As we get ready to go to press, we learn that Emmett Horton, a nephew of J. M. Brown, who lives eight miles east of town, died at Camp Bowie, Fort worth, this week, of relapse of measles, and his body was shipped here for burial, coming into Lubbock on the early morning train yesterday.

Horton volunteered in the National Guard last spring, and has been in training ever since. He is about eighteen years old.

Upon arrival, his body will be laid to rest in the Brownfield Cemetary. Thus, the first fatality to Terry county soldiers was disease instead of Hun bullets.

A Substitute For Soft Coal

While we are concerned about the high cost of fuel wood and scarcity of coal, I would suggest the use of crude oil for fuel in all stoves, grates, etc., provided for coal burning. Crude oil can be bought for about \$1.75 per barrel. Ordinary brickbats soaked a few hours in crude oil makes a fine substitute for soft coal and will burn several hours, producing a better quality of heat than coal. Sufficient number of bricks should be soaking in oil to replace those that burn out, and those once used can be resoaked in turn as soon as they are cool enough to replace in oil with safety.

This plan should place within reach of many people abundant fuel for cold weather when gas fails, and other fuels cannot be had, and doubtless much cheaper than coal and wood. Near the oil fields this plan has been used for many years both in cooking and heating purposes.

There are many things the people of the United States can be thankful for this year, even out here on the Plains, and west Texas generally, where crops were light, and only the pessimist of the first rank can see nothing to be thankful for. While crops were light with us this year, the highest in the record by odds, there is plenty of money in the country, everybody seems to be in good health and well fed, and our country is not overrun with hords of brutal troops, supposed to be representatives of a civilized country. It is bad enough for them ever to be invaded, much less by hords of Huns. Let us lift up our heads, put on a smile of optimism, for we have nothing of which to complain. The balance of the of the world has made a bumper crop, we won't starve. Get us?

There was some consolation to the newspaper publishers to read Tuesday's dailies, in which there was a dispatch from Washington to the effect that the paper barons just about had their heads under them, and were begging for mercy, and even went so far as to ask the Government to dissolve the American Paper Mfg. Ass'n. Another part that sounded good was the fact that the government had set a price of three cents per pound on paper, wholesale, but the Publishers Association are asking the Government to take charge of the mills, at least till after the war. The report last spring that there was a scarcity of paper was found to be rather fictitious and was sent out only so the barons could add a few more millions to their coffers by raising the price from about three to eight cents per pound. Now, the barons have on a sure enough fight, and are already two thirds whipped but the Publishers Association is not going to let up till they are down with their heads under them, and the latter has the backing of the Federal Government behind them.

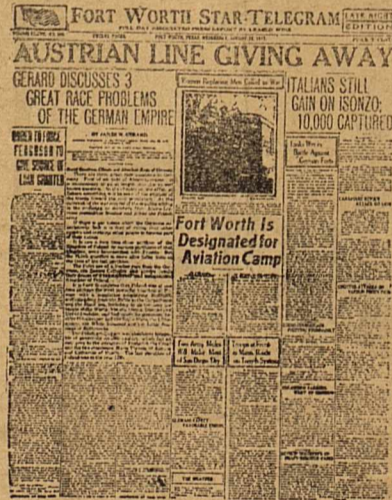
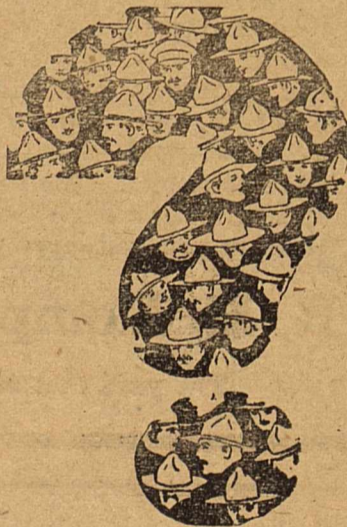

Fight Against Cattle Fever Ticks

Washington, D. C. Nov. 27th. To many farmers in Southern States that have been infested by the cattle fever tick, December 1st will be a day marking an epoch. For on December 1st 65,520 square miles of southern territory, the largest amount ever freed at one time will be liberated from the Federal quarantine placed to prevent the spread of cattle fever.

But in the history of tick eradication there has been another epochal day, one that will remain epochal as long as diseases, lower animals and human, persist on the earth. That day was when the true functions of the cattle fever tick were discovered soon after the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United State Department of Agriculture undertook in 1884 the problem of combating the disease.

