, no one thing will do the young men of this nation so much good in so short a time as a few months of intensive military taniming. It fits a man to fight his own life battles in the business world as well as to defend his country and its flag. "Nearly every civilized country gives its boys military training. It is compulsory. It is based upon the fact that it is the duty of everyone to help de-

fend his country; and as was is now carried on, no one can do much unless, he is trained. Also, the records show that the killed and wounded among untrained troops is nearly three times as great as it is with well-trained men who know how to fight and how to protect themselves. By this plan a nation has trained men to defend her and the individual is a stronger and better man for the training.

"If the Chamberlain Bill for Millitary Training is passed by congress, as it ought to be, the same thing would be done for millions of other young men throughout the land. Everybody ought to demand of his congressman and senators the passage of this bfill.'