The discovery that ticks can carry germs of disease from one animal to another was the first instance in which the important role of insects as carriers of disease was ascertained. From it arose new procedures in preventive sanitation. Since then it has been learned that the mosquito carries malaria and yellow fever; that the rat flea carries bubonic plague; and the house fly, typhoid fever.

Formerly no attention was paid to the carriers. Only treatment of the patients was considered necessary. Now mosquitoes are screened out of buildings and exterminated, rats are killed, house flies are screened, swatted or starved, and the cattle fever tick, to which perhaps the world may owe a debt because its ravages provoked the inquiry which has been of immense importance in the fight against all diseases, is destroyed by arsenic treatment and starvation.

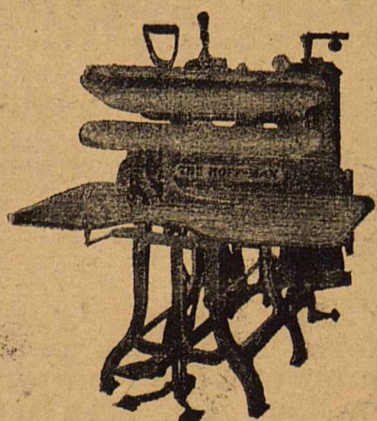

WAR TALKS
By **UNCLE DAN**
Number Five

Jimmie and a German Boy Clash—Must Do Three Things to Save Country.

It was a warm evening, so Uncle Dan went out to a lawn seat under the

spreading branches of the great tree that suggested the farm's name of Oak Hill. Billie and Jimmie had been laying for him, so Uncle Dan was captured by the boys on short order.

"Say, Uncle Dan," Billie began. "We had a red-hot argument at school yesterday with Carl Newman. Carl said that German schools were miles ahead of our schools and that no one could come up to the educated German. Well, Jimmie got hot under the collar and handed it back to him good and plenty. Jimmie said if their education taught them to torpedo Lusitanias, sink hospital ships, murder hundreds of women and children, make slaves of the Belgians, poison wells, destroy fruit trees and commit all sorts of crimes, then we did not want that kind of education here. What do you think about it, Uncle Dan? I told Jimmie you spent a lot of time in Europe and knew all about schools, so give us your opinion."

"Well," replied Uncle Dan, deliberately. "The German schools are very thorough; they furnish exceedingly valuable and practical instruction. The industrial training given there is probably the best to be found. The schools as a whole, however, in my opinion, appeal to the head only, and never to the heart. The aim and trend is to make the individual blindly submissive to the Prussian plan of world dominion; they teach that it is the destiny of Germany to rule the world, and that to the glory and advance of Germany, in this plan, all things must give way; that the kaiser as head of the state, can do no wrong if he carries forward the plan of world control. Some of the greatest teachers and preachers even defend and justify her heartless crushing of Belgians and the many other atrocious crimes she has committed in this war. Thank God, our American education reaches both the head and the heart. It is an education with a soul, and we must maintain the high ideals we have fixed. In a word, in Germany, the people are taught that they exist for the government, while here the government exists to serve the people."

"Just wait a minute," interrupted Billie. "Say that over again slowly, so I can write it down."

Uncle Dan, smilingly, complied.

Billie exclaimed: "Now, we will hand that nut out for Carl to crack. Carl, you know," continued Billie, "has a very smart father who keeps him posted on the German arguments. Carl said our government was only an experiment anyway; that it would not last twenty years, and that it might burst up any old time. Jimmie asked him if Germany was so mighty good, why they did not go back there to live."

"Our government will go on forever, won't it, Uncle Dan?"

"Now," said Uncle Dan, "you are raising a big question, and one that has troubled me for years. Our government is still in the experimental stage; in fact, it is the greatest experiment ever undertaken, and if popular government is to be successful, a few things must be done, otherwise, to paraphrase the great Lincoln, the government of the people, by the people and for the people, will perish. It is my firm conviction," said Uncle Dan, in a very impressive manner, "that if our country is to go on, as we hope and pray, we must very quickly do at least three things, and I will name them in the order of importance as it appears to me:

"First, adopt compulsory universal military training of all young men physically fit before they reach the age of twenty years.

"Next, require that every foreigner who comes here to live must, within a reasonable time, say, a year, declare his intention of becoming an American citizen and take the necessary steps to do so, thereby, from that moment, assuming all the obligations of citizenship of our country, and that means he must defend our flag upon equal terms with our native born, and if he is not willing to do this, he should be sent back from whence he came."

"That's the stuff," exclaimed Billie. "And, finally, enact such legislation as will make voting compulsory. Popular government is based upon the participation of all and the rule of the majority, and democracy cannot continue and be successful unless we live up to the spirit of the institution."

"The first step, however, is the passing of the Chamberlain bill for universal military training. If you will get the leading citizen, and especially the editor of your paper, to write personal letters to your congressman and both senators, urging their support, it will help enormously."

"I see by the morning papers," said Uncle Dan, "that the Rotary clubs of the entire country, the liveliest, most efficient organization to be found, have unanimously decided to get back of the Chamberlain bill and give it loyal and enthusiastic support. They will work with the Universal Military Training league to accomplish this important piece of legislation, which will do more than anything else to make us a real nation with a common viewpoint, bring us back to sane living, and teach us the patriotism of service."

Shall We Erect a High School Building?

There has been considerable talk lately of submitting a bond issue to the voters of the Brownfield school district to see if they want to issue bonds in the sum of from \$25,000.00 to \$30,000.00 for the erection of a high school building, and from what little talk we have heard on the matter the sentiment stands almost solidly for it.

Of course there will be opposition, for the reason that some people are inherently opposed to any any all bond issues for any and all purposes, on the plea of hanging an indebtedness over the heads of future generations. Others may oppose the issue on account of war and already high taxes, and some may say that our present school and building is sufficient for present needs.

The pro-bond man argument is that we must educate the young war or no war; that best results in educational work is obtained when the pupils are not packed like sardines; that education is the cheapest antidote for the elimination of crime, its high cost, heart aches and misery, and that a well educated young man or woman are more able to care for themselves including all inherited bond issues. They also put forth the argument that our own and other great governments, great railroad systems and other big corporations issue bonds when they need money, and think it the quickest and cheapest way to get it. They also advise those that think bond issues such a graft, to let them buy the bonds, and put them away for their heirs to fuss over. Besides, they say, if our town is to keep the pace set by neighboring towns of the same size, we will have to hustle to get our share of prospectors for good school towns. They further cite the fact that some of our citizens are right now paying out money to the tune of \$400 per year on children that still need a mother's protection, and in grades that ought to be taught here, not to mention the constant stream of money going out of the community. They say further that Terry county needs a high school of the first class, and Brownfield is the place for it.

But, the purpose of this article is not to present any argument, pro or anti, or to air our individual preferences. However, we do wish to say that our school facilities should be kept up to or in advance of the town's develop-

ment, but personally we are opposed to any makeshift building to answer present needs and all to be done over again in a few years. Let's build when we do build, for years to come and have it over, not forgetting to vote enough money to finish what we propose to build, but enough extra to thoroughly equip each department, together with adequate heating and lighting plants, fire protection, etc.

Post, Texas has recently completed just such a building as we crave for Brownfield at a cost of \$26,000.00. It not only has sufficient class rooms, but manual training department, domestic science, laboratory, etc. A photo of this building may be seen at M. A. Smith's store.

We understand that A. M. Brownfield, one of our hustling trustees, has set aside a beautiful location of five acres in the heart of the resident section of the city for a high school building, and a nice building would look good on it.

20,000 Cattle Starving In Texas.

There are enough cattle starving to death in a strip of land the size of Germany in Texas to feed all the United States soldiers in France for two years.

That is the way the livestock problem was characterized by Charles McCarthy, special representative of Herbert Hoover who returned recently from an investigation of the cattle condition in Texas. There are 20,000 head of cattle starving to death in Texas, and our cattle raisers are asking help from our Government. What if these same cattlemen had planted one hundred acres of peanuts to every section of grass land in Texas, the story would have read this: There are 20,000 head of sleek fat cattle in Texas ready for market, which will net the Texas cattle raisers many millions of dollars. Some may argue that it has been too dry to raise peanuts, or anything else where these cattle are starving. Well let's see, is Mineral Wells, Dublin, Comanche, DeLeon, Cisco, Rising Star, Cleburne, Brownwood, and Stephenville in the drought belt? Yes. Well they are making from 10 to 25 bushels of peanuts, and a half ton of hay to the acre, and taking the minimum of the yield, which is ten bushels of nuts, and one thousand pounds of hay per acre, and on a hundred acres this would

be thirty thousand pounds of nuts and one hundred thousand pounds of hay. That amount would have kept two hundred head of cattle from starving, and two hundred head of cattle is about all a section of grass land will carry.

The Texas Peanut Works is being organized to build one hundred warehouses scattered over the State at different concentrating places where railroad facilities are ample for the purpose of locating seed nuts to the surrounding country, in order to make Texas a peanut growing State, and a centrally located factory to manufacture all the by-products of the peanut, and one of these by-products will be peanut meal and cake; also ground peanut hay, and will be kept in the hundred warehouses for distribution for the convenience of the stockmen of Texas.
